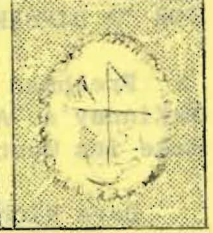

KNIGHT GRIDDERS ENTERTAIN STRONG LEWIS & CLARK SATURDAY

It has been a long time since Pacific Lutheran University has won five straight football games at home. Not since 1947, when the Knights won all five of their home outings on the way to a 7-0-2 record, has PLU been able to put together more than four home triumphs in a row.

Actually, PLU has accomplished the latter feat only twice since then--once in the 1954-55 season and again last Saturday when it downed Western Washington 27-14.

The Knights started the current string last year with a 7-0 win over the Vikings at Lincoln Bowl followed by a 28-21 verdict over Whitworth at the Franklin Pierce High School Stadium--new home field for PLU. Home victories over Puget Sound 23-7 and Western Washington this year have supplied the other two.

The men of Coach Roy Carlson will be attempting to accomplish what hasn't been done for 18 years Saturday afternoon when they entertain strong Lewis & Clark at 1:30 p.m.

PLU also will be trying to move its 1965 record over the .500 mark. Besides its two home victories, it has been defeated by two of the Northwest's small-college powers--Linfield 17-0 and Eastern Washington 20-3.

Lewis and Clark's only defeat in three starts also has come at the hands of Linfield 38-20. The Pioneers, who have suffered only three defeats in four years, all at the hands of Linfield, own victories over Portland State 22-0 and Whitman 20-6.

The Knights hold a 3-2-1 edge in the all-time series, but the Pioneers have won the last two meetings, scoring a 63-27 win in the last outing in 1963.

SHAKESPEAREAN INTERPRETATIONS OPEN ARTIST SERIES PROGRAM TONIGHT

"Caviare to the General," a dramatic program based on eight plays of Shakespeare, will open the 1965-66 Student Artist Series tonight at 8:15 p.m. in Eastvold Chapel.

Starring Richard Gray and Mayo Loiseau the show will present 11 scenes and 18 characters from such plays as "Much Ado About Nothing," "Macbeth," "Hamlet," "Henry V" and "Othello."

Simply set with two benches and the use of light to change scenes and moods, the show explores dramatic and character contrasts with each scene acted out as a dramatic entity.

Gray, who arranged the presentation and is its director, is a native of London and made his professional debut in that city in Barr's "Little Minister" at the age of 15. He has appeared on the stage, television and in motion pictures in Europe, Africa and the United States.

Miss Loiseau, a native of New York, began her professional career at 15 in Hollywood. She appeared in movies and on television productions. She has made several national tours with stage companies.

Also in the cast are Raeder Anderson, who was last seen in the "Carousel," Tom Robinson, who was in the cast of "The Three Bears," Dick Finch and Jim Dion.

Carlson expects plenty of trouble from the Pioneers. "While they are not as big as the other teams we've faced, they have plenty of speed and have several backs who can break up any game at anytime.

"Any team that can score three times on Linfield has something going for it."

Carlson plans no lineup changes against Lewis & Clark.

Halfback Les Rucker, who returned to action last week to catch a 48-yard touch-down pass and intercept a Western Washington aerial, reinjured his ankle and decided to drop from the squad.

Quarterback Tony Lister, who passed for 208 yards against Western Washington, upped his total offensive production to 489 yards, 457 of it coming through the airways on 33 completions in 72 attempts.

Bill White, who caught six passes for 104 yards, upped his season total to 23 grabs for 275 yards.

Fullback Ken Tetz leads the Knights in rushing after four games with 221 yards.
