## Extend G.I. Bill For Veterans

Any veteran who has initiated his course of education, whose progress in such course is satisfactory, and who is prevented by reason of re-entrance into the active service from resuming education before July 25, 1951, or the date four years subsequent to his discharge will be permitted to resume education within a reasonable period following his release from active service.

The notice also stated that the termination date of the G. I. Bill, July 25, 1956, will be extended by Congressional action to provide opportunity for veterans now on active duty in the present emergency to complete their G. I. benefits and to provide opportunity also for those in the armed forces.

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# GLAD TIDINGS

## HOMECOMING RECORD

The big Homecoming clash between the power-laden Western Washington and the surprising Gladiators will be nothing new to Lute football fans. Saturday will mark the fifth time since 1934 the Glads have drawn the Vikings as their Homecoming opponent. They have come out on top twice, lost once and tied one contest.

In 1934, the inaugural Homecoming affair, the final score read more like a baseball score—Lutes 5, Vikings 3. PLC trailed 4-2 when Bucky O'Connor split the uprights for a perfect field goal and a Glad triumph. Being the depression period, Coach Olson initiated a new admission system. Five thousand people were admitted free, and at half time gave whatever they could when the list was turned.

It wasn't until 1938 that the two squads met again. This was the year that the Vike had what is considered the best outfit Western has fielded. The Lute alumni went home with a 5-14 score, in favor of WWCE, ringing in their ears.

Both teams displayed good, sound football in 1942, the last season until 1946, and the lute had to be content with a 7-7 draw.

On a field that would have been more suitable for a water polo contest, the Lutes and Vike renewed their Homecoming rivalry in 1947. Western was literally swamped 23 by the Glads, 6-0.

Beginning in 1934 a very commendable Homecoming record of 8 wins, 2 defeats and two ties is held by the Lutes, and one more victory certainly won't harm that record.

Coach Tommervik has added strength and spirit at the tackle slots in two fresh boys who really performed well in the Whitworth game, Bill Tuller and Bill Waddell. . . . A hearty congratulation goes out from this office to a top-flight Homecoming committee for spreading the Mid-Century theme throughout the campus. . . . Before I go any further I would like to apologize to Myron Kettler for a mistake made last week. I said that ex-coach Cliff Olson had been filming the Lute games; however, Olson is official scout and Kettler movie-taker. . . . A blow to Whitworth's chances this season is the loss of Sam Adams, who re-injured his back while warming up for the PLC encounter. . . . Equally disastrous is CPS's indefinite loss of Art Viafore, Logan's signal-caller. . . . In closing this week's session, here are my quick picks: Eastern 14, CPS 13; St. Martin's 7, Whitworth 6; Western 12, PLC 7; and Central 21, OCE 0.

## Gladiators Edge Pirates, 13 to 7, In Tight Game

Completely outplayed during the first three quarters, the PLC Glads staged a story-book comeback in the final four minutes of play to nudge the Whitworth Pirates in a 13 to 7 thriller at Spokane, last Saturday.

The first three periods went scoreless for both teams, though the Reds had a couple of scoring opportunities, one in the second stanza on a blocked punt and again in the third when the Pirates roamed from their own 47 to the Lute five; but there they were held on downs.

The Whites picked up the first touchdown of the day on the second play of the final period. Del Schlabach boomed over from the PLC two-yard stripe to climax a drive of 41 yards.

With only four minutes of play remaining and Harry Malnes supplying the spark, the Lutes marched from behind to take the verdict. The Glads first scoring thrust started after two series of plays following the Whitworth kick-off, and they ate up 70 yards in 11 downs. It was via the airflanes that the locals began to move, with Frank Karwoski doing most of the throwing.

With a first down on the Whit 11, Malnes broke through to the two and crossed into pay dirt for the Lutes' first TD. Dick Barclay kicked the conversion and the game was tied with three and one-half minutes remaining.

When Western Washington coach Chuck Lappenbusch brings his bone-crushing Vikings to Lincoln Bowl for PLC's annual Homecoming game, you can wager your last tax token that the northerners will be out to send the Lute alumni home disappointed.

These fellows are no mere boys. The Western line need not take a back seat to anyone. At the flanks, the Lutes will have to meet Hal Kloes, who starts on both the offensive and defensive brigade; Walt Ewing, a huge senior from Edmonds, and Art Svidran, who received Little All-Crest honors in 1948. WWCE is also loaded with tremendous tackles: Bill Anastou, weighing in at 235 pounds; followed by Artis Larsson, 230; Al Cornell, Roy Peterson, and Carl Kichardt at 220; while Bill Smedal and Vern Weible are the "little fellows" who reach a mere 210 pounds apiece. As though that were not enough, the guards, too, bring smiles to Mr. Lappenbusch's face, especially Al Crompton, two-year letterman, and Duane Lamborn, Little All-American at Everett Junior College in 1948, not to mention a flock of sturdy freshmen. Holding down the pivot spot is All-Conference Center Jack Frazier, who is capable of handling both linebacking and offensive center duties.

The backfield from the Bellingham college looks very awesome, indeed, being led by fullback Norin Hauli, who was chosen All-Northwest college back, and Tommy Taylor, southpaw passing sensation.

Coming from Seattle, Hal played ball for Ballard high school and one season with the Ballard Boys' Club.

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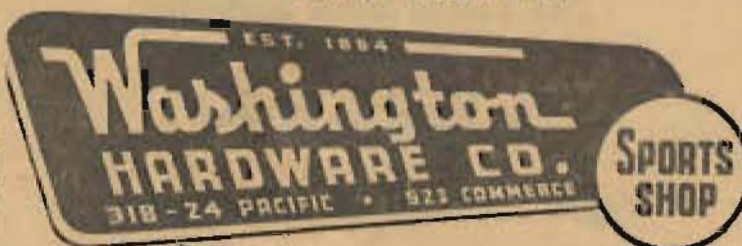
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## Air Force Officer Training Careers To Be Explained October 30 at Old Main

Opportunities for a career as an officer in the U. S. Air Force will be explained to PLC students on Monday, October 30, in Old Main.

A team composed of Lt. Bill Mauldin and Lt. Loyd Hightower will interview students and give examinations to applicants for Aviation Cadet training. Students who qualify will have their papers processed so they will be ready to begin training with the Air Force after they finish college.

There are three types of Air Corps training available: Aviation Cadet Pilot training, Aviation Cadet Navigator training, and Air Force Officer Candidate school.

Young men selected as aviation cadets receive one year of flying, academic and military training; and graduates are commissioned as Second Lieutenants in the Air Force and awarded the silver wings of a pilot. To be eligible for pilot training, men must be single, between the ages of 20 and 26½, citizens, must have com-

pleted two years or more of college, and have high physical and moral qualifications. Classes begin every six weeks.

To meet an increasing need for navigators, the Air Force has opened an aviation cadet navigator school in Houston, Texas. Qualified applicants are trained for one year in the latest techniques of radar navigation and graduates receive reserve commissions as Second Lieutenants with aeronautical rating as navigator. Classes begin every month.

Young men and women seeking non-flying careers in the Air Force receive military leadership training at Lackland Base near San Antonio, Texas. Classes begin in January, April, July and October. Applicants must be between the ages of 20½ and 26½, either married or single, citizens, must have completed two years of college and have high moral and personal qualifications.

To be eligible for deferment (2A classification), students must be in the upper 50 percent of their class and must notify their local draft board of this status before receiving their call to report for a physical, according to Dean Philip E. Hauge.

In case of deferment, the individual is reclassified into 2A. Other students who are not in the upper 50 percent will have their induction postponed upon request until the end of the school year.

Dean Hauge urges all students to inquire about draft deferral letters immediately.
