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DR. WIEGMAN TESTIFIES ON
BEHALF OF TEACHER CORPS

Full Congressional support of the Teacher Corps program was urged by Dr. Eugene Wiegman, PLU president, in a statement before the Senate appropriations subcommittee in Washington, D.C., Thursday.

Dr. Wiegman's testimony came as a result of the deletion of the Teacher Corps as a federal budget line item for the first time in the program's history. The action was taken by the House Appropriations Committee on the Office of Education appropriation for Fiscal Year 1971.

"A program this important must be given budget identity," Wiegman testified.

"The Teacher Corps is a Federal program that is successful," he added. "But if it is to continue to work - and if it is to be able to carry out the new responsibilities that the Congress has given it - then it must have your support," he told the senators.

PLU RECEIVES NSF GRANT FOR
SECONDARY SCIENCE, MATH INSTITUTES

Opportunities for nearly 16,000 secondary school teachers and supervisors of science and mathematics to obtain supplemental training during the 1970-71 school year will be made available under National Science Foundation grants.

The grants, totaling \$4.5 million, will support 337 in-service institutes, conducted by universities and colleges in 48 states, District of Columbia and Puerto Rico.

The institutes offer part-time instruction in science and mathematics during the academic year so teachers may participate while still carrying on their classroom duties.

PLU's grant totals \$11,014 for 1970-71, and the NSF's intention is to renew the grant the following two years.

Project director at PLU is Dr. John Herzog, mathematics.

LUTE THINCLADS WIN FOURTH
DUAL MEET

The upcoming Northwest Conference Track and Field Championships at PLU May 1-2 continued to shape up as a blue ribbon clash between the Lutes and Lewis and Clark following PLU's 119 1/2 - 25 1/2 victory over Linfield Saturday at Spanaway.

The Lutes won 16 of 17 events and swept three enroute to their fourth straight conference dual meet victory.

Before the Linfield meet PLU held the top conference marks in six events. Saturday they grabbed another with freshman John Oberg's school record 56.1 clocking in the 440 IH. The mile relay team knocked 2.3 seconds off its conference-leading time with a 3:28.4 mark.

Freshman Dan Pritchard tossed the shot 49-8 to break his own school mark again and move into second in the conference. Frank Wilson's 52.5 in the 440 moved into second in the conference. Frank

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LUTE DIAMOND SQUAD KEEPS
TRYING BUT WINS ELUSIVE

PLU's baseball squad sought in vain for its first victory again this week, dropping contests to Linfield (2), Lewis and Clark and Willamette.

The Lutes put on their best offensive show of the season against the Pioneers, only to succumb when the visitors drove across two runs in the top of the eighth to win 9-7.

After being bombed by Linfield 10-2 in the opening game of Friday's double header, the Lutes got a fine pitching effort from Gordy Gunderson but lost 3-2. A bases-loaded rally in the seventh almost gave the Lutes their first victory of the season.

Saturday the Willamette Bearcats scored early and held off a seventh inning four-run PLU rally to win 6-4.

Phil Lavik and Ron Toff are the Lutes leading hitters at .296. Kyle Hopstad holds the RBI lead with five, and Doug Nixon is the team's leading hurler with a 2.07 e.r.a.

Tuesday the Lutes play Whitman and College of Idaho and Wednesday is a contest with Western Washington. All games are at home. Next Saturday and Monday the squad plays at Whitman and College of Idaho.

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NETTERS SPLIT

PLU netters split two matches last week to give them a 4-1 mark to date in conference competition and a 4-3 mark overall.

The Lutes edged past Whitman 5-4 before losing to University of Puget Sound 7-2.

At this point in the season PLU's top two seeded players have 4-2 marks, number five man Dave Anderson is 5-1, and number six man Rich Leake is 3-0 in singles play.

OCE NOSES OUT
PLU IN CLASSIC

Oregon College of Education gained 10 points on PLU in the finale of the Northwest Small College Golf Classic Saturday to defeat the Lutes by four points, 1859-1863.

PLU led by six strokes over OCE after the first five rounds of the Classic, but the defending champs hit an off day during play at the Salem Golf Club.
