WARENSKJOLD CONCERT OPENS SCANDINAVIAN
ARTS FESTIVAL

Dorothy Warenskjold, hailed by the critics as "one of the most accomplished lyric sopranos of this or any generation," will appear in concert next Friday, April 22, at 8:15 p.m. in Eastvold Chapel auditorium.

The concert will open the Scandinavian Arts Festival, a highlight of PLU's 75th An iversary Year celebration.

Each season, Miss Warenskjold is in demand for starring roles with such leading opera companies as those of Chicago, Cincinnati, Washington, New Orleans, San Francisco and Pittsburgh. Everywhere, critics enthusiastically praise her artistry and characterizations of more than a dozen leading operatic roles.

Notwithstanding her tremendous success in opera, Dorothy Warenskjold considers herself to be primarily a concert artist. Since her first transcontinental tour, she has become a favorite with audiences throughout the United States and Canada, and her concert season is always booked solid months in advance.

Familiar to concert, opera, radio and television audiences, Miss Warenskjold has also made numerous records. Among her recordings are selections from the Student Prince with Gordon MacRae, a solo album of "Songs of Grieg and Dvorak" and "On Wings of Song."

She started her career with the dream of becoming a trial lawyer. She was a junior in pre-legal training at Mills College, Calif., when she began vocal instruction with Mme. Mabel Riegelman of San Francisco. After her graduation, demands of local music lovers kept her so busy with singing engagements that she put aside her hopes of (continued on page 3)

VIOLINIST SIDNEY HARTH TO APPEAR IN ARTIST SERIES CONCERT SATURDAY

Sidney Harth, one of America's most brilliant violinists, will appear in concer Saturday at 8:15 p.m. in Eastvold Chapel auditorium as part of the Associated Students Artist Series.

Harth combines a career as head of the department of music at Carnegie Institute of Technology in Pittsburgh with tours in the United States and abroad. He is the Andrew Mellon Professor of Music appointee, a permanently endowed chair.

The first American to place in the finals of Poland's Wieniawski competition, he has been acclaimed by critics for his maturity, imagination and individuality.

Before coming to Pittsburgh, Harth was concertmaster of the Chicago Symphony and conductor of the Evanston Symphony as well as leader of the Free Concerts
Foundation String Quartet and associate professor of violin at DePaul University.

From 1953-58 he was assistant conductor of the Louisville Symphony, leader of the Louisville String Quartet and chairman of the Department of Strings of the University of Louisville School of Music.

Harth has served as concertmaster of the famed Casals Festival in Puerto Rico, as concertmaster of the Peninsula Festival in Wisconsin, as conductor of the National Canadian Youth Symphony and as faculty member of the Aspen Music Festival.

ASPLU EXPRESSION SERIES FEATURES "T EKKING THE TIBETAN BORDER"

"Trekking the Tibetan Border," one of the rarest adventure films ever made, will be presented as part of the Associated Students Expression Series Monday, April 18, at 8 p.m. in the Eastvold Chapel auditorium.

Earl Brink, who has visited some 108 countries and island groups, will narrate the color film, telling of his experiences along the 2500 mile border where Red China and supperssion are on one side, India and freedom on the other.

Highlights of the film include a Republic Day parade in Delhi; the "Arabian Nights Country" of Peshawar; Keylong, where people literally live in the clouds; Hunzas, called the healthiest spot in the world; the cosmopolitan city of Darjeeling where residents must know five languages; and a great processional in honor of the birth of Buddha.

SCHOOL OF NURSING FACULTY SLATE IMPROVEMENT CONFERENCES

The School of Nursing faculty has scheduled too programs for faculty improvement.

A one day workshop on student counselling will be held Saturday under the leadership of Miss Barbara Oblinger, psychologist with the Tacoma Public Schools.

Beginning next Tuesday, the faculty will meet at 4:30 p.m. weekly for the balance of the school year to study and experience group process. Dr. Nicholas A. Godfroy, Tacoma psychiatrist, will direct the sessions.

A workshop is also planned in early summer or fall, dealing with mental health component in the curriculum. Dr. Catherine M. Norris of the University of Mexico will serve as consultant during the weeklong program.

These workshops and conferences are financed through the mental health grant which the University received in 1964 for a five-year period.
