## 5 Debators to Represent PLC at L. A. Tourney

Five PLC students have been chosen to travel to Los Angeles November 18 to take part in the Western Speech Association tournament which will be held at Pepperdine College November 20, 21 and 22.

Representing PLC in the competition will be Malcolm Soine, Joan Ericson, Alan Hatlen, William Rieck and Mary Larson. Professor Theodore O. H. Carl will accompany the group. As a member of the speech activities coordinating committee, he will be one of the directors of the tournament.

About 65 colleges and universities from the 11 western states are expected to compete and more than 300 contestants will participate in the three-day session.

Soine and Ericson will compete in the senior division. They will be debate partners, and Soine will also compete in the impromptu and oratory sections. Ericson will take part in the extemporaneous and discussion sections. Miss Larson also will compete in the senior division in the impromptu, discussion, one-man debate and experimental sections.

Hatlen and Rieck will compete in the junior division. They will be debate partners and Hatlen also will take part in the oratory and extemporaneous sections. Rieck will compete in the one-man debate, impromptu and discussion sections.

The students will return to the campus immediately following the tournament but Professor Carl will go on to the Western Speech Association Convention at Santa Barbara State College where he will speak on the place of dramatics in the curriculum, and on forensics on the college level.

According to Kenneth Jacobs, plant manager, this staff works constantly to improve the campus. Five acres of landscaping is finished, and the work on another five acres will start this winter.

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## Wide Variety of Religious Groups Represented on Campus This Fall

According to figures released from the registrar's office this week, there are 590 Lutheran students at P.L.C. and 381 students of other denominations.

In the Lutheran group, 304 students belong to the Evangelical synod. The American synod ranks next in number with 100 students; and the Augustana synod is third with 68.

The Missouri synod has 55 representatives. There are 29 from the United Lutheran synod, 8 Free Lutherans, 6 Norwegian Lutherans, four from the Wisconsin synod, and 36 unclassified Lutheran students.

There are 71 Methodists, 53 Presbyterians, 4 Catholics and 39 Baptists in attendance. Eleven members of the Christian church are registered, eight Episcopalians, nine from the Congregational church, and seven Christian Scientists.

From the Nazarene church are four students, three from the Greek Orthodox, 2 Covenant church members, two from the Free Methodist church, and four of the United Brethren. There are one each of Seventh Day Adventists, Disciples of Christ, Latter-Day Saints, and Friends (Quakers).

Falling in the unclassified church group are 122 students, but most of this number are special students registered in only one or two classes, and it is almost impossible to check on their religious preferences, according to Dr. P. E. Hauge, dean.

Dr. Wagner is one of the few people to have lived in Eastern Germany under the Communist regime. She was educated and taught in Germany until the Nazi occupation, war period and Russian occupation.

The Community Service Program at WSC is sponsoring her speaking tour.

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## New Chapel Rising Behind Old Main

As the crude structure of unpainted forms and masses of cement rise on the horizon in back of Old Main, it is quite evident that progress on the new Chapel-Music-Speech Building is well under way.

The building which boasts an auditorium with a seating capacity of 1200 is the first major building project on the PLC campus since the completion of the gym in 1947.

The contracting bids for the building were awarded to local Tacoma firms. Steiro & Hansen received the general contracting award, and the plumbing and heating facilities are being installed by Weber Plumbing and Heating. Raymond Electric is doing the electrical work. Lea-Pearson and Richards, also of Tacoma, designed the building and are supervising construction.

Boasting the largest stage on any campus on the Pacific Coast, the building will cover 50 per cent more ground area than the Old Main.

The classroom unit of the building will include five music studios, 16 practice rooms, a choir room, band-orchestra room, two speech offices, a speech classroom, and a radio-studio classroom.

Work on the structure, which will be finished in brick veneer with cast stone trim, was begun three months ago and is scheduled to be completed August 14, 1951.
