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EX-TACOMAN HEADS STATE COLLEGE UNIT

Cecil O. Vance, of Cincinnati, Ohio, a former Tacoman, has been appointed executive director of the Independent Colleges of Washington, Inc., Dr. Robert Mortvedt, president of the association and of Pacific Lutheran University, has announced.

Vance will succeed Dr. Thomas Beyer, who resigned recently. He will take the post Nov. 15, and will make his headquarters in Seattle.

A graduate of Hamline University, St. Paul, Minn., Vance was on the staff of PLU from 1957 to 1962, as financial assistant to the president.

Since 1962 he has been controller for the Sisters of Mercy, Province of Cincinnati.

Member schools in the association include PLU, St. Martin's College, Fort Wright College, Seattle Pacific College, Seattle University, Gonzaga University, Walla Walla College and Whitworth College.

LOVEJOY NAMED BUSINESS MANAGER

Appointment of Allen P. Lovejoy, 54, as business manager was announced in July by President Robert Mortvedt.

Lovejoy, assistant business manager since 1963, succeeds A. Dean Buchanan, who earlier was elevated to vice president--business and finance.

A native of Wisconsin, Lovejoy is a Yale University graduate and also studied at the Universities of Wisconsin and Omaha.

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DR. VIGNESS AT PURDUE

Dr. Paul G. Vigness, professor emeritus of history, joined the Purdue University faculty this fall.

He received a one-year appointment as professor of American history.

Dr. Vigness, who has resided at 1110 Wheeler St., Tacoma, since his retirement a year ago, has been doing historical research on the role of Norway in the second world war. A book on the subject, encompassing data gathered in Norway last summer, is expected to be finished in about a year, he said.

He wrote about the role of Norway in the first world war for his Ph.D. dissertation at Stanford University in 1932.

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PUBLICATIONS PROGRAM BEST IN U. S.

Pacific Lutheran University's publications program was designated best in the nation last summer by the American College Public Relations Association.

Announcement of the award was made July 6 in Boston at the ACPRA annual convention. PLU received a Certificate of Exceptional Achievement based on the impact of its total publications program.

Highest award given by the association, the "exceptional" certificate was the only one given for 1966 in the "impact of total publications" division. More than 1,200 U. S. colleges and universities were eligible for the award.

The Rev. Milton Nesvig, PLU vice president--university relations, received the citation from John Mattill, director of publications at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. With it went a \$250 incentive award presented by William Whitsitt, director of education programs for the Sears Roebuck Foundation.

PLU also won a Certificate of Special Merit for the annual report of President Robert Mortvedt.

The latter citation was shared by 53 other schools, including four in the northwest and four in California. The list included University of Washington, Washington State University, Western Washington State College, University of Oregon, University of Southern California, University of California at Los Angeles, Mills College and Westmont College.

For PLU it was the second year in a row for winning an "exceptional" certificate. The 1965 award was for improvement of publications. The school also captured eight publications awards at the ACPRA regional conference last year at San Francisco.

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POOL WINS NATIONAL ATTENTION

Progressive Architecture magazine for July devoted its cover and a story inside to the PLU swimming pool building.

The unique interior design of the building's roof beams was shown in a cover photograph. Inside, a story and photos described the structure under the title, "Returning Nature to the Indoor Pool."

The magazine congratulated Tacoma architect Robert Billsbrough Price for the building's interior, which it called "strong and well articulated."

The pool was opened in May 1965.

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CAL LUTHERAN ON SCHEDULE

PLU will play a home-and home football series with California Lutheran College in 1967 and 1968.

H. Mark Salzman, PLU athletic director said the teams will play at Tacoma on Sept. 16, 1967, and at Thousand Oaks, Calif., on Sept. 21, 1968.

The games will be the first athletic encounters between the teams. California Lutheran opened in 1960.

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MAGELSSSEN TAUGHT STORE SEMINAR

J. C. Magelssen, book store manager at Pacific Lutheran University, was an instructor July 18-22 at a Stanford University seminar for store managers.

He taught college store planning, staffing, departmental and unit controls courses for third year students. The seminar was arranged by the National Association of College Stores.

Magelssen came to PLU from Luther College, Ia., in 1965. He has managed college stores and student centers for 12 years.

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MRS. NAPJUS WRITES AGAIN

A life-long interest in baseball has inspired the writing of a new juvenile fiction work by Alice Napjus, assistant professor of education.

She has been advised that D. Van Nostrand, Princeton, N. J., will publish her book, tentatively entitled The Keystone Code, in the fall of 1967. She expects to use the pen name, James Nolan.

A baseball story for boys 10 to 13, the book focuses on a shortstop on a small town team who is led astray and into various adventures by a wayward pitcher.

Mrs. Napjus says she has been a rabid baseball fan "all my life." She grew up with two brothers who were baseball fans "and married a man as interested in baseball as I," she says.

"When our two boys were born, we decided they'd be assigned to the then New York Giants," she recalls with a smile. The two have since chosen careers in math and engineering.

The new book will be the second for Mrs. Napjus. The Magic Chair, a collection of fairytales, was published in 1957.

Mrs. Napjus, who has bachelors and masters degrees from the University of Washington, resides with her husband, Thys, at 766 S. 120th St. Thys operates a greenhouse at Zenith.
