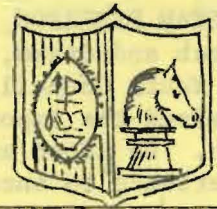

BAND LEAVES SATURDAY ON 9-DAY CONCERT TOUR

Saturday afternoon our jovial band director, Gordon O. Gilbertson, will bundle his 52 musicians into two Greyhound buses and head south on a nine-day concert tour. The colorful director, now in his 10th year at the helm, will take the band to 11 cities in Washington and Oregon.

First stop will be in Woodland where a concert is slated for Saturday night at 8 p.m.

The balance of the tour includes engagements as follows: Nov. 24, Florence, Ore. (afternoon), Coos Bay (evening); Nov. 25, Roseburg; Nov. 26, Medford; Nov. 27, Grants Pass; Nov. 28, Springfield; Nov. 29, Salem; Nov. 30, Oregon City; Dec. 1, Canby (afternoon), Lake Oswego (evening).

Following the concert in Lake Oswego the touring group will return home that evening.

The annual homecoming concert is slated for Wednesday evening, Dec. 4, at 8 o'clock in Eastvold Chapel. This will be complimentary to the public, so come out and bring the whole family.

Traveling with the band as tour manager will be Milton Nesvig, director of public relations.

Several PLU alumni are in charge of the concerts. They include: William Pflueger (Woodland), Rev. Robert Randoy (Florence); Rev. Delbert Zier (Coos Bay), Rev. Vernon Hanson (Medford), Dorothy Skilbred Carlson (Springfield), Rev. Donald Reese (Salem), David Gaenicke (Oregon City).

DR. PAUL POPENOE TO INAUGURATE PLU SOCIAL LIFE SERIES

Dr. Paul Popenoe, renowned authority on love and marriage, will be the lecturer for the first annual Social Life Series which will be inaugurated on campus next Tuesday (Nov. 25).

At the convocation at 9:50 a.m. in Eastvold Chapel, Dr. Popenoe will speak on "New Principles in Family Counseling." At 3:30 p.m. he will conduct a lecture and discussion on the subject, "Practical Techniques of Family Counseling." The 8:00 p.m. lecture and discussion will be on the topic, "Working Toward a Successful Marriage."

Dean E. C. Knorr, chairman for the event, states that the afternoon and evening sessions are open to everyone, and there is no admission charge.

Dr. Popenoe is founder and administrator of the American Institute of Family Relations in Los Angeles. He has written several books on family life, has a syndicated newspaper column, a daily radio broadcast and edits a bulletin.

FOLKSINGER RICHARD DYER-BENNET TO APPEAR HERE TUESDAY, DEC. 3

Richard Dyer-Bennet, one of the nations foremost folksingers, will appear here Tuesday evening, Dec. 3, at 8:15 o'clock in Eastvold Chapel. This will be an attraction of the Student Artist Series. If you do not have a series ticket, individual admission will be \$2.00.

A native of England, Dyer-Bennet was reared and education in the United States. He made his Town Hall (New York) debut in 1944 and has been playing to packed houses ever since.

Songs which he will sing here will come from England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, Sweden, Austria, Germany, Italy, Spain, France and the U.S. Some are folk songs, others art songs. He will accompany himself on the guitar.

HOW'S YOUR ARM FEELING? TIME FOR SECOND FLU SHOT

The second injection of flu vaccine will be given Dec. 3, 4, 5, and 6 from 10:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. to students, faculty and administrative staff, secretarial staff, food service, and maintenance staff members. Personnel who have completed the series the previous year and failed to get a booster this September may get one at this time.

The cost of the vaccine is \$1.50 for Booster I and \$3.00 for Series II. The University will assume the balance of the cost and administration of the vaccine. The cost per individual will be deducted from the payroll.

Vaccine WILL NOT be given except on above dates.
