DR. LANGEVIN REPORTS ON MEETING
OF ASSOCIATION FOR HIGHER EDUCATION

Last week's Knightletter contained a reference to my attendance at the annual meeting of the Association for Higher Education in Chicago. This group, which is sponsored by the National Education Association, maintains individual rather than institutional memberships. However, because of the number of presidents and deans who attend, the meeting almost appears to represent institutional attachments.

The theme of the conference this year was "Higher Education Reflects on Itself and on The Larger Society." The mechanics of the conference provide for plenary meetings at which various people both in and out of higher education are featured. and discussion groups and information sessions which are assigned in advance to conference participants. Together, these make up a publication which comes out each year entitled "Current Issues in Higher Education," and which is quite valuable to the college administrator, as well as to the professors of the growing study of higher education as a professional area of interest.

Featured speakers of interest included Mr. Terry Sanford, former governor of North Carolina, who was and is active in the formation of the newly organized nationwide compact for education (and which, it seems to me, would be well worth a couple of hours of interesting faculty discussion); Senator J. W. Fulbright, who used the session as a forum to carry on his attack on the administration's Viet Nam policy; and Vice-President Hubert Humphrey, who became the banquet speaker on evidently short notice to answer Senator Fulbright; John Dale Russell, an old-timer in the study of American higher education; Mr. Frank Bowles, director of the education program of the Ford Foundation; and others. Two PLU teams will face squads from Pacific University this week as the Knights open spring sports activity.

The PLU golfers will open the season today when they travel to Forest Grove, Ore., to meet the Badger linksmen.

Saturday, the Knight track team opens the campaign against Pacific on the Parkland oval at 1 p.m.

Three lettermen form the nucleus of the 1966 PLU golf squad. Heading the list is Roz Ahre, a sophomore from Woodburn, Ore., who played at times as the Knight's number one man last spring.

Other veterans are Craig Hidy, a junior from Daly City, Calif., and Gary Bierwagen, a sophomore from Walla Walla.

Leading newcomers include Jay Robinson, Portland; Jack Strand, Spokane; and Jeff Watson, Olympia.

Les Rucker, who set two PLU individual records and was on the team that set two Knight relay marks, tops a list of six vetera on the PLU track squad. A senior from Yakima he set marks in the long jump and intermediat hurdles and was on the record-breaking 400 yard and mile relay squads.

Other veterans are mid-distance runner Barry Egeland, Tacoma; weightman Craig Knutzen, Seattle; high jumper Jim Rismiller, Seattle; 880-yerd runner Chuck Snekvik, Walnut Creek, Calif; and sprinter Terry Tommervik, Tacoma.

The golfers return to action March 30 with a home match against Puget Sound followed by another home meet with St. Martin April 1.

The PLU baseball team is idle until March 31 when it travels to Willamette while the Knight tennis squad opens the season April 2 at Western Washington.
