Eastvold Returns With Gifts From California

President S. C. Eastvold returned Saturday morning from his trip South, bringing with him gifts to PLC totaling \$11,000 from four parishes in California.

Dr. Eastvold was guest speaker on four consecutive Sundays at the churches tendering this gift, visiting first, on Feb. 25, the Rev. R. Hovland's church in San Francisco. On March 4, he spoke at Our Savior's Lutheran Church in Los Angeles, of which the Rev. J. W. Carlson is pastor. On March 11, he visited the Rev. A. M. Nelson's Church in Long Beach, and on the following Sunday, March 18, the Pasadena charge of the Rev. Joseph Berg.

On March 14, the Southern California Circuit Pastors met in Los Angeles and organized for the final Golden Jubilee appeal. On the following day, the Circuit Pastors of Northern California met with Dr. Eastvold to organize for the final drive in this circuit.

The objective of the Golden Jubilee appeal in the Norwegian Lutheran Churches is \$150,000. The amount still needed to reach this goal is \$20,000 and all states in the PLC area, in which the Norwegian Lutheran Churches exist, are organizing between Pentecost and Easter in an effort to raise this amount. Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho and Montana confidently expect to reach their goal.

The American Lutheran educational appeal has reached its goal and a check for \$35,000 has been sent to the College Building Fund. The Women's Missionary Federation of the NLCA has almost (Continued on Page Four)

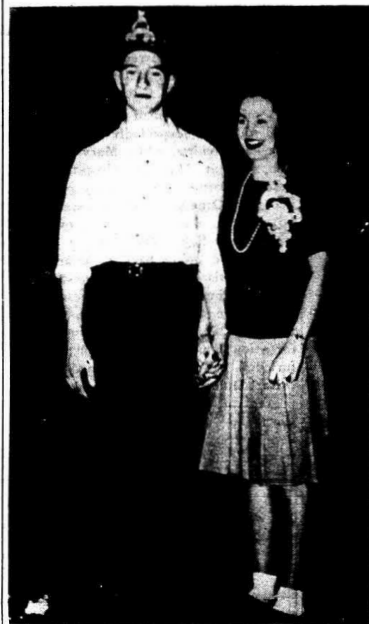

Start Those Thinkers, All You Sophomores!

Sophomores are taking the 14th annual National Sophomore College Tests today and tomorrow, March 22, 23. The purpose of these tests is to "aid students in making a better adjustment to college work and in gaining a better knowledge of their abilities and interests."

There are three sections to this test: a cooperative English test, a cooperative general culture test, and a cooperative contemporary affairs test.

Sometime in May the tentative percentile norms and interpretative leaflets will be sent to the colleges. The individual results will be mailed to the Cooperative Test Service, New York, which sponsors these tests. Each student will receive an interpretative leaflet explaining his score.

The final national results will be published in July.

Last year 20,000 college sophomores in 152 American colleges and universities participated in these tests.

completed its pledge of \$40,000, the W.M.F. of the American Lutheran Church has reached its goal of \$30,000; the Columbia Conference of the Augustana Synod has pledged its quota of \$10,000. The Tacoma appeal has already netted \$63,000 and the committee is confident that the full goal of \$175,000 will be reached during the year.

In addition to these appeals, the drive for the refurbishing of rooms has netted 50 pledges at \$400 each. The committee is appealing for 45 additional refurbishing pledges to complete the 95 dormitory rooms which will include the two top stories of Old Main. With other additional gifts, the total Golden Jubilee goal is \$650,000.

During the past 18 months, President Eastvold has traveled nearly 50,000 miles crossing the mountains in whole, or in part, 25 times.
