New Student Registration and Advising

A \$200.00 advance payment is required to confirm an offer of admission. This advance payment is required before class registration. The payment is refundable until May 15 for fall, December 15 for January (J) term, and January 15 for spring. Requests for a refund must be made in writing to the Admissions Office.

- New freshman registration is by appointment and may not be done via Banner Web. Your adviser has the necessary alternate PIN to complete your registration. Information will be sent.
- New transfer students may begin to register via Banner Web on Monday, November 26, 2001. Information will be sent.
- New graduate students may begin to register on Wednesday, November 7, 2001 at the Student Services Center.
 Registration may not be done via Banner Web. Information will be sent.

Registration for Continuing Students – J-Term and Spring 2002

- All continuing students may register for J-Term and Spring semester during their appointment times unless there is a hold on your account. Please see page 10 for instructions on clearing holds prior to registration.
- Appointment time letters will be sent to all continuing students.
- Registration for J-Term and Spring semester is by appointment from Wednesday, November 7 through Tuesday, November 20, 2001.
- Fall 2001 credits do not count toward completed cumulative credits when appointment times are set.
- New transfer and new non-matriculated students may begin registering Monday, November 26, 2001.

Consequences of Not Attending First Two Class Meetings

Students who are unable to attend the first class meetings are expected to notify the instructor prior to the first class meeting. Students who miss the first two class meetings without prior arrangement risk being dropped from the class by the instructor; however, students still need to take responsibility for dropping courses they do not plan on attending.

PAYMENT INFORMATION

TUITION REFUND POLICY FOR WITHDRAWAL FROM A COURSE

If you withdraw from a course after the last day of add/drop, you waive your right to a tuition refund.

If a student does not wish to continue a course after the add/drop period, the student must withdraw from the course. Student must obtain the instructor's signature on an add/drop form and submit it to the Student Services Center. A \$50.00 administrative fee is charged for each transaction after the last day to add/drop.

REGISTERING BY BANNER WEB

Course registration for January term and for spring semester is as easy as accessing PLU's homepage at www.plu.edu for web registration.

Banner Web is available from 4:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. Sunday through Thursday, 4:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Friday, and 6:30 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. on Saturday. You may add (register for) or drop classes using Banner Web from the date and time of your initial appointment through the last day to add/drop (refer to the calendar on page 3 for add/drop dates). To access Banner Web, using the most current version of your Web browser, find the PLU homepage at www.plu.edu and select Online Services. From Online Services, select Banner Web. Then click on Login.

Web registration requires you to enter your student ID number and your PIN (personal identification number). Your initial PIN is your birth date. Example: The PIN for a person born June 16, 1978 is 061678. You may change your PIN at any time via Banner web. We strongly encourage you to change your PIN right away in order to prevent others from gaining unauthorized access to your registration.

BEFORE YOU BEGIN

New Students

Students who have never attended PLU and have not been formally admitted to the university are not eligible to register via Banner Web. New freshman students should go to the Admissions Office for assistance. Other new students should go to the Student Services Center for assistance.

New transfer students may begin to register via the web on Wednesday, Monday, November 26, 2001.

Registration Holds

Check to see if you have any holds <u>prior</u> to registration. Log in to Banner Web and click on Student Services and Financial Aid, then click on Student Records, and View Holds.

To clear a hold contact the following offices:

- Junior Review Holds Submit Junior Review paperwork to the Academic Advising Office
- Medical Holds Return your medical history form with proof of required immunization to the Health Center

Appointment Times

Each continuing undergraduate student will be assigned an appointment time according to total hours completed. Notification will be sent via mail to your campus or local address. If you do not live on campus, be sure that we have a current local address in our database. Verify your information by logging onto Banner Web then clicking Personal Information, and View Address(es) and Phone(s) or check with the Student Services Center to verify your address. If you do not receive a notification in the mail by the first day of registration, call the Registrar's Office at 253.535.7131 or the Student Services Center at 253.535.7161 to confirm your appointment time. Web registration is not available to graduate students. Graduate students should contact the Student Services Center or their graduate adviser for assistance.

Waitlisting cannot be done via Banner Web

Waitlisting courses must be done in person at the Student Services Center and is limited to two courses per semester. Waitlist forms are available on page 74 or in the Student Services Center. The waitlist form must be completed and submitted to a Student Services employee for processing. Waitlisting guarantees that the instructor will be informed that a student is interested and where the student is on the list. The Registrar's Office will move students (in waitlist order) from the waitlist into closed classes as seats become available until one week before the term begins, then the instructor determines who will be admitted to closed classes. Students still on the waitlist when the term begins must attend the first class and get the instructor's signature on a green add/drop form to grant them a place in the class. Faculty reserve the right to deny admission after the first week when initial sessions are irreplaceable. This form must be submitted to the Student Services Center before the deadline to add/drop courses. Students who are below third or fourth place on the list are strongly advised to register for a substitute course, as it is unlikely they will get into the waitlisted class.

Note: Do <u>not</u> try to move yourself from the waitlist into a class, even though the system indicates there is an opening. This cannot be done on Banner web and will only cause you to lose your place on the waitlist.

BANNER WEB REGISTRATION

Find Banner Web. Using the most current version of your Web browser, find Banner Web by accessing the PLU homepage at www.plu.edu and selecting Online Services. From the Online Services, select Banner Web. Then click on Login.

Log In. Log in by using your PLU ID number as your user ID. Enter your PIN (personal identification number). Once you click on the log-in button, the system will ask you to verify your PIN one more time for security purposes.

PLU www Information Status. Select Student Services and Financial Aid. Under Student Services and Financial Aid, select Registration. The Registration Menu gives you several options.

Select Term. Make sure that the term in the text box reads the appropriate term for which you are registering. Then click on the Submit Term button.

Check Your Registration Status. Scroll down and select Check Your Registration Status. If you have registration holds, you need to stop and contact the Student Services Center to clear the hold before registering (see page 10 for details). If you do not have any holds, you may continue by clicking Menu.

Registration Menu. Select Register/Add/Drop Classes.

Add Classes. Scroll down to the Add Class section. In this section you will enter a CRN (course reference number) for each class you would like to take. Remember that if your class requires co-registration for another class (such as a lab), you must enter a CRN for that class as well. When finished, select the Submit Changes button to continue. When your request is finished processing, you will be returned to the Register/Add/Drop page.

Current Schedule. In this next screen, you will have to scroll down to see your current class schedule. Make sure that you look at the status box to see if you are currently registered. If you have a conflict of some sort, the system will notify you under the section called Registration Errors. Contact Student Services Center or the Registrar's Office with questions.

Student Detail Schedule. Once you have finished selecting your courses for the term, scroll down to the bottom of the screen and select the Student Detail Schedule text. Your schedule will appear on the screen. If you would like a copy, select the Print button on the top of the screen. Make sure that when you have finished registering, you LOG OUT and close your application. This is important so that no one else can make any changes to your schedule. It is recommended that you return to this screen just prior to the start of each term to confirm any schedule changes (such as room number or instructor) that may have occurred after your registration was completed.

SPECIAL REGISTRATIONS

The following registrations must be done in person at the Student Services Center unless indicated otherwise:

- Auditing a Course. To register to audit a course (no credit) get an instructor's signature on a green add/drop form. The cost for auditing a course is the same as the cost for taking the course for credit.
- Courses requiring approval. To register for a course requiring approval get the authorized signature on a green add/drop form.
- Course load exceptions. Registering for more than 18 hours in one semester requires at least a 3.00 grade point
 average or consent of the provost. (Use Banner Web to register for up to 18 hours in Fall or Spring and up to 6 hours
 in J-Term or Summer.)
- Waitlisting a course. See detailed information on page 10.
- Independent Study Cards. Completed cards are returned to the Registrar's Office. See page 5 for details.

Welcome to January Term 2002!

Pacific Lutheran University's January Term provides students and faculty with a unique opportunity to concentrate their attention intensely on one class at a time. Not only can that deepen one's understanding of subject matter, but it makes it possible for each class to become a closer community of learning.

All students, not just freshmen, will find within this schedule courses of interest to them. In addition to a few unusual courses peculiar to January (generally those involving an off-campus experience), you will find here a broad range of offerings within the regular curriculum—interesting electives, upper-division courses in many specific majors, and courses satisfying various university-wide requirements.

For your convenience attribute codes appear at the end of course titles. The attribute indicates which university-wide requirement a particular course meets. In some cases a course may be assigned multiple attributes. Keep in mind that one time only you may use a single course to satisfy a maximum of two university-wide requirements, even though that course may be assigned three or more attributes.

The Freshman January Term Requirement

Freshman students are required to fulfill the freshman January term requirement by enrolling in a J-Term course that fulfills one of their university-wide requirements. These courses are marked in the schedule with a J designator. Courses marked with a J and listed in the section set aside for freshman J-Term courses will meet this requirement.

The purpose of the freshman January term requirement is two-fold. First it is an integral part of the freshman experience at PLU. It provides another opportunity, along with the Inquiry Seminar: Writing (WRIT 101) and Critical Conversation (CRIT 117) courses, to enroll in classes designed specifically for freshman students. Second, it provides an opportunity to take another general university requirement in a setting of more focused attention on the learning process as well as course content. The January term is a stimulating change from the regular semesters and most students find J-Term courses to be very worthwhile and enjoyable.

All freshmen must complete the three requirements of the freshman experience during their first year at PLU.

Be advised - No single course can be used to satisfy more than two university-wide requirements. All J courses fulfill the freshman J-Term requirement and may be used to satisfy one additional university-wide requirement. Read course attributes carefully.

ANTH 192 JOF Practicing Anthropology: Makah Culture, Past and Present A, J, S1 (4 credits) FRESHMAN COURSE

This class will study Makah culture in Neah Bay. The tribe has an active cultural research program. Archaeological, historical, and anthropological research have shed light on the Makah way of life over the last 3,000 years. Students will receive instruction in Makah culture by Makah, contribute to a project, and learn what life in Neah Bay is like. Part of the month-long class will be spent in Neah Bay on the Makah Reservation. Can only be used for two of the three university-wide requirements.

ANTH 491 OFF Practicing Anthropology: Makah Culture, Past and Present A, S1 (4 credits)

This class will study Makah culture in Neah Bay. The tribe has an active cultural research program. Archaeological, historical, and anthropological research have shed light on the Makah way of life over the last 3,000 years. Students will receive instruction in Makah culture by Makah, contribute to a project, and learn what life in Neah Bay is like. Part of the month-long class will be spent in Neah Bay on the Makah Reservation.

ARTD 390 OFF 19th Century Art in Paris AR (4 credits)

Spend three weeks in Paris studying art movements and painters of the 19th century. Learn about the different styles of art and where they originated. Explore the cafélined streets where great artists lived and worked. A knowledge of French is not required.

BIOL 333 OFF Biology of the Andes, Amazon, Galapagos NS (4 credits)

One might best describe this course by saying, "It's like walking through the pages of the National Geographic." Features of this class include: tropical alpine paramo studies in Cotopaxi; ecological studies in Cuyabeno (in the upper Amazon); and snorkeling and terrestrial ecological observations in the Galapagos Islands. Studies will highlight historical and cultural aspects as well as biological attributes.

BUSA 345 OFF An Italian Heritage of Business and Art AR (4 credits)

Students will examine the development of business practices and international trade in late medieval and Renaissance Italy, how the wealth generated was used to fund the arts, and how these early business practices have been transformed in the 21st century. Explore the churches, museums, and other sites, of Rome, Florence, Venice and other cities.

BUSA 485 OFF January in London, An Integrating Experience Combining Business and the Arts (4 credits) - Crosslisted as COMA 492 OFF

What's it like to do business in the United Kingdom? How are the arts supported in Britain? How has British history and culture influenced the ways in which business is done and the arts created? Here's a chance to get a first-hand view of business and the arts from the British perspective. Students will have the opportunity to visit British companies, financial markets and banks, and entrepreneurial activities, as well as British theatre, music, and museums.

COMA 391 OFF Ancient Greece and Italy: The Spec acle of Speech and Theatre (4 credits)

Explore the story of Athenian democracy, the rise of Rome, and the empire of Britain through the study of their dominant speech and theatrical events. Students will travel from Athens, to Rome, and then to London where they will study the significant trends and events in the development of rhetoric and poetic.

COMA 392 OFF January in London, An Integrating Experience Combining Business and the Arts (4 credits) - Crosslisted as BUSA 489 OFF

What's it like to do business in the United Kingdom? How are the arts supported in Britain? How has British history and culture influenced the ways in which business is done and the arts created? Here's a chance to get a first-hand view of business and the arts from the British perspective. Students will have the opportunity to visit British companies, financial markets and banks, and entrepreneurial ac ivities, as well as British theatre, music, and museums.

J-Term Off-Campus Courses (Continued)

ECON 338 OFF Investigating Economic and Environmental Change in Italy (4 credits) - Prerequisite: Sophomore Standing

This class will learn about the technological and social adjustments Italians have made through the years and how modern Italy is working to solve important economic and environmental issues. Sites to be explored include Rome, an ancient Roman seaport, Pompeii, and various areas of the Maremma section of Tuscany. This course contains a service learning component.

EDUC 428 OFF and EDUC 429 OFF Exploring New Zealand through Children's and Adolescent Literature (2 credits each)

Experience the culture and tradition of New Zealand as you read across a wide range of children's and adolescent literature. Meet authors, storytellers, illustrators and publishers as well as librarians, teachers, children and parents as you explore the rich literary heritage on which the literature is based.

ENGL 224 OFF Travel Writing - Australia: Sydney, the Outback, the Reef, and Crystal Waters (4 credits)

Spend a month of the Australian summer traveling through major cities, the outback, along the coast and looking into conceptions of future living possibilities. Travel essays will be developed along the way, while incorporating readings applicable to each locale. The wildlife and scenery will be varied and inspiring as you journey through this vast country.

ENVT 425 OFF Crystal Waters: Ecology, Community and Culture in Australia NS (4 credits)

Crystal Waters is a community consciously designed and maintained to optimize and balance the ecosystem of the natural environment with the people living in it. It is internationally recognized for its educational center for permaculture design which you will study while experiencing the community itself, assist in work projects as a service component, and focus attention on what it takes to be a cooperating member of a fully integrated intentional community.

GERM 231 OFF or GERM 331 OFF Language, Art and Culture in the New Germany (4 credits)

German language and modern German culture will be the focus of this full immersion J-Term program. Students will combine intensive German language instruction with close study of the historical intertwinement of public art and politics and the rapidly evolving commercial landscape in reunified Germany.

INTC 246 OFF Cases in Third World Development: Community Development in Cuba C, I2 (4 credits)

Participate in this course and experience the daily life of ordinary people in Cuba. Learn the history of why Cuba initiated a socialist experiment and study the perilous consequences of this choice. Meet with community, political, and religious leaders and draw your own conclusions.

MUSI 120 OFF Music and Culture AR, C (4 credits)

This course in Trinidad is a portion of a semester abroad program. For information regarding this opportunity please contact Jan Moore, Center for International Programs, at 253.535.7629 or by e-mail at moorejg@plu.edu.

NSCI 210 OFF Explore the Natural History of Hawaii NS (4 credits)

The Hawaiian Islands are an active museum of geology and tropical island plant and animal life. The islands, the most isolated in the world, have native plants and animals – 95% of which occur nowhere else. Students are expected to participate actively in daily lectures and fieldwork involving the geologic formation of Hawaii and its subsequent population by plants and animals, stressing the impact of human intervention.

PHED 319 OFF Tramping the Tracks of New Zealand PE (4 credits)

Spend J-Term learning about the history and culture of New Zealand while backpacking and hiking in some of the most dramatic scenery in the world. Explore museums that reflect the history and culture of the other land "down under" and hike up ancient volcano craters, to glacial mountain lakes, and along sandy ocean beaches.

RELI 221 OFF Ancient Church History R2 (4 credits)

The emergence of the Christian movement will be explored through the unique sites and history of Rome. Students will examine the Roman imperial social context, Jewish communities as a conduit for Christianity, the establishment of house churches and Christian community centers, and the expansion of Christianity under imperial legalization.

J-Term Off-Campus Courses (Continued)

RELI 331 OFF TS: The Bible in London: Museum, Gallery and Stage R1 (4 credits)

Using the historical method, we will take advantage of the remarkable number of items from various sources throwing light upon Biblical events and times that are preserved in the British Museum. We will see how New Testament theology is reflected in history and textual studies, art, and the stage. Biblical texts'will be explored through worship in Westminster Abbey and St. Paul's Cathedral. Tours to Stonehenge, Oxford, Canterbury, and the Tower of London will be combined with ballet, opera and other productions on the London stage.

RELI 365 OFF Holden Village: Environmental Ethics R2 (4 credits)

Christian perspectives on the environment will be the special focus of this course. Causes of the environmental crisis, attitudes toward nature and resource use, the role of Christian thought and the Church in the crisis, preservation of wilderness, personal responsibility, and population/food issues will be grist for class deliberations in this winter playground.

SOCI 310 OFF Sociology in Jamaica C,S2 (4 credits)

This sociology course provides students with an intense, but interesting, opportunity to experience an essentially African culture, with strong English and American influences. Studies of the Jamaican kinship system and the ways that race, ethnicity, gender and social class effect people's lives will be the focus. Current social problems will be examined as well.

SOCW 201 JOF J-Term on the Hill A, J, S2 (4 credits) FRESHMAN COURSE

J-Term on the Hill provides students with an intense experience of community work in Tacoma's Hilltop District and/or Tacoma's Eastside. Students learn first-hand about urban poverty and how it manifests itself through participation in community projects, volunteer work at social service agencies, and conversations with people who live and/or work in the community. Can only be used for two of the three university-wide requirements.

SOCW 491 OFF J-Term on the Hill A. S2 (4 credits)

J-Term on the Hill provides students with an intense experience of community work in Tacoma's Hilltop District and/or Tacoma's Eastside. Students learn first-hand about urban poverty and how it manifests itself through participation in community projects, volunteer work at social service agencies, and conversations with people who live and/or work in the community.

SPAN 231 OFF or SPAN 331 OFF Intensive Spanish and Development Issues in Costa Rica C (4 credits)

This Spanish language – Costa Rican culture immersion experience links language study and learning about a society. The program's primary objective is improving Spanish language knowledge and skills. The second objective seeks to identify the root causes and consequences of underdevelopment and to examine the effects of current development strategies on women, the poor, the culture, and the environment.

Undergraduate and MA Cert courses are offered sequentially. Because assignments and instruction are integrated across courses, students <u>must</u> follow established course sequence. See SOE advisers for copy of course sequence.

Students are required to devote 6-8 hours/week to field work in assigned schools prior to student teaching. Students seeking elementary K-8 certification should reserve 6-8 hours Monday, Wednesday, or Friday a.m. for work in schools. Students seeking secondary certification (4-12 in a content area) should reserve 6-8 hours/week for work in schools, preferably in the a.m.

Students seeking a Bachelor of Arts in music education take the following courses in the School of Education: EDUC 391, EPSY 361, and SPED 480

Students seeking a Bachelor of Arts in physical education take the following courses in the School of Education: EDUC 390, EDUC 392, and SPED 480

Students in these programs must establish a program of study with advisers in their respective departments.

Students must register for student teaching during the preceding semester. The state requirement for FBI and Washington State Patrol fingerprint clearance must be completed prior to student teaching.

Students are to provide their own transportation between campus and assigned schools.

MATHEMATICS

To insure correct placement of students in beginning math courses, eligibility will be required for registration for MATH 91, 105, 107, 111, 112, 123, 128, 140, and 151.

Students may establish eligibility for registration for a course by earning a qualifying score through the math placement system.

Students who have completed the prerequisite course at PLU with a grade of C or better are eligible without taking the placement exam.

Students who have not taken the placement exam may obtain the exam at the Math Department Office. The exam and accompanying question-naire will take about 70 minutes. Allow one to two weeks for the results to be available. New students preferring to take the exam by mail should contact Nancy Shonk in the Math/CSCE office at the earliest opportunity, 253.535.7400 or email shonkne@plu.edu.

If you have taken the exam but do not have the results or have questions about placement, contact the Math Placement Director, Dr. Celine Dorner 253.535.8738 or email dornerca@plu.edu.

If a student is eligible for a particular math course either by taking a prerequisite course at PLU or through the math placement system but experiences difficulties registering for that course, contact the Math Placement Director, Dr. Celine Domer at 253.535.8738 or email dornerca@plu.edu.

Students who have not taken the mathematics placement test or have not otherwise satisfied eligibility for a math course will not be able to register for that course.

 - Moving you off the waitlist and into a course may be complicated because of conflicts with another course, or the waitlisted
 course may put you over maximum hours for the term. Indicate on the form what class should be dropped if necessary.
 - You will not be registered for courses for which you lack the prerequisite or required concurrent registration.


