RETIRING FACULTY

Mrs. Irene Creso, associate professor of biology, and Dr. Arnold Hagen, professor of education, will be honored at a faculty retirement dinner Thursday, April 29.

The event will be held in Chris Knutzen Hall in the new University Center at 6 p.m. Special entertainment will be provided by the Ambassador Quartet.

Every member of the University family is welcome, including emeriti, alumni and friends of the institution. Tickets (\$3 per person) are on sale at the Information Desk and must be purchased today (April 23). Tickets will NOT be sold at the door.

Dr. Hagen, currently completing his 17th year at PLU, is a native of North Dakota. He is a 1931 graduate of Concordia College, Moorhead, Minn., and received his graduate degrees at the University of Montana and the University of Oregon.

Mrs. Creso taught at PLU for six years in the early '50's and then returned to the campus in 1966. Between tenures here she served as a curator of the Museum of Natural History at the University of Puget Sound.

A native of Seattle, she received her bachelor's and master's degrees from UPS. She has also studied at the University of Washington School of Oceanography.

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Dr. Jo Eleanor Elliott, former president of the American Nurses' Association and currently director of nursing programs for the Western Interstate Council for Higher Education, will be the featured speaker at the 20th anniversary celebration of the PLU School of Nursing Saturday, May 1.

Nursing alums from around the country have been invited to attend the day-long celebration, as have nursing administrators from hospitals and health service agencies in the Tacoma area.

Activities begin at 10 a.m. in Xavier Hall (Old Library) with an up-to-the-minute discussion of the nursing program emphasizing the celebration theme, "Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow."

Following a 1:00 luncheon a meeting will be held to discuss the possibility of formation of a nursing alumnae organization. The remainder of the afternoon is free time for the visitors.

Dr. Elliott is featured at a 5:30 p.m. banquet to which husbands are invited. Former and current nursing faculty will be on hand. The May Festival begins at 8 p.m. the same evening in Olson Auditorium.

FEATURED IN
LECTURE-RECITAL
AT PLU

A lecture-recital featuring Fredrick Newnham of Pacific Lutheran University and Dr. Bryan Gooch of the University of Victoria will be held in Jacob Samuelson Auditorium at PLU Tuesday, April 27, at 8 p.m.

Topic of Dr. Gooch's lecture is "Harmonious Sisters: Elizabethan Secular Vocal Music." He will deal with both literary and musical aspects of the madrigal and the ayre, and several examples of the latter will be sung by baritone Newnham with Gooch at the piano.

Among them will be works by Thomas Campion, John Dowland, Thomas Ford, Tobias Hume and Philip Rosseter.

Dr. Gooch, a member of the University of Victoria English Department and Master of Lansdowne College, is also well-known as a pianist, harpsicordist and conductor. He has performed in many chamber music concerts in Canada and England and is frequently heard on Canadian Broadcasting Corporation broadcasts.

He has also directed the University of London Opera Group and Gilbert and Sullivan Society.

Professor Newnham, professor emeritus and lecturer in music at PLU, has been well-known to Tacoma and Northwest audiences for many years. He received his musical training at the Royal Academy of Music in London.

She is nationally known as a lecturer and writer; founded the P.T.A. sponsored program, "Let's Pretend With

the Fours and Fives" in public libraries of King County; moderated the KCTS-TV series on creative education; was Washington State Delegate to the 1960 White House Conference on Children and Youth; and was Delta Zeta Woman of the Year in 1967.

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STUDENTS TO PRESENT
FOLK MUSICAL
NEXT MONDAY

The folk musical "Tell It Like It Is" will be performed on campus by a group of 40 PLU students and area young people this Monday night at 8 p.m. in Eastvold Auditorium.

Composed by Ralph Carmichael and Kurt Kaiser, the musical consists of 21 songs which tell about God, "who He is, how He reveals Himself, what He is like, and some of the problems that confront us when we believe in Him."

From its planning stages the production has been entirely a student effort. PLU freshman Dave Statton organized it and arranged the choreography, while Steve Estes, a senior music major, directs the singing.

Judy Hansen, PLU sophomore, plays the piano; Ron Baur, a semi-professional drummer from Seattle, provides the percussion; freshman Diane Gormley plays bass violin; and Chris Frasier from Fort Lewis plays the guitar.

The group has averaged seven hours of practice weekly since it first met in early January.

Several performances in Seattle-Tacoma area churches are scheduled: April 25, 4 p.m. at the Berean Presbyterian Church in Lakewood; April 31, 7:30 p.m. at the First Lutheran Church in Seattle; May 1, 7:30 p.m. at the South Tacoma Christian Church; and May 2, 4 p.m. at the Messiah Lutheran Church in Auburn.

Tentative engagements are also planned at Burlington, Auburn, and the Fort Lewis Main Post Chapel.
