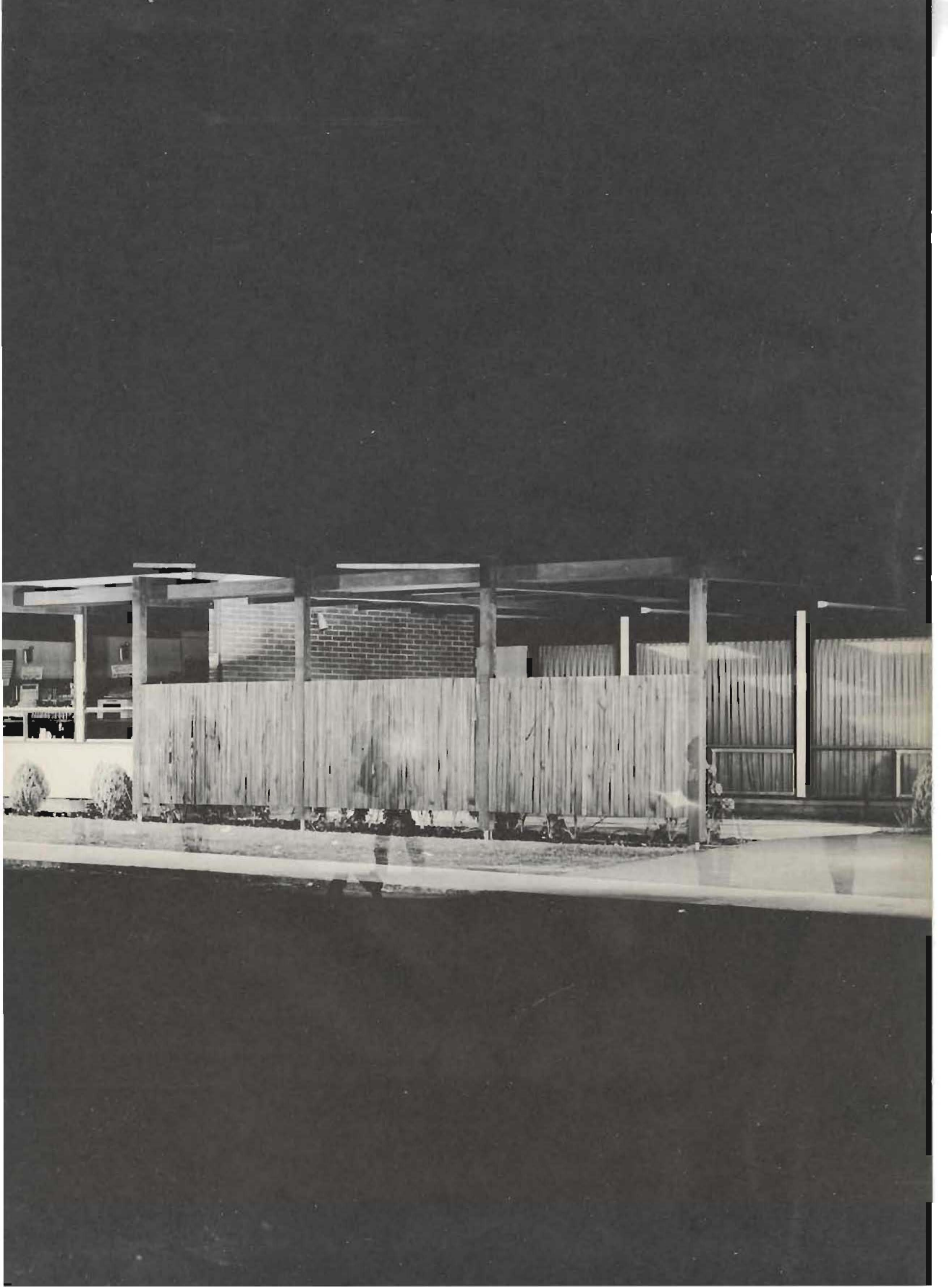

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**DEDICATION J. P. PFLUEGER**





"An aged Christian, with the snow of time upon his head, may remind us that those points of earth are whitest which are nearest heaven." —Chapin

Such a witness is the beloved professor, Dr. Jesse Philip Pflueger, who has been a guiding light to thousands of students at Pacific Lutheran College for the past twenty-seven years. A Christian of strong and virtuous character, Dr. Pflueger has become a part of PLC that is unequalled. He has watched her grow from a tiny college on the prairie to the queen she is now.

The son of Rev. and Mrs. Adam Pflueger, he was born on June 6, 1888 in Columbus, Ohio. When the time for his education came, he attended Capital Academy, Columbus, and graduated from there in 1902. In 1907 he received his A.B. from Capital University; while in 1910 he got his B.S. and Candidate of Theology degrees. He became an ordained pastor in the ALC and began his service in that capacity in New Orleans. In 1914 while still serving that congregation as pastor, he attended Tulane University and graduated from that school as a student in tropical medicine and hygiene. The following year he attended Leipzig University and in 1942, the University of Washington.

He was granted the degree of Doctor of Divinity by Capital U. in 1942 in recognition of his contribution to the furtherance of God's kingdom. Last summer, St. Olaf College selected him as one of two professors to be presented the honorary degree of Doctor of Humanities.

Not content to confine his influence to strictly religious duties, he is a member of Phi Delta Kappa and Pi Kappa Delta. Here at PLC at the present time he acts as advisor to the Blue Key Honorary Fraternity of which he is also a member. In civic affairs, he held the office of president of the Lutheran Welfare Society of Pierce County for 15 years, served as head of Civil Defense in Parkland during World War II, and was president for many years of the Parkland Community Club.

His work hasn't been kept just here on the Pacific Northwest, either, for in 1916 he served as Medical Inspector in the U. S. Medical Corps in Manila and was a foreign missionary from 1910 to 1916. In 1955 he took a three months tour of 23 countries of Europe and the Middle East.

All of these activities have made a man that will be synonymous with PLC for a long, long time. His Christian character and love for God are evident in the classrooms of his Old and New Testament, ethics, and philosophy. To you, Dr. Pflueger, who has done so much for your students who pass through these doors year after year, we of the Saga staff wish to dedicate the 1957 Saga.

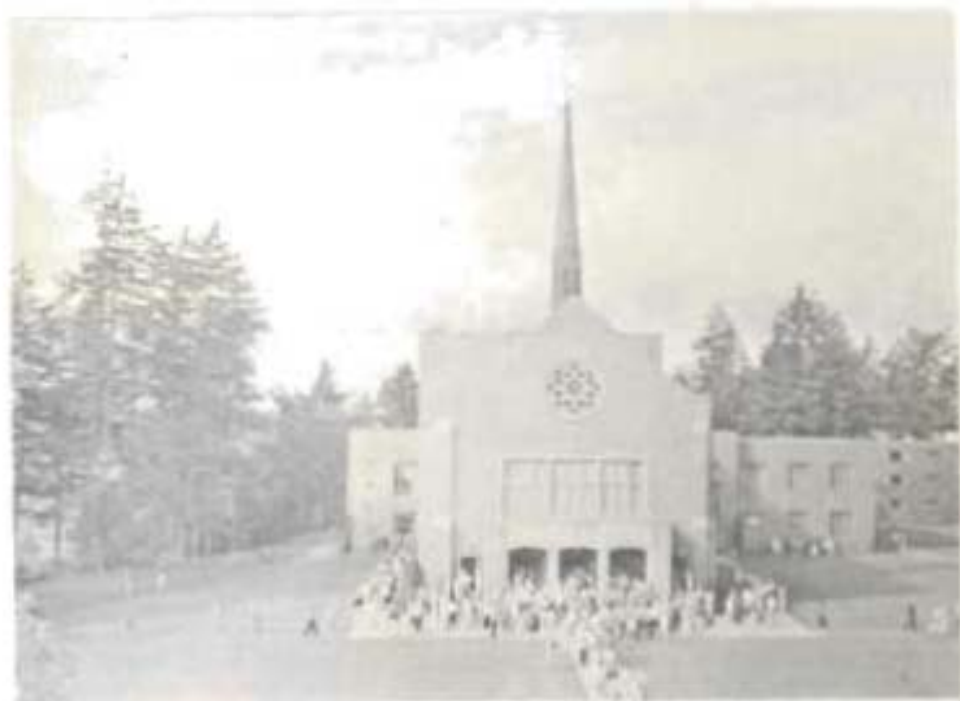

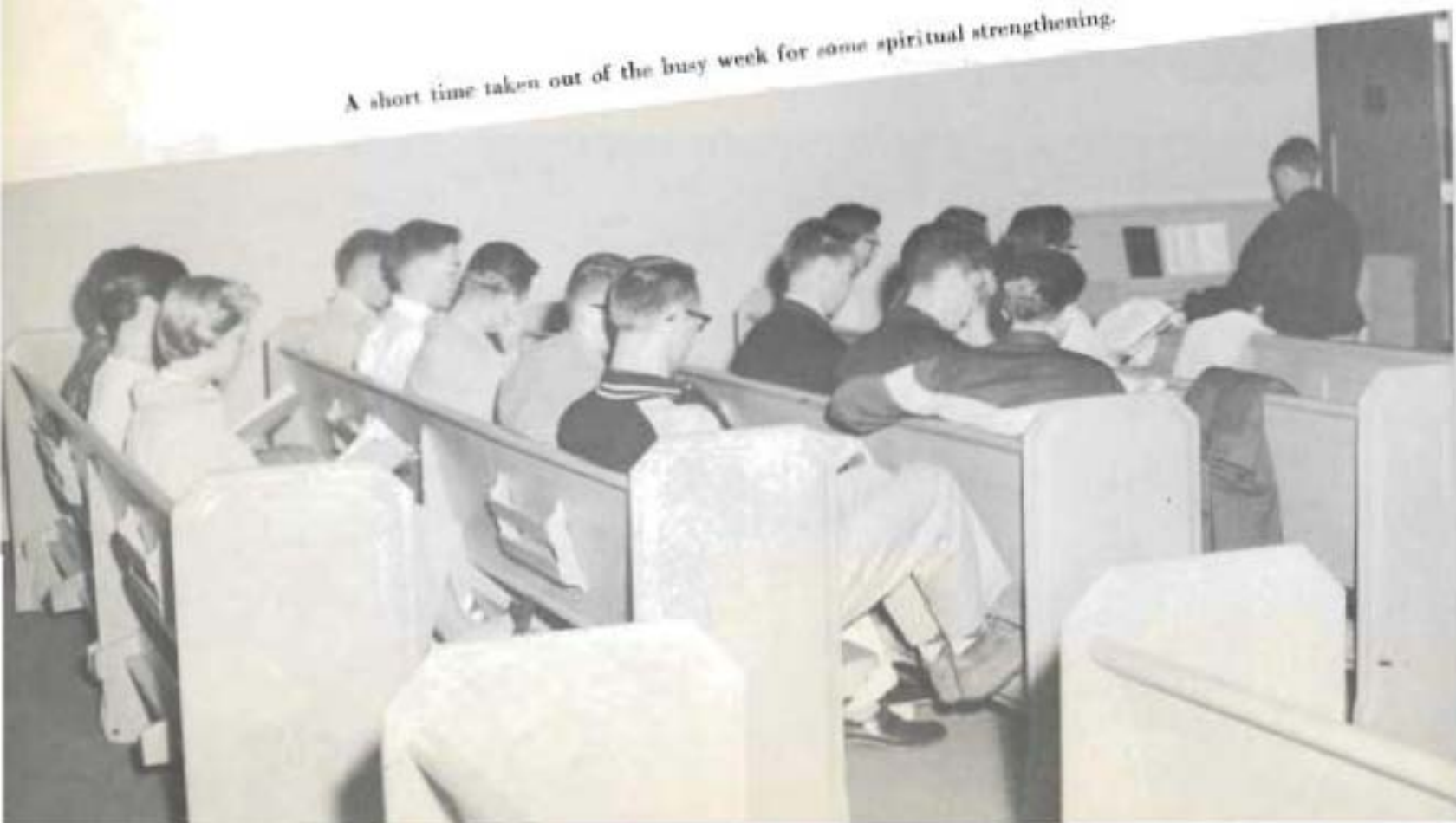

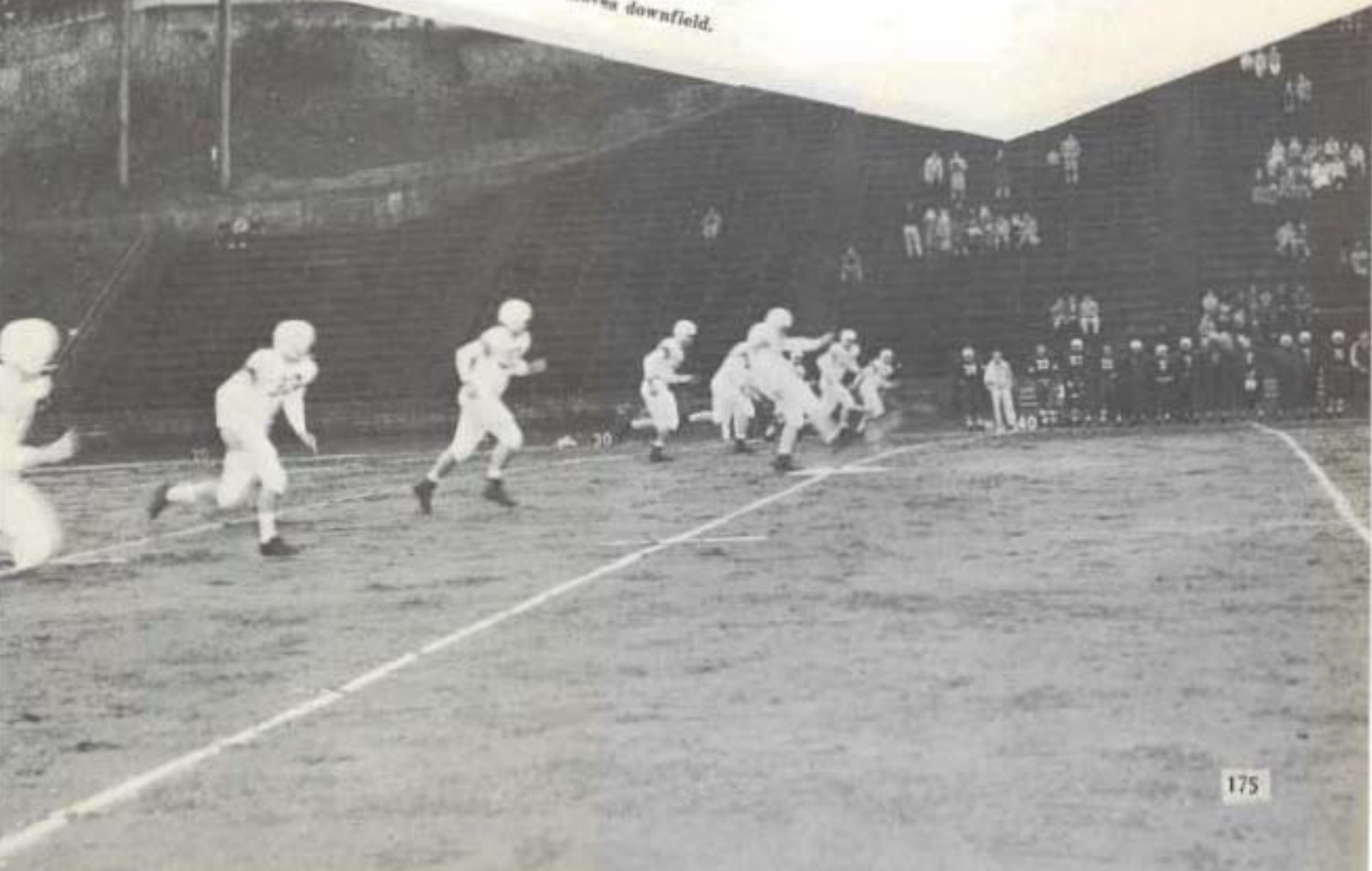

A determined Eastern squad teamed up with the weatherman to spoil the Lutes' Homecoming and hand them their first loss in conference play. The Savages scored once in the first quarter, twice in the second and added another in the fourth, while the Lutes could not score a single yard in the second period. John Fromm dashed 73 yards for the touchdown with Jack Newhart converting. The Lutes were ranked as one of the top passing teams among the nation's small colleges before the game, but a stubborn Eastern defense would allow only an average 6 yards into the air. 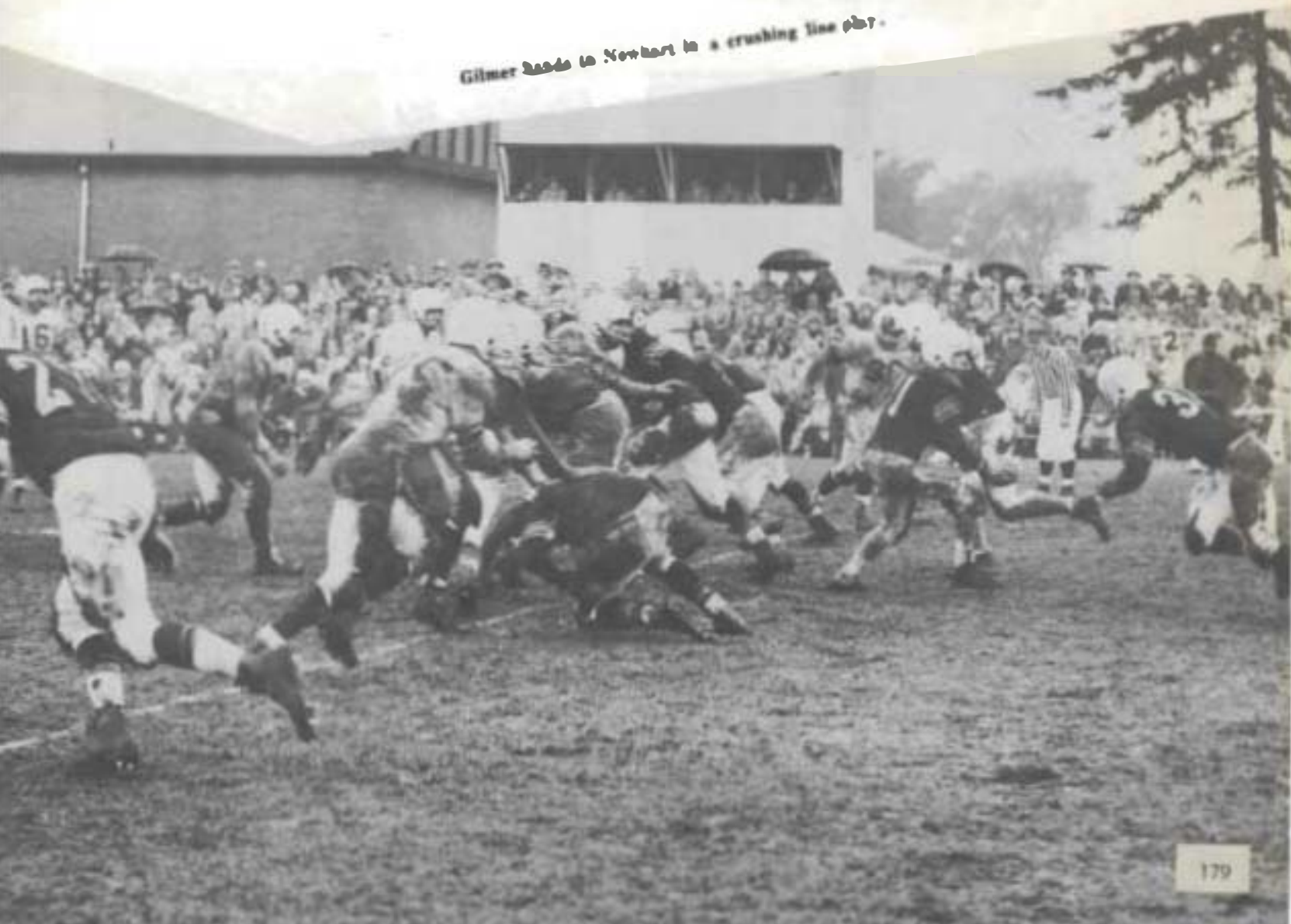

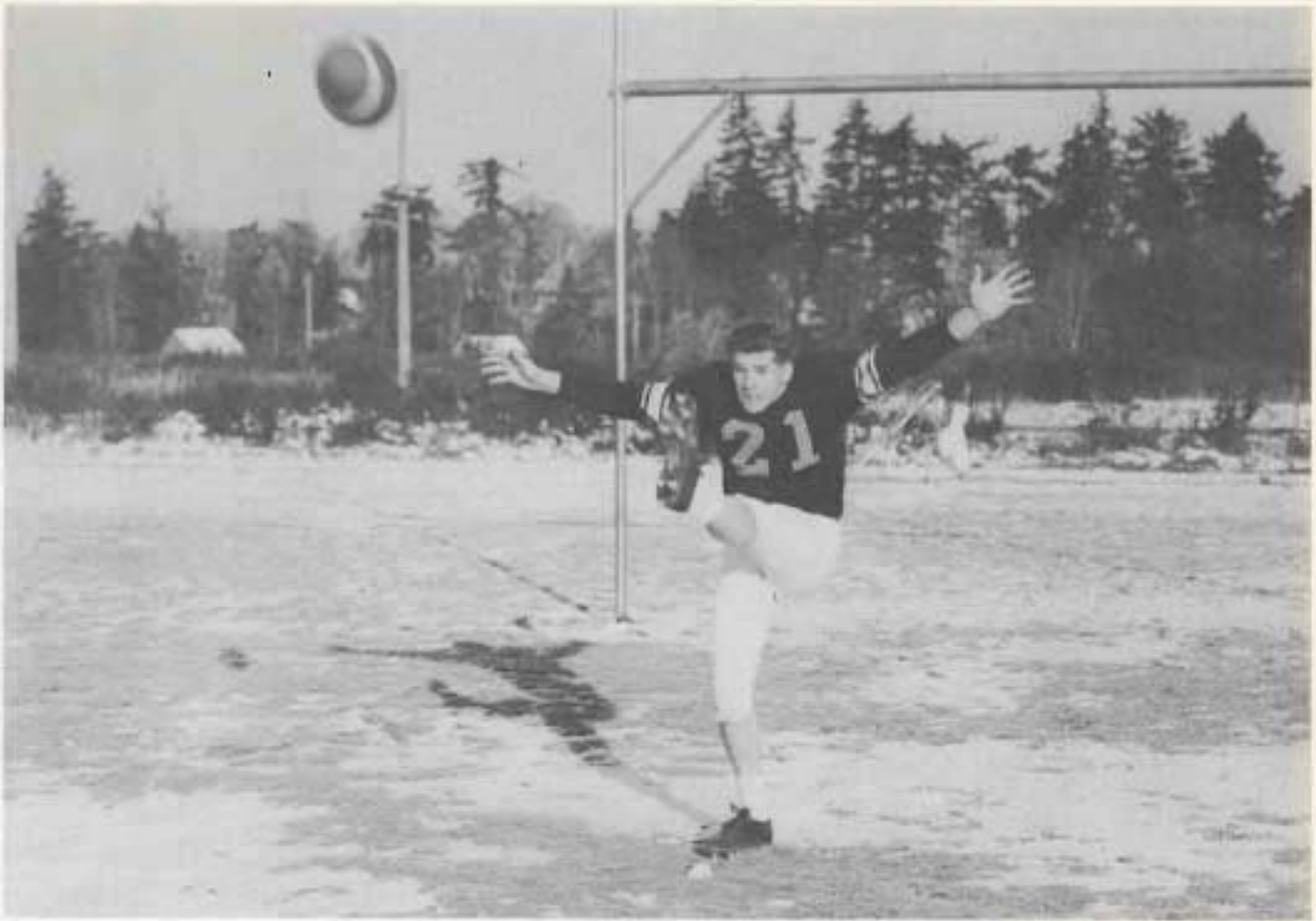

## BASKETBALL

The Lutes racked up 28 victories against a single defeat against college competition, and an amazing 31-2 record for the entire season. The record book almost became obsolete, when the team raced through the season to win the Evergreen Conference undefeated and to capture third place in the NAIA Tourney at Kansas City.

With 24 consecutive victories under their belt, the Lutes invaded Spokane for the district NAIA playoff. Although outrebounded, the Lutes won the opener rather handily by a 78-68 margin. A torrid shooting percentage for the second straight night, a record breaking 41-point performance by Chuck Curtis, and a 93-84 victory sent the locals on to Kansas City.

The Lutes were the only team in the tournament that was undefeated against college competition and were selected as the top seeded quintet. The squad became the target for all opposition as they drew a bye in the opening round.

The boys from Parkland were successful in their debut against Elon College of North Carolina. Although their shooting was not up to par, the Lutes emphasized defense and rebound strength to topple the Christians 76-61. Iverson led all scoring with 24 counters.

## NON CONFERENCE BASKETBALL

Non-conference contests provided as many thrills and proved as successful as the Indoor and Tournament games. The Lutes opened at home by downing the Central Wilkes in the third annual Tacoma Invitational Tournament, 69-47. The next evening they took it on the chin from the Buchan Bakera, the defending national AAU champions, for the only defeat of the regular season.

St. Martin's invaded the local court in one of the hottest tempered battles of the campaign and went down by a 69-69 margin. Max Hershman stroled onto the floor and was promptly charged with two sechokas! fouls, which were quickly matched by a pair against the Rangers. The Badgers from Pacific U. became the next victims as they crumbled 69-58 before the Gladiators.

It was a record breaking event when the Lutes smashed the CPS Logans 107-49. The scoring blast not only shattered the CPS Field House record by ten points and set a new scoring mark for one half, but also bettered the all-time PLC high total by eleven points. Chuck Curtis scored 28 points and Roger Iverson dropped in 24, as they provided almost half of the team's total.

The encounter with Linfield set the scoring record for the Memorial Gymnasium as the Lutes clipped the Wilkes 98-77. Chuck Curtis fell three points shy of the individual scoring mark when he fouled out with 35 points, but the total was good enough for a new home gym record. A 97-74 elater over Westmont presented coach Harvanson with his 200th win since he took over coaching chores in 1946. The Lutes dumped Central Washington 56-47 at Richland and repeated with a win over the same club at Moses Lake by a 69-40 margin. The Lutes notched a pair of wins in a King's X series at UBC by taking the initial contest 53-45, and following up with a 60-47 verdict.

It was a great revenge for the boys as they played one of their best games in thrashing the Buchan Bakera 80-63 before a capacity crowd. The break they took a night off against college competition as they easily trounced the Alvoni 71-51. The Lutes took another break before the Gonzaga series and started off a desperate final attack by the Buchan Bakera to post a 77-71 triumph. The victory, which was actually won from the charity floor, gave the Lutes their second win in three tries against the breakdown.

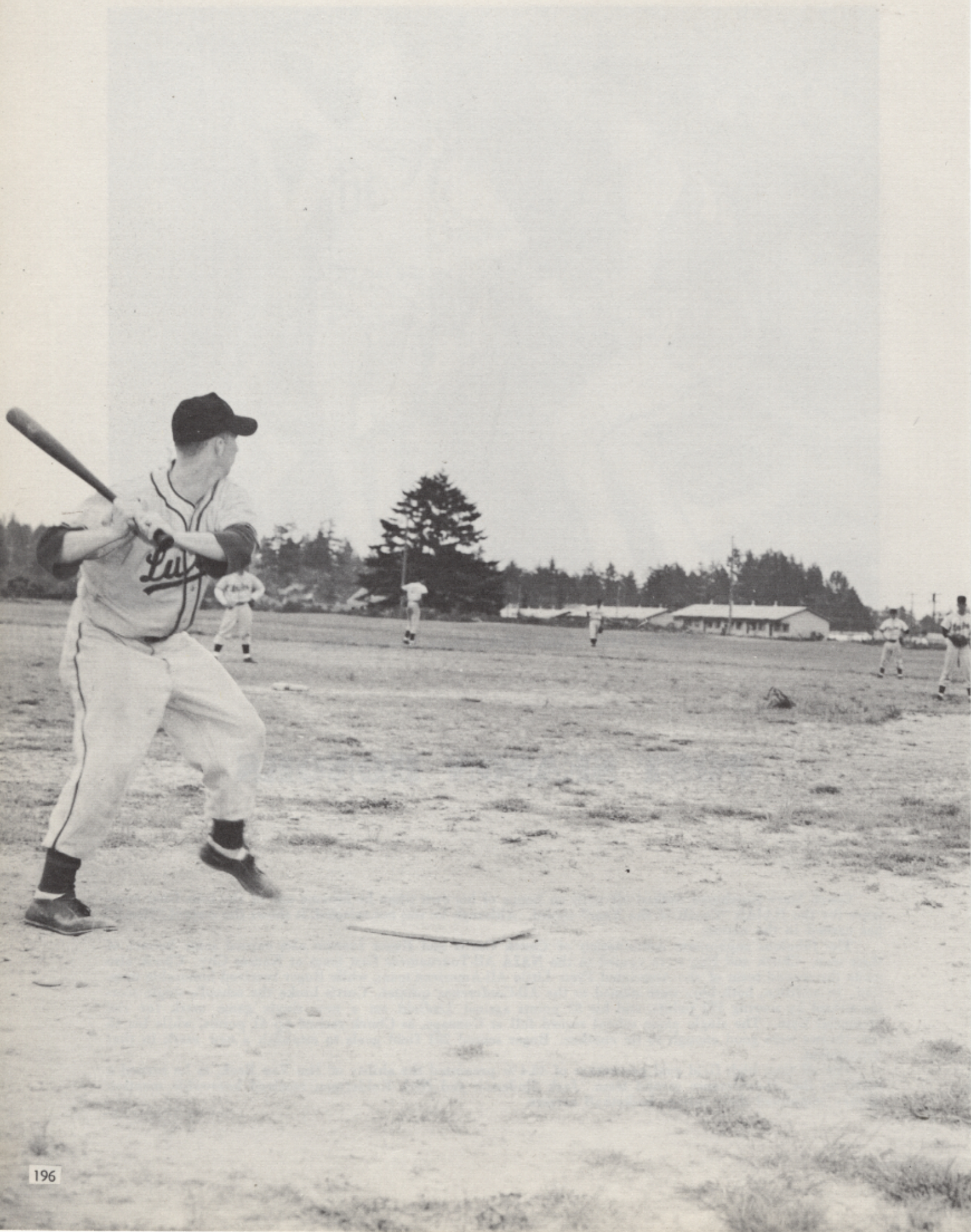
## POST SEASON HONORS

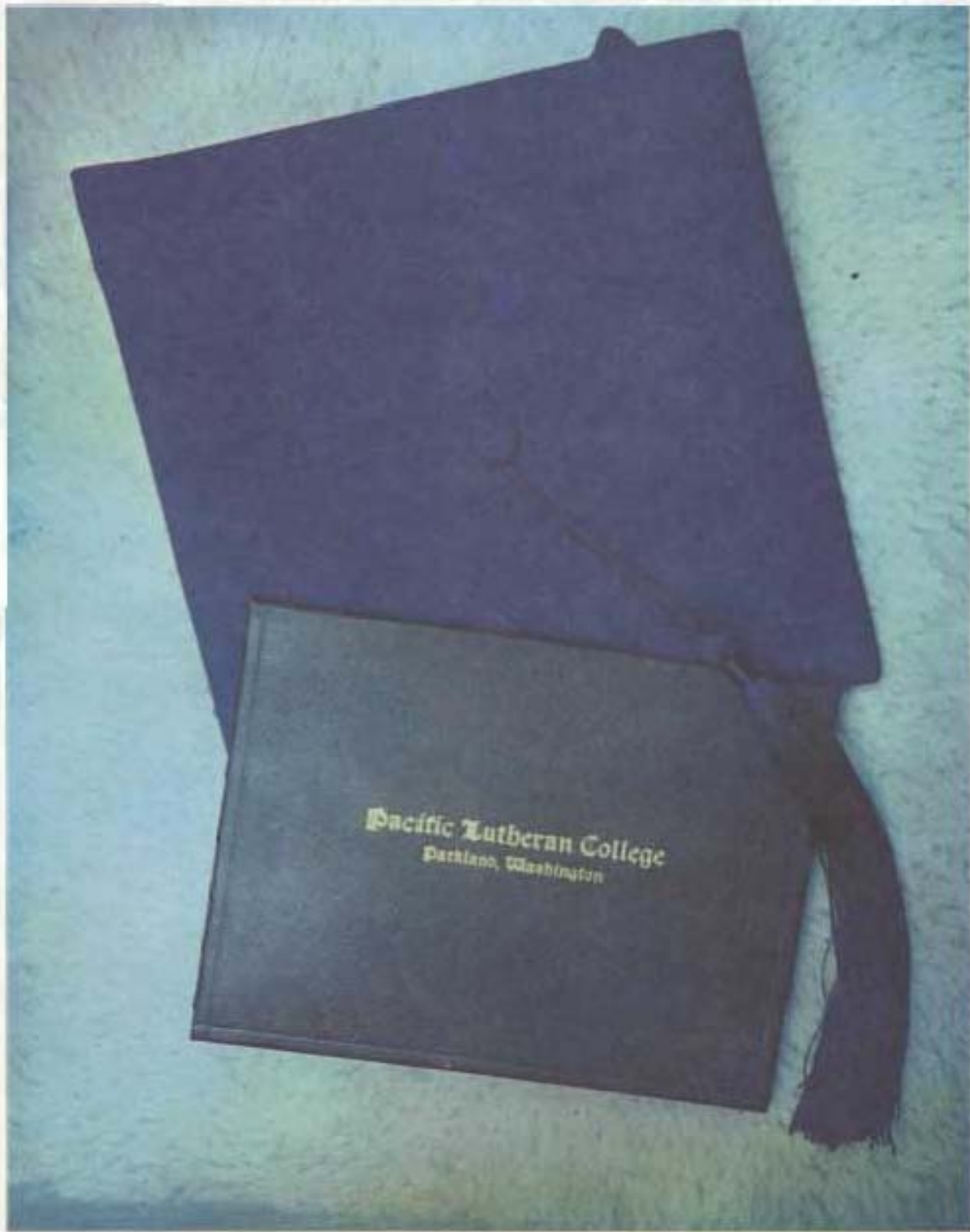

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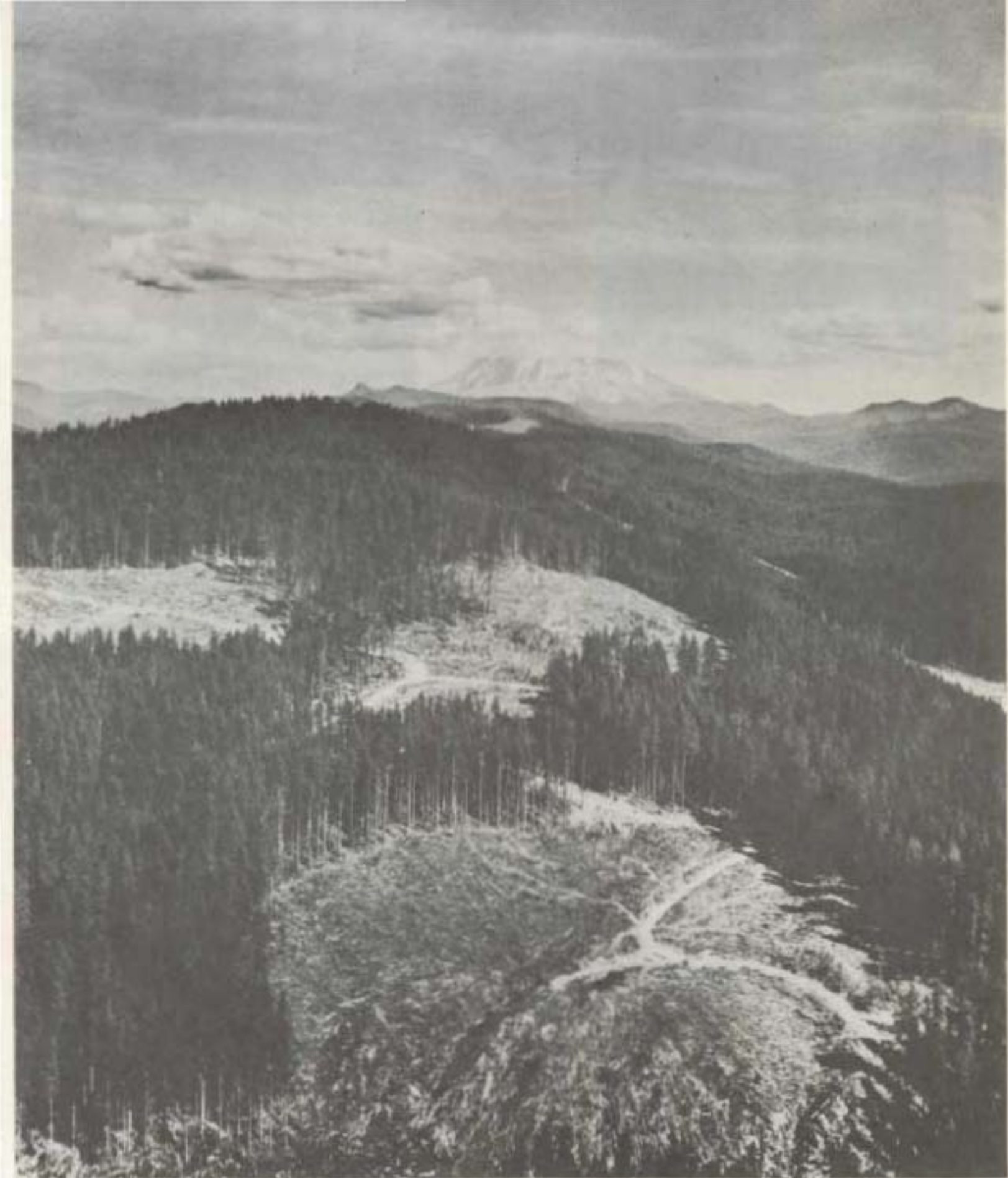
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
