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DR. JENS KNUDSEN PUBLISHES TEXT ON BIOLOGICAL TECHNIQUES

Dr. Jens W. Knudsen has written a book entitled "Biological Techniques: Collecting, Preserving and Illustrating Plants and Animals."

The work, published by Harper and Row, New York, went on sale this week. According to Knudsen four thousand copies will be printed in the first run. He has signed a contract whereby the text will be sold in Japan and other foreign countries.

The self-contained text and manual provides complete, up-to-date, professional methods for locating, collecting and preserving all types of plant and animal specimens, with a full discussion of the problems involved in these procedures.

The book, 525 pages in length, is both a text and reference for students and teachers and contains 533 individual illustrations drawn by Knudsen himself.

Everything from blueprints for the construction of special cabinets for biological specimens to information concerning methods of illustrating material that is to be published is included in the text.

Knudsen has numerous research projects published in scientific journals, but this is by far his most extensive work.

"SONG OF NORWAY" HAS SUCCESSFUL OPENING, CONTINUES TONIGHT, SATURDAY

The "Song of Norway" had a successful opening Thursday evening in the Eastvold Chapel auditorium. Performances are scheduled again tonight and Saturday at 8:15 p.m.

The production is an operetta which tells of the Norwegian composer Edvard Grieg's youthful zeal to write his country's music and his final realization of his aim.

Grieg, played by Lynn Erstgaard, is discovered by the Countess Louisa Giovanni (Roberta Allen), who recruits him to be her accompanist. Grieg leaves his home to travel Europe with the famous opera singer, to the disappointment of his best friend Rikaard Nordraak (Steve Cornils) and his fiancee Nina Hagerup (Sheryll Fredekind). In time Grieg's music becomes well known and he is content to lead the life of an exile in Rome until he receives news of the death of Rikaard.

Knowing he has forsaken his native land, Grieg returns to Nina and his friends and family in Troidhaugen where the grateful Norwegian government has presented Grieg a new home.

What gives "Song of Norway" its unusual excitement is its score, which has been put together from Grieg's lovely music.

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PLU STUDENTS TO PARTICIPATE IN NSF RESEARCH PROJECTS

Four PLU chemistry majors and three students from junior colleges will take part in a research program this summer at PLU which is supported by a National Science Foundation grant.

Their work will extend for ten weeks and will be supervised by Dr. Charles Anderson, head of the chemistry department. He will be assisted by staff members Dr. William Giddings, Dr. Laurence Huestis and Dr. Donald Lee.

The PLU students are Paul Bethge, Gary Hanson, George Long and Richard Olsen. Junior college participants are William Downey from Olympic College, Miss Idell Mary Emery of Grays Harbor College and Michael Maass from Centralia College.

Last Saturday Bethge received the top prize for the best presentation of a student paper at the regional conference of the American Chemical Society Student Affiliate Chapters at Ellensburg.

His work, under the direction of Dr. Wayne Gildseth, dealt with volume changes on the addition of mercuric chloride to other aqueous chloride solutions.

This is the third year in a row a PLU student has received an award at the annual meeting. Peter Anderson and Robert Krieger also presented papers dealing with their undergraduate research projects in chemistry.

NURSING PROGRAM ACCREDITED
FOR HOSPITAL, JC GRADUATES

The bachelor of science in nursing program for nurses who are graduates of hospital diploma programs and of junior college programs has been accredited by the National League of Nursing.

To receive credit for their former training in nursing these students must take advanced placement examinations. A total of 36 credits may be allowed.

Currently there are approximately 40 registered nurses working full or part-time for their baccalaureate degree.

The PLU program for graduate nurses is one of two in the state (the other is the University of Washington) which is also accredited by the State Board of Education.
