Four Pacific Lutheran College debaters and their coach are participating in the biennial provincial convention and tournament of Pi Kappa Delta in Pocatello, Idaho, this week. The group left here by train Wednesday for the events which began yesterday and continues through Saturday night.

PLC's two top debate teams are competing. They include Donald Douglas and Thomas Reeves and Bettelou Macdonald and Janet Turman. They will compete with teams from the 15 schools which comprise the Pacific Northwest province of the national forensics honorary.

Professor Theodore O. H. Karl, debate coach, is provincial governor of Pi Kappa Delta and is to preside over convention sessions which are being held at Idaho State College.

In addition to debate the PLC speakers are competing in extempore, oratory and television experimental. The latter is a new event in which the competitors give a reading before a television camera.

Every other year Pi Kappa Delta holds a national convention and tourney. Last year PLC competed in this event at Brookings, S. D. Next year the national event will be held at Bowling Green, Ohio.

PLC's 'Thumbelina' Float Construction on Campus To Be Finished Tonight

Following completion early tomorrow morning, "Thumbelina," PLC's float will be entered in the annual Daffodil Parade, which begins tomorrow at 10:00 a.m. from the center of Tacoma and will move out to Puyallup and Sumner. Main theme for the parade, a part of the Daffodil Festival, is "Fairy Tales and Flowers."

Portraying Thumbelina will be tiny Carol Hurst. About the main character on the float will be four fairy-princesses and the King of the Flowers. The king, Bob Larson, will be seated on the very top of the float, raised about 13 feet; he will be seated on a giant lily pad and clad entirely in silver.

Resting on the four corners of the float about a blue pond will be the fairy-princesses, Betty Johnson, Grace Engen, Jan Snyder, and Kathy Knutson, representing each of the four classes. Each of the princesses will be on a giant green lily pad tilted to reveal the girls who will be on different levels and dressed in blue and white. In the center of the blue pond will be a rotating lily pad.

Tonight students are urged to

work on the float putting the 35,000 daffodils in the setting. Pacific Lutheran has won first prize in the educational division for the past several years and it is hoped by the committee that the entry will be completed in time for competition tomorrow.

Late leaves will be given girls who will work on the float tonight, as has been the tradition in past years. Students are urged to assist on the float at any time today. Work is continuing on lower campus at the industrial arts building.

Jay Tronsdale is chairman of this year's float, with assistants being Jim Stewart, Alice Jessen and Jerry Hanson.

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PLC to Vote Whether To Pay PLC Officers

Amendment to the By-Laws of the ASPLC Constitution to be presented in student body chapel on April 15, 1958, and to be voted upon on Tuesday, April 22:

"The four ASPLC officers shall each receive a scholarship for their service in office. These scholarships shall be drawn from the ASPLC treasury and shall be payable on the second semester of the officers' terms. They shall be in the following amounts: President, \$100; vice-president, \$50; treasurer, \$25; secretary, \$25.

"These scholarships will become effective beginning in the school year 1958-59."

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Growth and Time

Who's Cold Shoulder?

Several weeks ago a group of students, sparked by the interest of a professor, began a movement to put a course in the Russian language on the PLC curriculum. I believe the general feeling of those concerned was that the movement never got moving due to a cold shoulder of the administration. However, I believe this is untrue.

University of Chicago social scientist David Riesman opined in a recent special lecture that students are quite realistic about college life, and form few illusions about it. But one of their greatest illusions is the belief that they can in no way affect their academic environment. They don't realize, for example, that faculties are not the monolithic, tight organisms they seem to be, but are rather groups that are often in precarious balance. This balance could be easily affected by a determined student opinion. "This is not to imply that I want professors to run their courses on the basis of popularity queries," insisted Riesman. "I believe in faculty autonomy. But I also believe that the students should have responsibility and influence over their own fate."

That is what happened at PLC. Through determined student opinion, influence was brought to bear on those concerned with the curriculum. But the administration did not give anyone the cold shoulder; instead it was Time, for before an entirely new department is added it must be known that the department will not die out after a semester, or year, or even longer. For an efficient and well run teaching set-up, for a stable college curriculum and for the best college accreditation, departments cannot come and go.

The movement begun by the students did not stop. The fact is that it was a pioneering effort to expand PLC's curriculum, but an effort which could not be expected to produce results overnight. The effort was felt by the right people, and the influence is still present. But the influence has to be proved. That takes time. — Dave Crowner, editor.

Dorms Raise Money;

All PLC dorms will be engaged in money-raising competition following action taken by the Student Council on Tuesday. From April 21-27 each dorm, through whatever manner it desires, will gather funds for the Campus Chest, with a prize (probably a trophy) to be awarded the winning dorm.

Student Council also voted to put on the ballot an amendment to the PLC constitution by-laws to award student body officers, beginning next year, scholarships totaling \$200. This money will come from the student body treasury.

In the past the student body president has always received a present, but there has never been anything definite in the constitution concerning any type of retribution for the officers, and it was awkward for the president to legislate for his own present.

It is the practice of many schools to pay their officers, and the Council was unanimously in favor of doing so at PLC. President Dave Knutson explained that the amendment will be read in chapel Tuesday and voted upon on April 22.

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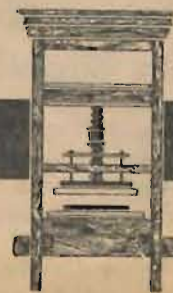
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Fleming Sez:

Fromm Sets New Record

In the Texas Relays PLC All-American javelin star, John Fromm, bettered his national NCAA record of 248 feet, 1 inch with a javelin launching which traveled 25 feet, 10 1/2 inches. Big John made the giant toss in the second try of the preliminaries. Earlier Fromm had set another new record with a toss of 218 feet in an indoor meet at the Washington State College Invitational. This may easily be a new world record for indoor competition.

In a three team meet May 28 between PLC, CPS and St. Martin's the Lute cindermen ran away with sweepstakes as they led the field in scoring. The day ended with PLC scoring a total of 70% points, CPS had 38 3/4, and St. Martin's totaled 27 1/2.

Lutes Win Tri-Meet

In the tri-meet the Gladiator trackmen took eight first places in the events they entered. In the 120-yard high hurdles John Jacobson finished first with a time of 17.5 seconds. Bob Lee ran the 880-yard event in 2:10.1. Gary Gebhard timed in at 27.2 on the 220 low hurdles. The relay team finished with a time of 3:12 as Bob Lee, Lowell Sheldahl, John Jacobson and Dan Witmer carried the "torch." Carly Searcy pushed the shotput 42 feet, 9 inches. Tom Gilmer high jumped 5 feet, 6 inches for a tie with Wilson of Puget Sound. Rich Haulin hurled the javelin 153 feet, 6 inches. Carl Searcy also heaved the discus to a first place of 123 feet, 9 3/4 inches.

Pacific Lutheran will host Seattle Pacific in a track meet scheduled for Saturday, April 19.

Golfers Tour South Greens

This afternoon the Lute golfers will travel to Seattle to compete with the Seattle U. linkmen at Inglewood Country Club. Last year the Chieftain golfers were ranked first in the nation.

The PLC linkmen finished a tour of Oregon college golf greens last Tuesday afternoon. The golfers competed against three teams from Oregon schools during a two-day tour of the southlands.

At Oswego Lake Golf Course, on Monday, the Lutes were outclubbed 13 1/2-4 1/2 by the Portland University team. Gladiator golf ace, Bob Sparling, scored a two over par 70 to receive medalist honors for the matches against Portland U.

Student player-coach, Don Hall, sharpened the sights on Tuesday as he took medalist honors with a pair of 69 (each three under par) matches in competition against Oregon State College varsity and junior varsity golfers. The OSC varsity managed a 12 1/2-5 1/2 victory over PLC, but the Lutherans squared off the day by beating the OSC JV's 10 1/2-7 1/2.

For the first time in years PLC will be able to watch its baseball team play on the PLC diamond as the batmen meet Central Washington in a double-header tomorrow at 1:30 p.m.

PLC's John Hergert and Central's Bill Bieloh will probably be starting pitchers for the opener.

Several practice games with Fort Lewis, to be played at PLC, are being planned by baseball coach Marv Tommervil.

Last Wednesday afternoon the Lutes split a two-game set with Central at Ellensburg. With Pacific Lutheran's two best hitters, Don May and Glenn Campbell, pitcher John Hergert and utility infielder Jerry Donahue out of the lineup the Wildcats cashed in on defensive errors and erratic pitching to take the opener 12-1.

However, on the five-hit pitching of Chuck Curtis, who went the distance, the Lutes took the second contest 4-1.

On Friday, April 4, the University of Washington topped PLC 6-1 after starting pitcher John Hergert allowed the Huskies only one earned run in five innings.

Fort Lewis and the Gladiators battled to a 4-4 deadlock in the PLC opening practice game played at Western State Hospital field in Steilacoom.

Intramural Director Mark Salzman announced the first and second fives to the annual campus basketball "All Star" team. Ted Berry, Dave Haaland, Gerry Scheele, Paul Carlson, and John Mitchell are the first five, while Jerry Curtis, Gene Schaumberg, Roy Schwarz, Jim Berentson, and Duane Mor round out the selections.

Salz Named Athletic Director; Football, Basketball Separate

Pacific Lutheran College has embarked on a new era in sports on the Gladiator campus: The era of the Salzman, Gabrielsen, and Lundgaard trio at the reins of the Lute athletic program. The first day of spring vacation at Luteville brought forth the announcement of the new athletic staff for the 1958-59 school year. President S. C. Eastvold announced the new staff in view of the loss of Marv Harshman to Washington State College.

President Eastvold named Mark Salzman as Athletic Director, James D. Gabrielsen as head football and baseball coach and assistant professor in physical education, and Gene Lundgaard as head basketball coach and instructor in physical education.

Mr. Salzman, present head track coach and assistant professor of physical education, will assume the duties of Director of Athletics next fall. He will continue to head the intramural program which he is presently directing.

Eastvold Praises Salzman

Dr. Eastvold had this to say about selecting Salzman as Athletic Director: "In his seven years with us, Salzman has shown his ability to plan and administer an excellent intramural, recreational and activity program. With the addition of two men to the staff, he will be in a position to spearhead the expansion and strengthen the vital instructional phase of our athletic program."

Mr. Gabrielsen, age 27, has been hockey, track and freshman football coach at St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota, for two years. His hockey team was one of the best in Minnesota college circles. His track team finished third in the Midwest Athletic Conference last year. Freshman football was not a league sport, therefore the statistics were of no importance.

St. Olaf Athletic Director, Ade Christensen, said, "Gabrielsen has the makings of a great coach, is an excellent technician, a splendid student of the game, and a very competent teacher."

Gabrielsen received his master of arts degree in education from New York University and his bachelor of arts degree from Concordia College, Moorhead, Minn. His alma mater's Director of Athletics, Jake Christensen, wrote, "Jim Gabrielsen would be my first choice if we at Concordia were to hire a football coach and physical education teacher right now."

He coached high school sports at Rosholt, South Dakota, and at Elbow Lake, Minnesota. The Elbow Lake team was the Heart of the Lakes Conference champions in 1955.

He played semi-pro baseball in South Dakota and worked with the Police Athletic League while in New York at graduate school.

Alumnus Gene Lundgaard comes to PLC from Franklin Pierce School District. While at PLC he earned the title "Mr. Basketball," for his great play during the 1947-1951 basketball seasons.

At Franklin Pierce High School, Lundgaard, who is 29, is freshman basketball coach, assistant in freshman football, varsity golf coach, and teach-

er of health and physical education.

Before taking the position at Franklin Pierce, Mr. Lundgaard served in the United States Air Force for four years. The former AF Staff Sergeant played for the Memphis Air Force Base quintet and was voted the most valuable player in the Southeast (US) Area Tournament. His team took third place in the world-wide Air Force tourney. Later he was a player-coach at Memphis and then at Ardmore Air Force Base, Oklahoma. During his service years, he worked with sports and supervised athletic programs.

At PLC, Lundgaard was selected a member of the first team his freshman year. In the last two seasons he was named an all-conference choice. Until Chuck Curtis, whom he looks forward to coaching, set new records, Lundgaard held individual season scoring of 508 and the single game mark of 38, which were set in 1951.

For the last three seasons he has played with Northwest AAU teams. Mr. Lundgaard has completed his fifth year for the general certificate and is working toward a masters degree in education at PLC.

Coaches Will Team

In addition to his basketball work, he will assist Gabrielsen in football and teach courses in PE.

Lundgaard commented, "It was definitely a break for me since I am relatively young for a college coach. I am looking forward to next year. I feel the material should contribute to another good season and with freshmen who have gained experience this year and the prospective players we will recruit in the future, I look for PLC to have continuing success in basketball. I fully realize that a loss in size with the graduation of Tom Sahli will somewhat jeopardize the team's efforts. However, I feel we can compensate for that." Mr. Lundgaard would not relate his solution for this height problem.

Tutored by Harsh

He went on to say, "since I learned basketball from Marv Harshman, I feel that I will be able to employ a similar attack."

Doctor Eastvold had this to say about the appointments, "We feel that we have obtained two outstanding young men with great futures ahead of them. Since our enrollment is increasing rapidly and we are embarked on a visionary development program, to meet that challenge, we feel that we should give this department every help that we can afford. The primary purpose of our athletic program is to teach. With emphasis on coaching six sports plus running an extensive intramural program, we feel that three men are necessary. We think that adequate balance and emphasis on all phases of the program can thus be attained."

The new pledges will undergo a four-week pledge period and at the end of that time will be initiated to full membership in PLC's chapter of this national music honorary.

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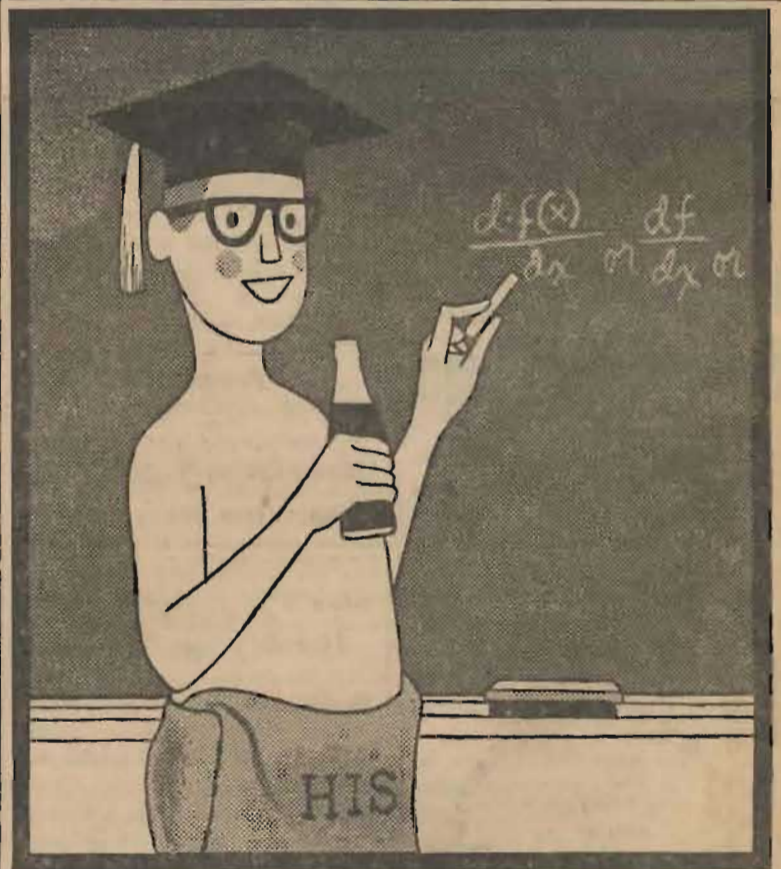
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
