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Arbaugh Authors Book with Father On Kierkegaard

A Pacific Lutheran University professor and his father who were concerned about the need for a comprehensive treatment of the writings of Soren Kierkegaard have authored a book on the subject.

Dr. George E. Arbaugh, chairman of PLU's philosophy department, and his father, Dr. George B. Arbaugh, chairman of the division of religion and philosophy at Augustana (Ill.) College; recently completed the writing for "Kierkegaard's Authorship."

"We got the idea of writing such a book," said the younger Arbaugh, "when we realized that there was a gap in the literature and an obvious need for such a work." Scholars over the years, he said, have translated and commented on most of the popular Danish philosopher's writings, but no one had done a comprehensive, systematic intro-

duction to his literature.

The PLU professor said that the 430-page volume reviews the total writings of Kierkegaard, and serves as a critical introduction and guide for students.

The book was printed in Great Britain, and it is jointly published by the Augustana College Library and the London publishing house of Allen and Unwin. The Augustana Library has the American rights, and the London firm has the European rights.

Dr. Arbaugh said he and his father spent about two years writing the book. He is the ninth PLU faculty member to write a book.

A Pacific Lutheran University faculty member is one of 50 philosophy professors from across the nation selected to participate at a summer Conference in Metaphysics, announced President Robert Mortvedt.

Dr. Curtis Huber, professor of philosophy, received a grant from the Carnegie Corporation of New York to attend the Conference sponsored by the Council of Philosophical Studies.

The sessions will be located this year at Southampton College of Long Island University in Southampton, New York. They run from June 24 through August 2.

"The invitation to Dr. Huber to Participate in the Conference is a high tribute to him personally, as well as a credit to the University," said Dr. Mortvedt. "His already clearly acknowledged excellence as a teacher should be enhanced by the rich experience promised by the Conference."

The purpose of the summer institute is to benefit scholarship and teaching in philosophy by enabling faculty members to come in close contact with scholars in their field.

Study on Flow of Blood Feature of Guest Talk

A lecture on "Radiotelemetry studies of blood flow and pressure in free ranging animals" will be given to interested persons at 8 p.m., Wednesday, in Xavier Hall.

Dr. R. L. Van Citters, professor of physiology and biophysics at the school of medicine at the University of Washington, will be the speaker.

He recently made a study of the physiology of baboons in their native habitat in Kenya.

During the six-week period Dr. Huber will attend daily lectures and seminars taught by eight of the world's leading authorities on the metaphysical phase of philosophy.

An ordained minister, Dr. Huber received his bachelor of divinity degree and his bachelor of arts degree from Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Mo. He earned both his advanced degrees at the the University of Wisconsin.

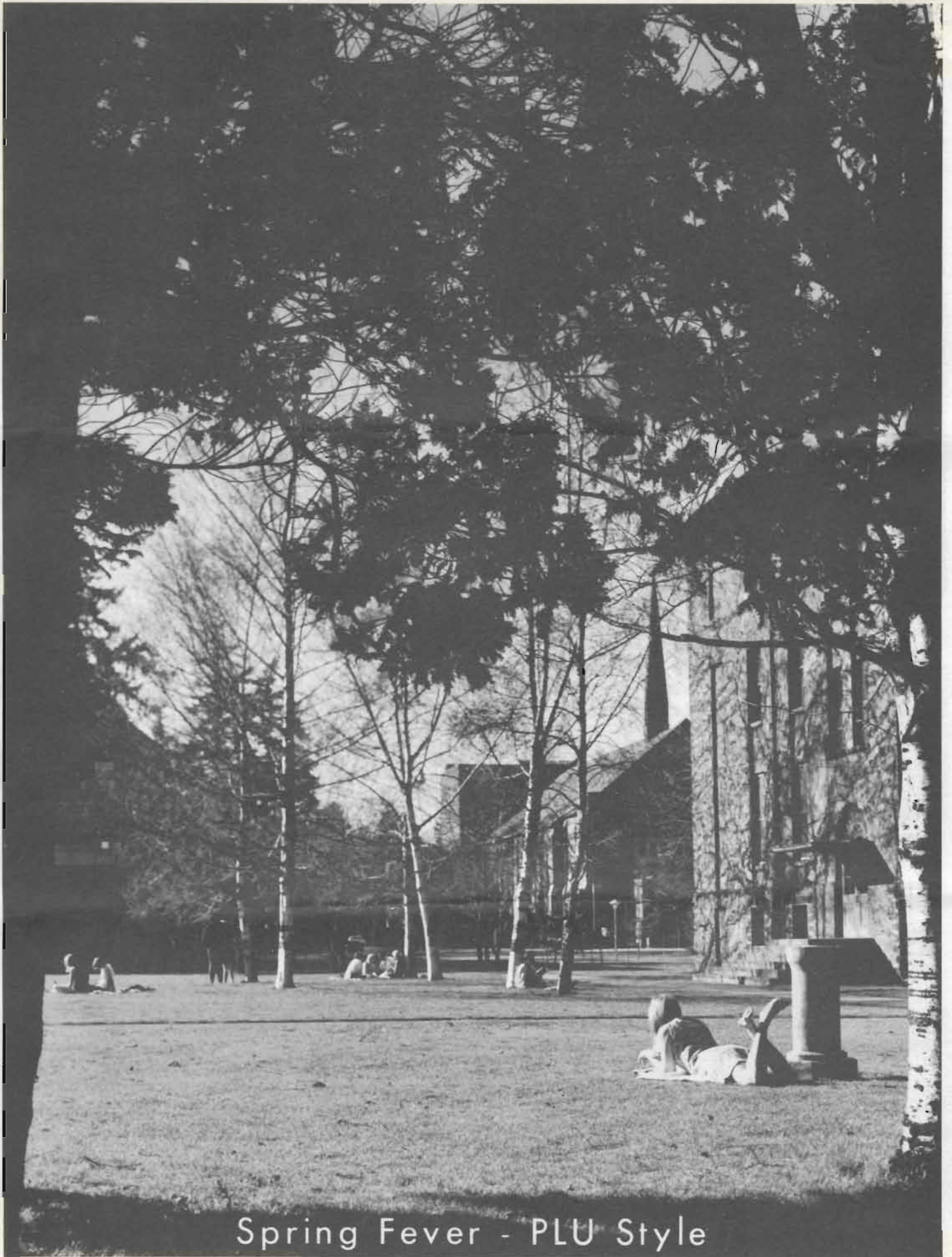
Crew members will treat their Dads to a ride on Lake Washington, and a sneak preview of their sons' racing form that will be used this spring.
