Three university publications, plus the set of materials used for prospective students were among the 70 pieces, out of over 400 entries, selected for honors in the 15th annual exhibition of advertising and editorial art, sponsored by the Seattle Art Directors Society. They were designed by O.K. Devin, Jr. of Seattle. The exhibit was held June 9 to 12 at the National Bank of Commerce. PLU publications on display were the annual report of the president, the Kinsmen Society brochure, the Choir of the West European Tour booklet, and the admissions materials (as a group).

Word was received this week from the American College Public Relations Association that our publications have been selected for an honors award to be presented at the annual ACPRA convention in Los Angeles July 5 to 8.
