Changing exhibits in SCC

There's one more week to view the 50 bronze sculptures of retired medical doctor Howard Dale in the SCC. Dale creates the works through the lost wax method, making pieces that reflect his love of family, medicine, hunting, nature and his Christian faith. The exhibit closes on March 29. A few days later, the poetry and paintings of Hilda Hatlen will be on display. Hatlen, the daughter of Norwegian immigrants, published her first book of poems in 1947 and her most recent volume in 1994 at the age of 86. She taught herself oil painting when she was 58, and also does scratchboard art, charcoal drawings and acrylic painting. In both writing and art, her works reflect her Norwegian heritage. Her works will be exhibited April 3-13. The SCC is open 1-4 pm Sunday and 11 am-3 pm Tuesday and Wednesday.

Through art, spoken word and song, a two-day conference at PLU will explore "The Politics of Language and Identity in the Americas." The conference, part of the Americas Semester at PLU, will take place on April 3 and 4.

Art: The conference begins with an exhibition of the works of renowned Peruvian artisan Nicario Jiménez Quispe, master of the retablo -- a brightly painted wooden box with three-dimensional figures of everyday life of indigenous people. Quispe's works particularly touch on social issues, from migration to drug trafficking. The exhibition is open 9 am-5 pm on April 3 and 4 in the SCC. Jiménez Quispe will also present the talk "Art and Cultural Resistance in Peru" at 6:30 pm on April 3 in the Regency Room. Free.

Music: From a variety of traditions come a host of performers to present "Music at the Crossroads in the Americas" at 8 pm on April 3 in Lagerquist. Native American flutist **Gary Stroutsos** and Native Heart will play music inspired by Lakota songs and culture.

Expression Latina, Seattle's most renowned salsa band, will perform authentic, full-bodied music of Puerto Rico, Cuba, the Dominican Republic and other Central and South American countries. The Andean folk troupe Almandina and the Islanders Steel Drum Troubadors will also play. Tickets are \$5 for adults and \$3 for students and are available at the UC Info Desk.

Lectures and Presentations:

9 am, Scandinavian Cultural Center
Focus presentations followed by panel discussions will examine the role that language and culture play in shaping social, political and economic reality in the Americas. The presentations begin at 9 am in the SCC, and include "The Politics of Linguistic Borders in the US -- The Spanish-English Issue" with Bonnie Urciuoli of Hamilton College, "Language, Ideology and Nationalism in Franáophone Canada" with Monica Heller of Ontario Institute for Studies in Education, and "Indigenismo and Self-Representation in Latin America: Myth and Reality" with Mercedes Nino-Murcia of the University of Iowa. Free.

Note: The Spring 1997 issue of "Pacific Lutheran Scene" -- due in mailboxes soon -- indicates a \$35 fee for the conference. The fee applies only to members of the Northwest International Education Association. Except for the concert, the conference is free for both PLU community members and the public.
