REV. HALVORSON TO SPEAK DURING FAITH-LIFE WEEK

The Rev. Arndt L. Halvorson, professor of homiletics at Luther Theological Seminary, St. Paul, Minn., will be the featured speaker at the Faith in Life Week program next week at Pacific Lutheran University.

Rev. Halvorson will speak during the daily chapel service Weds. on the subject "Words of the Word." He will continue this theme in subsequent talks on Thursday and Friday.

A graduate of Augustana College and Luther Theological Seminary, Rev. Halvorson has done graduate study at Columbia University and the University of Edinburgh.

He has served parishes in Minneapolis, Wyoming, Iowa and New York before assuming his present post in 1957. He was interim president of Waldorf College during 1950-51 and was a member of the Board of Education for the American Lutheran Church from 1952-58.

He is the author of the book, "Take Up The Cross."

Three movies are also scheduled during the week. "Reclaimed," which was used at the Christian Witness Pavilion during the Seattle World's Fair, will be shown Tuesday evening; "Lord of Flies" is listed for Wednesday; and "Ordet," a Danish film, is scheduled for Thursday. The Wednesday movie will be shown in the Parkland Theater while the others will be shown in Eastvold Chapel auditorium. All are open to the public free of charge.

The observance will open with a prayer service Monday evening in Eastvold Chapel.

AWS TO HOST 370 MOTHERS DURING MOM'S WEEKEND

Mothers will get a taste of college life this weekend at Pacific Lutheran University when the Associated Women Students hold their annual Mother's Weekend program.

Approximately 370 mothers from as far away as California and North Dakota are expected to attend the three-day program which includes a wide variety of activities. "My Fair Mother" is the theme for the event.

The program opens Friday evening with a performance of the Children's Theatre production of "Runaway Nils," senior piano recital by Mary Gilbertson and informal programs in the dormitories.

Dr. Jane Williamson, assistant professor of education, will speak to mothers and daughters Saturday morning. Dr. Robert Mortvedt, PLU president, will bring greetings from the university. A luncheon will follow at 11:45 a.m. Lynn Maxeiner, AWS president, and Miss Margaret Wickstrom, assistant dean of students, will speak.

Highlighting the afternoon will be a fashion show--"Fashion Game"-- at 2 p.m. in Memorial Gymnasium. The show is open to the public.

A lecture by Vance Packard, noted author, will feature the evening program.

The event will close with the morning worship service Sunday.

SERVICE DRIVE IS URGED

Faculty and administrative staff members are urged to support the students World University Service drive on campus.

Today WUS has committees in 48 countries. Some examples of the projects being carried out are the establishment of a college in Bechuanaland, the building of a dormitory in Nepal and the furnishing of a student hostel in Guatemala.

In order to complete current projects of providing food and lodging, educational facilities, individual and emergency aid and improvement of student health \$1,000,000 must be raised in the United States this year to supplement funds being raised in other nations.
