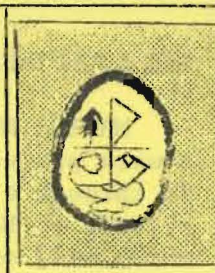

## KNIGHTS SEEK TACOMA COLLEGIATE CHAMPIONSHIP AT UPS SATURDAY

PLU will seek its first Tacoma collegiate championship since 1947 Saturday when the injury-ridden Knights encounter the University of Puget Sound at Baker Stadium. Kick-off time is 1:30 p.m.

Although it has shared the title with UPS on five occasions since then, PLU has not won the crown outright in the past 18 years.

The Knights, who again have earned at least a share of the title on their 23-7 win in an earlier meeting this year, have only won crowns outright three times since the series began in 1931. On the other hand, UPS has won 16 while sharing five.

PLU, which boasted a veteran backfield when the season began, lost its third starting backfield man last Saturday when halfback Morris Blankenbaker suffered a knee injury.

He will be replaced by sophomore Al Freutel, who only carried the ball nine times prior to last Saturday when he had to fill in for the injured Blankenbaker, the Knight's number two ground gainer.

Previously, PLU had lost their number one ground gainer Ken Tetz and NAIA All-American Les Rucker.

Expecting his defense to carry most of the load against the winless but thrice-tied Loggers, Coach Roy Carlson spent most of the week stressing defense in hopes that the defenders might provide the break needed in Saturday's outing.

Besides the city championship, PLU will be seeking the Young Men's Business Club Totem Trophy. The Knights won the trophy last year.

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## SAN PIETRO ORCHESTRA TO APPEAR IN CONCERT MONDAY EVENING

The San Pietro Orchestra of Naples, Italy, now on its fourth tour on the United States and Canada, will appear in concert Monday at 8:15 p.m. in the Eastvold Chapel auditorium as part of the Artist Series program.

The 20-piece chamber orchestra has been a hit since it was first introduced in 1950 and has gained acclaim from coast to coast. Critics have praised it for beauty of tone, superb expressivity and perfect sense of ensemble.

A large measure of this success must be attributed to Renato Ruotolo, founder and musical director of the orchestra. Himself a highly accomplished violinist, Ruotolo had played with the Scarlatti Orchestra and the Virtuosi di Roma, the latter from its inception.

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## PHYSICS DEPARTMENT RECEIVES GRANT TO CONDUCT RESEARCH

Pacific Lutheran University has been awarded a \$9,000 Frederick Gardner Cattrell grant by the Research Corporation to assist the research program in the department of physics, according to an announcement by Dr. Robert Mortvedt, PLU president.

The funds will be used to equip an ultra-high vacuum laboratory for studies in the general area of the physics of surfaces. Included in the laboratory will be equipment for mass spectral analysis of residual gases and reaction products of surface interactions.

Under the grant the fundamental aspects of the interaction of gases with ultra-clean metal surfaces and the related phenomenon of erosion of metals by ion bombardment and chemical interactions will be studied.

Dr. Sherman B. Nornes, associate professor of physics, will direct the research program. He plans to involve at least four physics students during each academic year with a similar group assisting with the research during the summer months.

This new program in physics provides a unique opportunity for undergraduates in physics at PLU by involving them in original problems of very current interests in the field of physics.

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## GLENN YARBROUGH CONCERT OPENS STUDENT EXPRESSION SERIES

Glenn Yarbrough, who gained national fame as a member of the Limelickers, will appear in concert Monday, Nov. 15 at 8 p.m. in Memorial Gymnasium at Pacific Lutheran Univ. as part of the PLU Associated Student's Expression Series.

A lyric tenor, Yarbrough has set out on his own to try and fill a long-vacant niche in the entertainment world. In the present entertainment world, Glenn is an original--a singer who is more concerned with a beautiful melody and the lyric content of a song than with the latest beat.

Although he has always been associated with the folk music field, he would prefer not to be branded as a folksinger. "I just try to do good songs," Explains Glenn. "I don't care where they come from. I'm grateful to folk music because it has made people aware of lyrics, it has made them really listen to a song. But now I want to branch out beyond the strict confines of folk music."

Among the albums he has recorded are "Time to Move On," "One More Round," "Come Share My Life" and "Baby the Rain Must Fall."

He has appeared on more than a dozen television shows during the past year as well as making personal appearances at colleges and universities and leading entertainment spots.
