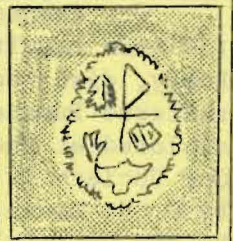

ALC STUDENT CONFERENCE TO OPEN
HERE THURSDAY: 250 STUDENTS EXPECTED

Pacific Lutheran University will be host to the Fifth Annual American Lutheran Church Conference which opens Thursday, Nov. 26. Approximately 250 delegates from the 15 Lutheran colleges, universities and seminaries are expected to attend the three-day meeting.

The theme of the convention will be "The Church College Community. Why?"

Guest speakers will be Dr. Luvern Rieke, professor of law at the University of Washington; Dr. Arthur Fleming, president of the University of Oregon; the Rev. Ewald Balsh, assistant youth director in vocation for the ALC; and Dr. Robert Mortvedt, president of PLU.

Dr. Mortvedt will be the speaker at the opening worship service Thursday while the Rev. Balsh will conduct the closing communion service Saturday morning.

Dr. Luvern Rieke will speak on the subject "The Vocation of the Church College Community" Thurs. afternoon. "Christian Action in Today's World" will be the subject of Dr. Flemming's talk Friday morning.

Delegates from the midwest will arrive Thursday morning on a special train.

Besides PLU, the schools include St. Olaf, Luther, Augustana, Augsburg, Concordia, Dana, Wartburg, Waldorf, Texas Lutheran and California Lutheran colleges, Capital University, Luther and Wartburg seminaries and Fairview Nursing School.

Jay Haavik, a senior at PLU, is convention coordinator.

BAND LEAVES ON ANNUAL TOUR:
18 CONCERTS SCHEDULED

Eighteen concerts in 12 days have been booked for the Pacific Lutheran University concert band which leaves today on a tour of cities in Washington, Idaho, Montana and North Dakota.

Playing under the direction of Professor Gordon O. Gilbertson, the 58-piece band will appear tonight in Wilbur and Saturday in Libby, Mont.

Other engagements include: Nov. 22, Whitefish and Polson; Nov. 23, Kalispell, Shelby; Nov. 24, Joplin, Havre, Harlem; Nov. 25, Malta, Glasgow; Nov. 26, Watford City, N. D.; Nov. 27, Culbertson, Mont., Circle; Nov. 28, Great Falls; Nov. 29, Fairfield; Nov. 30, Kellogg, Idaho; Dec. 1, Issaquah.

The band will return to Tacoma December 2 and will give its annual home concert that evening in Eastvold Chapel at PLU.

Milton Nesvig, director of public relations, will travel with the group as tour manager.

Marches, contemporary works, classical favorites, show tunes and novelty numbers will be included in the program which Prof. Gilbertson has selected for the tour.

The concerts will be sponsored by churches and school organizations. An appearance has been booked at Northern Montana College, Havre.

The band will travel in two chartered buses. For housing each evening, the group will be guests in the homes of families of the sponsoring organizations.

DR. BARTEKY TO SPEAK SUNDAY
ON "THE IRON CURTAIN" AT TRINITY

"The Iron Curtain" will be the topic of the lecture given by Dr. Tibor Barteky on Sunday, November 22 at 7:30 p.m. in the Fellowship Room of Trinity Lutheran Church.

As a native of Hungary, Dr. Barteky, social sciences librarian at PLU, has been imprisoned by both the Nazis and the Communists. During the 1956 Hungarian Revolt he was forced to escape to Yugoslavia leaving behind all his worldly possessions.
