

Anderson Wins; Prexy Run-off Forced

Record Breaking Turnout; 1023 Voters Flock to Polls

With a total vote of 1023, the largest turnout of voters in ASPLU history yesterday selected Joe Asbjør and Mike Cullum as candidates for today's run-off election.

Trygve Anderson will serve as the new first vice-president. He was elected yesterday by a substantial margin over his opponent Dale Tuvey. The vice-presidential vote was 578 to 400.

The leading write-in candidate for the office of president, Jim Feck, polled enough votes to force a run-off election today. According to the ASPLU Constitution, a run-off election must be held within two days of the previous election. Votes will continue today until 1:00 p.m.

Terry Oliver was the only candidate to win by a landslide. He will hold down the position of second vice-president. Chuck Brenner won the treasurer spot, receiving 400 votes for the office.

Lynne Nelson polled 536 votes to top her opponent, Andrea Tilton.

Miss Nelson will serve as the new ASPLU secretary.

The various amendments before the voters all passed by wide margins.

The nominating convention appears to have served as an accurate thermometer of the election results.

Campaigning for the office of student body president has never been more strenuous than this year.

Convention Inspires Vigorous Politics

In a heart-stopping climax to the first PLU nominating convention, Joe Asbjør edged past Jim Feck by one vote to join Mike Cullum as a finalist in the presidential race. While Cullum won with 369 votes, Asbjør received 341 votes to Feck's 292. The incredibly close vote terminated the 1965 ASPLU nominating convention. West Hall, the last dele-

gation is vote, provided Asbjør with the majority vote. Feck, behind in the race, giving him 10 of 17 votes. The convention, which took place April 7 and 8, was held in Memorial Gymnasium. A keynote speech was delivered by C. Montgomery Johnson, chairman of the Republican party for the State of Washington. Johnson praised the students for their interest in governmental processes.

The convention's chairman was John Merrill, a former student leader at PLU.

In the first vice-president race between Trygve Anderson, Fred Baxter, Earl Ecklund, and Dale Tuvey, Ecklund was eliminated on the first ballot. On the second ballot, Anderson received 578 votes, Baxter 57, and Tuvey 66. Baxter was eliminated, leaving Anderson and Tuvey in the finals.

After the election, second vice-president, Terry Oliver received 812 votes and Farrand Robson 179. Both names were on the final ballot.

Evergreen Center voted to elect a unanimous ballot for Chuck Brenner for the office of treasurer. He had been nominated Friday by Tim Stone of Evergreen and ran unopposed.

For ASPLU secretary, Lynne Nelson, nominated by Bill Collins of Evergreen, had 536 votes. Andrea Tilton, who was the first candidate of the convention to be nominated, received 445 votes. She was nominated on Friday by Peter Quam of Ivy.

All the nomination speeches were followed by demonstrations. The uninhibited gusto with which "apathetic" PLU students participated served as a decided asset, as a barometer of student interest in the convention.

Campus to Host Pi Kappa Delta

Over 700 college debaters from across the nation will arrive on campus Saturday and Sunday as PLU hosts the 24th National Convention of Pi Kappa Delta, national speech honorary.

Registration for the 132 schools represented will take place through Sunday, April 11. Actual forensic participation and convention business meetings begin Monday. The talking travelers will head home Friday morning.

The events include debate, discussion, oratory and extemporaneous speaking. Debaters will be quarantined off on the topic, "Resolved: That the Federal Government should establish a national program of public work to reduce unemployment." Speakers in discussion will be concerned with the problem of poverty in the United States.

The students will be attending speeches and other activities planned for them. On Wednesday, "See the Great Northwest Day" has been planned with a trip out in the Sound for a salmon-bake.

On Thursday night the convention will close with a banquet at which the newly elected officers will be installed and awards of the year presented will be announced. Highlights of the Thursday afternoon banquet will be a speech given by Washington's Senator Henry M. Jackson (Dem.). Jackson will travel from Washington, D. C., for the event.

The local Pi Kappa Delta chapter is under the direction of Theodore Karl, instructor of speech, and Linda Grill, president of the local chapter.

They have been working since last spring on the convention. Paul Steen, local convention chairman, has made all the necessary arrangements for the invading speechmakers.

Ruth Sjoberg, a Social French major, is one of two student representatives to the National Council of Pi Kappa Delta and has been working since her election last spring with Professor Karl, also of the National Council, and with the other representative, Warren Derbridge, from Idaho State University. Ruth expressed her

appreciation to the Administration, faculty and students of PLU, stating that "without the cooperation of the University we could not have hosted our convention. We realize we have caused personal inconvenience but wish to thank all for their willingness to cooperate despite the inconvenience."

PLU Represented at Convention

Pacific Lutheran University will be represented at the forthcoming Pi Kappa Delta Convention by three women from the forensic world, Lynn Halden, Lynn SIM, and Kathy Simantel.

Miss Halden and Miss SIM will participate in Women's Oratory on the topic, "Previously this year they have made the first-place trophy at Western Speech Association, second place at University of Oregon and first place at UPS."

Miss Simantel is entered in Extemporaneous Speaking and Oratory. Although only a freshman, she has won three trophies this year. At the University of Oregon she won first in Extemporaneous Speaking, and at the University of Washington she took second in Extemporaneous and Expository Speaking.

Miss Halden will be in an individual event at this tournament. Her record this year, however, is impressive. She has won two firsts and two seconds in Impromptu and Topical and a second in Extemporaneous. She has also taken a first in Lincoln-Douglas

debate and second in After Dinner Speaking.

Miss SIM will participate in Oratory. She placed first at UPS and second at the University of Oregon in this event. She has also taken a first, a second and a third in Extemporaneous Speaking.

Dorms to Compete at College Bowl

 "With Chief Justice of the United States served liquor," John Marshall... for 34 years" found like the College Bowl TV program. Not quite, but close. A college bowl program is being organized at PLU, according to Bob Eckhart, general chairman of the PLU college bowl committee.

The tournament will begin Wednesday, April 21, in the Kauten Fellowship Hall. Matches will be held for approximately a week and a half; the exact duration of the tournament has not yet been determined.

This program is designed to test the knowledge and quick-wittedness of the members of competing teams.

Questions will be over a variety of areas from science, the arts and history to current events.

PLU teams will be chosen by classes and classes will represent their respective groups. A team will consist of four members and one alternate. A total of 15 teams have been formed.

Each match during the tournament is 30 minutes long, divided into three periods: 15 minutes of questions and an answer, a five-minute break and the final 10 minutes of questions and answer. The team that answers the most questions correctly is awarded 10 points and has the opportunity to answer the final question which is worth 20 to 30 points.

The judge, hopefully a faculty member, according to Eckhart, will determine the accuracy of the answers.

The tournament will be divided into several divisions depending on the level of the participants. The first round and double-elimination tournament will be held on one team to 20. A schedule of the matches will be posted later. A team wins by accumulating more points than its opponent. Trophies will be awarded to the top three teams.

Eckhart said that he hopes the final match might be televised on KPLU TV, as well as the possible match between a student adviser team and a team made up of faculty members.

The tournament will only include PLU teams this year, but if sufficient interest is shown there will be interscholastic contests with teams from Central Washington, SPC, Western Washington and perhaps some other schools.

Moderators, time-keepers and scorers are needed for the tournament. Anyone interested in serving in these capacities should contact Bob Eckhart.

World Traveler to Present Films on Cuba and Germany

Robert Cohen, well-known lecturer and news correspondent, will appear on the PLU campus Friday, April 23, to present two of his color film documentaries on world trouble spots. Following the second film, Cohen will remain for a question and answer session.

"Inside Castro's Cuba," the only film-length documentary made by an American inside Cuba since Castro came to power, will run at 3:30

pm. This "Inside Red China" became the precedent for the other two films of his unprecedented trilogy. He has also completed assignments for the Associated Press and CBS-TV and his photo-stories have appeared in many publications in the United States and Europe.

"Inside Castro's Cuba" depicts the Cuban people, their leaders, and Russian and Chinese influence. Despite U. S. embargo, Cohen found Cuba "swimming" in oil.

Cohen's films and lecture commitments are based upon his own eye witness observation. He has served as a press correspondent for NATO and as a press officer for the U. S. Army. He was commissioned by the National Broadcasting Company to be the first U. S. citizen to film Red China.
