The "America's Smithsonian" exhibit is on the move across the country in 1996 and 1997, the largest traveling exhibit ever produced. ## Novel vs. storytelling in Chinese story

The ASC voiced the concerns of staff and administrators who asked for more professional development opportunities. Look for several such offerings from Human Resources this fall.
