Four outstanding PLU music students will be the featured soloists as the University Symphony Orchestra presents its third concert of the season Monday, March 15, at 8:15 p.m. in Eastvold Auditorium.

Pianist Bernadette Kelly, a junior from Vernon, B.C., will perform the first movement of the Mozart Piano Concerto No. 24 in C minor, K.V. 491.

Sandra Haugen, soprano, will sing the aria "Non so piu cosa son" from Mozart's Marriage of Figaro. Miss Haugen is a sophomore from Havre, Montana.

Trombonist Cathy Hornbaker, a sophomore from Seattle, will play the Concerto for Trombone and Orchestra by Henri Tomasi, contemporary French composer.

And Laura Carter, pianist, will perform the first movement of the Beethoven Piano Concerto No. 4 in G Major, Op. 58. Miss Carter is a sophomore from Reno, Nevada.

These soloists were selected earlier this year in the annual competition which gives outstanding PLU music majors the opportunity to perform with the University Symphony Orchestra. The orchestra is conducted by PLU music professor Jerry Kracht.

The concert is complimentary.

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LUTES WIN NWC  
SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIP

Seven Northwest Conference swimming records, all formerly held by PLU, were washed out of the books as the Lutes reclaimed the NWC swimming crown for the third time in the past five years.

Coach Gary Chase's swimmers easily defeated runner-up Lewis and Clark, the defending champion, 166-123. The remaining conference teams were not in serious contention.

"Not one member of the team failed to improve over his best previous time," Chase said. "It would be impossible to cite any one as a standout because they all were."

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24 YEAR BASKETBALL  
TRADITION CONTINUES

With a firm grip on the conference championship trophy, an extension of PLU's long-standing winning tradition in their pockets, and the retention of ten members of an eleven man squad for next year, the Lutes came away from the season far from empty-handed after losing the Kansas City tickets in the final game of the year.

With a 15-14 record, the Lutes kept intact a twenty-four consecutive year streak wherein PLU teams have regularly bettered the .500 won-loss mark.

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WILDCATS EDGE LUTES  
IN NAIA PLAYOFFS

Central Washington's Wildcats maintained their mastery over PLU in modern playoff history by coming back from a one game deficit to take two straight victories on their



home court to earn a NAIA tournament berth in the nationals at Kansas City.

The Lutes prevailed in game one 70-61 on the PLU floor March 1, but Central turned the tables with back-to-back 81-71, 62-59 wins in Ellensburg the next two nights. PLU has come out on the short end of the past four post-season engagements--1966, 1967, 1970, and now 1971.
