"CAROUSEL" TO OPEN THREE-PERFORMANCE RUN MAY 13 IN EASTVOLD CHAPEL

Rodgers' and Hammerstein's "Carousel" will be presented on the Eastvold Chapel auditorium stage May 13-15, beginning at 8:30 p.m. each evening.

First produced 20 years ago, it is one of the outstanding Broadway musicals of all times. The story is based on Ferenc Molnar's "Lilliom," which was first presented in the early 1920's. "Lilliom" was a hit from the start and is still presented all over the world.

A cast of 60 PLU students will take part in the production which is being presented jointly by the PLU departments of music and speech. Theodore O. H. Karl is the producer while Dr. Abe. J. Bassett is director and Maurice Skones is musical director.

Eric Nordholm is the technical director with Mrs. LaMøyne as choreographer.

Mary Ann Satrum and Steve Cornils, stars in recent productions of the "Mikado" and "Pirates of Penzance" at PLU, have the leading roles of Julie Jordan and Billy Bigelow.

Other principal characters will be played by Wilma Baer, Marion Toepka, Raeder Anderson and Lynn Ertsgaard.

Also appearing in the cast are Dennis Flath, Rick Crouse, Esther Estrem, Cathy Coffin, Brent Olsen, Paul Olson, Jim Feek, Bob Roberts, Arden Flom and Ken Sanvik.

PLU BASEBALLERS ENTERTAIN WESTERN, TRACK SQUAD TRAVELS TO S.P.C.

PLU opens its Evergreen Conference baseball schedule Saturday when the Knights entertain Western Washington in a pair of seven-inning games, beginning at 1 p.u.

The Vikings are 10-1 for the season and 4-0 in EvCo Western Division action, needing but a single victory over PLU Saturday to clinch its fourth straight division title.

Western Washington is the defending EvCo champion, defeating Whitworth in playoff action last year.

PLU will carry a 1-5 record into Satu day's league opener. Coach Roy Carlson has named Al Hedman and Mike Arkell as his starters.

Hedman owns the Knights lone victory while Arkell sports the best earned run average at 0.59.

Ken Klubberud leads the PLU batters with an even .400 average while Steve Dalgelish is close behind with a .375 mark. Dalgelish also has a pair of doubles and three rbi's to lead in both departments.

Al Freutel leads in the steal department with four in six games.

Following Saturday's games, PLU will play six games in six days with twin bills scheduled against University of British Columbia Monday, University of Puget Sound Wednesday and a return pair in Bellingham next Saturday with the Vikings.

The PLU track squad will seek its fourth victory of the season Saturday when it travels to Seattle to meet Seattle Pacific College in a dual meet at Queen Anne Bowl.

The Knights topped Puget Sound and St. Martin's 103-43-29 Wednesday for their third victory of the season against a pair of second place finishes in triangular meets.
