These are some of the sources of financial support for postgraduate studies that are of possible interest to students and to some faculty members. Please note that those designated by an asterisk require some form of special nomination. To be certain that the best possible candidates are nominated, please discuss any student you would like to see nominated with either the designated local representative of the particular fellowship program or with Dean Anderson.

Postdoctoral Fellowships for Cross-Disciplinary Study, for (1) scholars in the humanities, social and natural sciences for a year of study in religion, or (2) scholars in religion for a year of study in another discipline (Society for Religion in Higher Education, apply before November 17).

Fellowships in Asian Religion for College Teachers, for scholars teaching religion who wish to include material involving Asian religion in their courses and need a year of study (Society for Religion in Higher Education, apply before November 17).

* Woodrow Wilson National Fellowships, bring inquiries about nominations to Dr. Thomas Langevin, Campus Representative, (nominations due by October 31).

Atomic Energy Commission Special Fellowships in Nuclear Science and Engineering and Health Physics, for graduates in science or mathematics (application materials available from Oak Ridge Associated Universities, Oak Ridge, Tennessee; due by January 1, 1968).

Instructors and Assistant Professors are eligible to apply to teach for the 1968-69 year in a foreign country in exchange with a teacher abroad, or in some cases on a one-way placement. We do not have application forms, but detailed information and application forms may be obtained until November 1 by addressing requests to:

The above is a part of the Fulbright Hays Act which also includes a program of attendance of summer seminars overseas. Information on that is also available at the above address.
