Fleming To Discuss Kerner Report Here

Former Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Arthur Fleming will lecture in Tacoma on implementation of Kerner Report recommendations Thursday and Friday, Feb. 26-27.

Fleming, currently president of Mc-Alester College in St. Paul, Minn., is being sponsored in Tacoma by Pacific Lutheran University under a grant from the S & H Foundation.

The grant was presented last year to bring nationally-known experts on the urban crisis to the Tacoma area for a series of speaking engagements. Previous visitors were banker William G. Ericsson of Chicago and Minneapolis Mayor Arthur Naftalin.

A member of the National Urban Coalition steering committee, Fleming has lauded the Kerner report, prepared by former President Johnson's National Committee on Civil Disorders, as "one of the great documents of this century." He is primarily concerned with the programs that he believes must be developed from Kerner Report recommendations.

Fleming is scheduled to speak to the PLU faculty Thursday evening at 8 p.m. in Xavier Hall. His subject will be "The Future of Christian Higher Education."

He is tentatively scheduled to address PLU students during convocation Friday morning at 9:50 a.m., on the implications of the Kerner Report. He will be available for an informal discussion in the faculty lounge at 10:45 a.m., followed by a noon luncheon at the Winthrop Hotel, where he will speak at the 2nd Anniversary dinner of the Urban Coalition.

"Implementation of Kerner Report Recommendations" will be the subject of Fleming lectures to Pierce County Associated Ministries at the New Yorker Cafe at 6 p.m. and during a public appearance at First Methodist Church in Tacoma at 7:30 p.m.

Dr. Lowell Culver, PLU urban affairs representative, is in charge of the S & H Lectureship program.

Fleming holds a bachelor of laws degree from George Washington University, has served as a college professor, journalist, president of Ohio Wesleyan University and University of Oregon, and has held a vast number of governmental positions.

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UNIVERSITY RECEIVES THIRD GRANT FROM TEXACO

Pacific Lutheran University has again been selected as one of the privately-financed colleges in the United States to receive unrestricted grants under the Aid-to-Education Program of Texaco, Inc., President Eugene Wiegman announced this week.

The grant of \$1,500 awarded for the 1969-70 academic year is the third such grant awarded to PLU by Texaco.

PLU is one of 300 colleges and universities included in Texaco's program of educational support. In addition to providing direct financial support to 155 privately-financed schools, the program includes scholarship and fellowship assistance to 90 educational institutions, both private and tax supported.

Making the presentation this week were Texaco representatives Ralph Ehrlich and Robert Nangle.

Opera Workshop Prepares Performances For Feb. 26-28

Two one-act comic operas will be presented at PLU next weekend by the university's Opera Workshop, under the direction of Prof. William Sare.

Performances will be held in East-vold Auditorium Thursday through Saturday, Feb. 26-28, at 8:15 p.m. each evening.

Musical accompaniment for the cast of characters in each opera will be provided by the PLU Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Prof. Jerry Kracht.

"The Impresario," by Mozart, involves Herr Frank, an opera producer encountering difficulty with two sopranos competing for the leading role in the next production. Both women, one an aging prima donna and the other an aspiring ingenue, are determined to win the part. They both try to outperform each other and scorn the abilities and accomplishments of the other. Finally the banker, Herr Eiler, who is financially supporting the production, soothes the indignant soprano's nerves, fires Herr Frank and takes his place as the impresario.

Performers in the opera are Tim Mackey as Herr Frank, Joyce Johnson and Eileen Wetterstrom as Madame Sliverklang, Tenna Shephard and Diane Stober as Miss Sweetsong, Mark Scholz as Herr Eiler and Bob Smith as Her Buff.

The second opera, "The Jumping Frog of Calaveras County," by Lukas Foss, is based on a story by Mark Twain.

During the California Gold Rush the citizens of Calaveras County are proud of Smiley's champion frog, Dan'l, and confident he can outjump any challenger, until a stranger arrives demanding a contest. During an unguarded moment the feeds Dan'l with buckshot. To the crowd's amazement, Dan'l is defeated and the stranger leaves town with all the money. Dan'l's extra weight is soon discovered; the crapsshooters promptly capture the stranger and recover the money.

Members of the cast include Brad Miller as Uncle Henry, Gretchen Kreamer and Karen Wraalstad as Lulu, Dan Howell as the stranger and Mark Scholz as Smiley.

Lutes Win Final NWC Games As Season Nears End

This past week it was two wins and a loss for the Lutes, dropping the UPS fray Wednesday before sweeping their final conference series against Lewis and Clark and Willamette 70-58 and 67-57.

After singing the nets at an 88-point a game clip during the past month, PLU hit a cold streak that lasted through all three games, but countered the draught with their best defensive effort of the season.

Against the Loggers, PLU played a deliberate, controlled game, one of their best disciplinary efforts of the season, but were unable to take the boards away from the tall UPS quint. Sixth man Ralph Whitman turned in the best Lute shooting effort with 5 for 9 from the floor.

The Pioneer fray was a high point as the Lutes controlled the boards 53-29 to offset a 40.3 shooting percentage. Senior Al Kollar and sophomore Ake Palm grabbed 27 "boards," and senior Leroy Sinnes canned 10 of 20 fielders to spearhead the victory. It was especially pleasant as the Pioneers one-point upset win in Portland had deprived the Lutes of a conference title tie.

The boards were again a factor Saturday as PLU suffered through their worst shooting night of the season (31.6%), but 42 rebounds by Palm, Kollar and Sinnes gave the Lutes 22 more shots than the Bearcats. It was Palm's dominance (16 "boards and 13 points) in the second half that held off Willamette rallies. The Salem quint led by a point as late as the final eight minutes of the second half.

Next week the Lutes complete their final regular season schedule with return engagements against Western Washington and Puget Sound. Coach Gene Lundgaard's charges opened the season with a 67-57 win over the Vikings and battled UPS all the way before dropping a 70-58 decision to the nationally-ranked NCAA small-college quint.
