The 26th Annual WAHPER Convention was sponsored by the PLU School of Physical Education October 14, 15, 16. The theme was "Participation."









"Bury The Dead": Live, Think, Do















It was a memorable year for PLU basketball as a 15-11 record pushed the winning season streak to the magic plateau of twenty-five consecutive winning years, (1948-1972) but there were few plans being made for an anniversary celebration in early January when the Lutes were bogged down with a dismal 2-6 record.

Eight lettermen returned. The Lutes stumbled along with only Ake Palm showing any consistency until sophomore Neal Andersen was recalled from the junior varsity. With the lithe speedster in the lineup, the Lutes were no longer vulnerable to the full court press and the Lute machinery began to get in gear. Tom Patnode bounced back to the form which earned for him second team all-conference honors in 1971 and Bruce Willis became a standout when switched from guard to forward, doubling his scoring output from the previous season and stablizing the offensive game with his court savvy.

The Lutes won eleven of their final fourteen games and tied for third place in the Northwest Conference. By-passed for the NAIA playoffs, PLU still enjoyed many moments of satisfaction and gave cross town rival UPS a scare-losing an 81-77 thriller. Ake Palm rose to his greatest height in that contest, connecting on 16 of 17 field goal attempts, tying the single game total - bettering the single game percentage mark.



PLU continued its steady, if unspectacular, building program in baseball by doubling the win total for the second straight season, finishing on the sunny side of the scoreboard in eight games and moving up two notches in the Northwest Conference standings.

Behind the solid pitching of Mike Berger, an All-NWC selection as a freshman, with help from John Roeber, Ron Chapman, and Dave Bennett, the Lutes finished sixth in the conference with a 7-9 mark and were 8-17 overall. This upgraded the 4-13 and 4-21 figures of 1971.

Berger, the conference strikeout king, whiffed 55 batters in 47 innings, winning four contests, losing three with a 1.72 ERA in loop action.

Senior Phil Lavik sparkled in the field at third base and wielded a potent bat. Lavik, named most valuable player for the third successive season, hit .295 for the year and was an honorable mention NWC selection. Don Griffith and Tracy Totten led the way in conference play with .327 and .324 swat marks while the Lutes' third outfielder, Art Ruud, set a modern school record with five homeruns.


