Discussion of hate groups opens CommUniversity

"Getting In and Out of Hate Groups" will be the topic of the opening convocation speech for CommUniversity '97, an adult education program for Pierce County that will be held at PLU in February. Convocation speaker James Aho, a sociologist and author from Idaho State University, will discuss the sociological story of how individuals migrate into and occasionally out of hate groups. His presentation is based on personal field research through in-depth interviews with skinheads and members of the Aryan Nations. CommUniversity will offer 18 courses on a variety of topics from 3-5:30 pm on the four Sunday afternoons in February at PLU. The opening convocation will begin at 2 pm in the CK. Tickets are \$5. Additional classes will be held in the North End, South Tacoma, Puyallup and the TCC area on dates through April. Subjects vary from Celtic Christianity to healthy lifestyles to "buildings of God" in Pierce County, and PLU staff and faculty serve as some of the teachers. For a
