## ALPHA PSI OMEGA TO PRESENT "NO EXIT," OPENS NEXT THURSDAY

Jean-Paul Sarte's "No Exit" will open a three-night run next Thursday, Nov. 18, at 8 p.m. in the Classroom Building auditorium. Produced by Alpha Psi Omega, national honorary dramatic fraternity, the stimulating drama will also be presented Friday and Saturday.

Sarte, a well-known French philosopher and popularizer of existentialism, expounds his beliefs in this story about three condemned souls.

The casts includes only four characters. One of the principal figures, Vincent Cradeau, a journalist condemned to the tortures of hell, is played by Rod Molzahn, a senior speech major from Seattle. He has been an active participant in dramatic productions at PLU.

The women, both inhabitants of a room without windows and mirrors, are portrayed by Michael Ann Cassidy as Inez Serrano and Chris McMurdo as Estelle Elaunay.

Miss Cassidy is a junior nursing student from Vancouver while Miss McMurdo is a freshman drama major from Bellevue. Chris won awards as the best actress her junior and senior years in high school at the PLU High School One-Act Play Festival.

The valet is played by Gordon Compton, a junior business administration major from Bellingham.

Student director is Kathy Vold, a senior education major with a dual major in music and drama from Bellingham.

## PARENTS' DAY ACTIVITIES SCHEDULED FOR SATURDAY

The second annual Parents' Day will be held at PLU Saturday.

Dr. Robert Mortvedt, PLU president, will speak to the parents on the subject, "A Distinguished Center of Learning," following an opening chapel service at 10 a.m. in Trinity Lutheran Church. The Rev. John Larsgaard, University chaplain, will give the meditation.

A panel of university professors will discuss the topic, "The Christian University in the Space Age." Participating will be Dr. Peter Ristuben, associate professor of history; Dr. William Giddings, assistant professor of chemistry; Dr. Kenneth Johnston, director of the School of Education; and Miss Anne Knudson, associate professor of English.

Following a luncheon in Columbia Center, a panel of students and administrators will discuss various phases of the university's activities. It will include Mike Cullom, president of the Associated Students; Miss Margaret Wickstrom, acting dean of students; Dr. Emmet Eklund, chairman of the department of religion; Dr. E. G. Knorr, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences; and A. Dean Buchanan, business manager.

A tour of the campus, coffee hour with faculty members, and a business meeting of the PLU Parents' Association also are included on the program.

Parents will have the opportunity to eat the evening meal with their sons or daughters in the PLU dining hall.

The program will conclude with the PLU-Eastern Washington football game at 8 p.m. at the Franklin Pierce High School Stadium.

the total number of plays in one season of 257 set back in 1941. Last Saturday Lister, who is the first PLU player to gain over 1,000 yards in one season since Tommervik accounted for 1,884 in 1941, set a new PLU single game mark by handling the ball 43 times. He has accounted for 1,111 yards this year, over half of PLU's total offense of 1,977.

Senior end Bill White will get his final crack at breaking the individual pass reception record for one season. He is within four of Dave Bottemiller's four-year-old record of 43 catches.

Eastern leads in the all-time series between the two schools with a 14-11-3 record.

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## KNIGHTS HOPE FOR WINNING SEASON IN FINALE WITH STRONG EASTERN

PLU shoots for its second straight winning football season Saturday, but accomplishing the feat will not be an easy one.

The Knights, who have divided their first eight games, host strong Eastern Washington, owner of the Evergreen Conference championship and ranked among the nation's leading small college teams, in the season finale for both teams at 8 p.m. at the Franklin Pierce High School Stadium.

Coach Dave Holmes' Savages had been ranked third nationally among the small colleges before their 21-14 setback at the hands of Whitworth last week. It is their only defeat in eight starts.

One of Eastern's victories was a 20-3 conquest of the Knights in an earlier meeting in Spokane.

The Savages have been led this year by hard-running Mel Stanton, who entered last week's game leading the small college backs in both scoring and rushing. He now has gained 1,053 yards--135 yards short of the EvCo record, and scored 120 points--a new EvCo Standard,

EWSC also has the EvCo second leading rusher in fullback Don Strate and the league's number two quarterback in George Cross.

If the Knights are to pull off an upset against the highly-touted Savages, the defense, which spearheaded last week's 14-0 win over the University of Puget Sound, will have to provide the impetus.

The PLU offensive backfield, which had previously been depleted of three of its starters, suffered another jolt Saturday when junior quarterback Tony Lister sustained an ankle injury. His status is uncertain at the moment.

Either Bob Batterman, a senior, who also has played flankerback this year, or freshman Jim Malamon will get the call if Lister is shelved.

The scrappy, signal-caller is 18 plays shy of breaking Marv Tommervik's record for
