Next week the political battles centering around next year's student body officers will be brought to a close and campaign managers will shake hands with a "may the best man win" attitude and enter the polls to vote for their favorite candidates.

In the meantime the candidates will be measured and weighed by interested student voters who want to know if the official garb will fit them. Have YOU been conscientiously studying the list of candidates? What's your choice of leaders to fill the cabinet members' shoes? Every man has a right to his own opinion—that's free. But woe to the person who doesn't have one!

While we're on the subject of voting, the question of ad ing a new student body constitution arises. At the last student body meeting President Larsgaard appointed a committee to draw up a new constitution and present it at the next meeting for approval prior to placing it on the ballot.

To the casual observer, this move may appear to be high pressure tactics, or at least a hasty measure this near the close of the school year. However, the majority of the reform points involved have already been hashed over. The new constitution drawn up by student forum committee and recommended as a guide for the student body committee has gone through the test of student criticism, recommendation, and revision at two regular "town hall" meetings.

When the new constitution is drawn up by the student body committee, it will probably not be an air-tight or "airless" set of governing rules. A scrutinizing look at the final copy "ayeing" its adoption will diminish the possibility of error
