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PLU Schedules National Crisis Forum

A proposal to conduct a national crisis forum in lieu of final examinations May 18-20 has been approved by faculty and Board of Regnets at PLU, Dr. Wiegman, university president, announced Wednesday.

Purpose of the forum, according to Dr. Wiegman, is to bring to bear all of the educational resources of the university upon an open discussion of those critical national issues concerning college students today.

"Pacific Lutheran University is not going to close up shop," Dr. Curtis Huber told the PLU Board of Regents yesterday. "Instead, we are planning an educational effort to apply disciplines taught on campus to contemporary issues," the faculty representative to the board added.

Final examinations are not ruled out, nor are they mandatory, President Wiegman explained. It will be up to the individual students to decide whether they wish to take the exams and up to the professors to arrange alternatives to the final exam schedule, he indicated.

The forum committee includes five faculty and five student members. Dr. J. A. Schiller, chairman of the sociology department, is faculty co-chairman. Student co-chairman is Richard Ostenson, a Tacoma junior.

The forum will feature prominent spokesmen for both the Nixon Administration policies and the Senate opposition, as well as commentary, probably by a representative of the national news media, Schiller said.

Reasons for the forum, a proposal possibly unique among educational institutions across the country, according to Schiller, are three-fold:

to help students analyze apparent polarization taking place on university campuses throughout the nation;

to create better understanding between community and university regarding students and their expressions of concern about national issues; and

to stimulate dialogue between various segments of the community regarding national issues.

Open discussions between students and parents will be held Wednesday afternoon.

Thursday and Friday, May 21-22, remain open for scheduling of examinations for those students wishing to take their finals, Schiller said.

A number of alternatives to regular exams have been suggested, and any or all may be used, the forum committee indicated. They include home exams, mini-exams, faculty-student conferences and individual appointments. The student may also opt for the traditional two-hour exam.

Faculty student teams visited all campus dormitories Tuesday night to stress the purpose of the forum and the fact that the semester is NOT being terminated ahead of time. President Wiegman is also sending a letter to parents with the same message.

"School is not being closed," the University president emphasized. "It's being opened up to meet the crises of our day in discussion rather than action in the street. This is education with immediate application to a life-style of dealing with challenges."

A new deadline for final grades is being established to relieve the members of the faculty of this pressure, President Wiegman indicated. He also stated that "if the eighth semester of work should alter any student's status, records will be corrected after graduation.

"We want to provide a setting in which the true nature of the university as an educational experience may function for faculty and students around the basic issues that are reflected in the present national crises: violence on university campuses; conflict over national foreign policies, and tension between community and university as well as intergenerational conflict," President Wiegman asserted.

The National Crisis Forum committee established the principle that the national crisis in America, growing out of a variety of causes and forces, takes precedence over the normal pattern of final examinations.

"We view this as an 'opening' rather than a closing of the university during a time of crisis," Schiller stated.

In addition to the three featured speakers anticipated, the three-day forum will include campus discussions with people from a board spectrum of political and social life: city, county and state government, political parties, labor, management and business, older population, the "Silent Majority," and the church community.

Both Monday and Tuesday afternoons and evenings alternative activities will be scheduled, including a continuous run of movies dealing with national crisis issues, as well as art, drama and poetry contributions.

MEMORIAL ESTABLISHED

Regents Accept \$100,000 Challenge Gift From Donor

PLU regents acknowledge the receipt of a \$100,000 challenge gift Monday toward the construction of facilities for the School of Nursing, and the Department of Art.

The gift, from a Tacoma man who prefers to remain anonymous, is the largest donation PLU has ever received from an individual.

At their meeting here the regents approved plans for the remodeling of the present College Union Building, plus some additions to the structure, as submitted by Johnson, Austin and Associates, Tacoma architects. They also gave permission to the PLU administration to let out for bids for the School of Nursing facilities construction as soon as the University Center is completed in the fall provided the project is fully funded.

The School of Nursing facility will occupy the areas in the College Union now used by the bookstore, coffee shop, food service and student government. In addition a classroom-demonstration area will be attached to the south side of the present structure adjacent to the bookstore.

The Department of Art will be housed in the area now known as Chris Knutzen Fellowship Hall, a 1960 addition to the CUB which was built in 1955.

President Eugene Wiegman reported to the regents that the project will cost approximately \$675,000 and that about \$300,000 will remain to be raised if anticipated grants and pledges come through as expected.

Upon the recommendation of the development committee and of Clayton B. Peterson, vice president for development, the regents memorialized the University's constituency and friends to assist in meeting the generous challenge gift to the Tacoma donor.

Mayor Gordon Johnston of Tacoma addressed the regents and complimented President Wiegman and the institution for the contributions being made to the cultural and spiritual life of the Tacoma area. He lauded the administration, faculty and students for the excellent manner in which they handled the campus unrest situation which tore so many schools apart last week.

Michael Dederer, Seattle business leader, was re-elected to a three-year term as a regent-at-large. It was announced that Carl S. Fynboe, principal of Clover Park High School, was nominated for re-election as an alumni representative to the board by the Alumni Association at its annual meeting here June 9 in conjunction with the convention of the North Pacific District of the American Lutheran Church, corporate owners of the University.

In academic affairs the regents granted sabbatical leaves for post-doctoral study in the school year 1971-72 to Dr. Emmet E. Eklund, professor of religion; and Dr. Gundar J. King, professor of business administration. The creation of a Department of Earth Sciences was approved as well as the incorporation of journalism into the Department of Communication Arts.

The granting of an honorary doctor of divinity degree in June to the Rev. Ming-Chieh Wu, president of the Lutheran Church of Hong Kong, was approved.

Dr. Richard Moe, dean of the Summer Session and Graduate Division, was appointed acting provost. He will be the University's chief academic officer from May 29 to July 8 when President Wiegman is in Europe with the PLU "Choir of the West."

To encourage the development of the finest type of professional service, the regents adopted a program of special leaves for administrators who do not have academic or faculty status. This includes persons working in such areas as alumni, development, admissions, student personnel services.

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DAHL, HANSON TO GIVE RECITALS IN BERGEN

Two well known Pacific Northwest organists have accepted invitations to give recitals this summer in connection with the observance of the 900th anniversary of the founding of the City of Bergen, Norway.

The men are David P. Dahl, assistant professor of music at Pacific Lutheran University, Tacoma; and Dr. Edward Hanson, assistant professor of music at the University of Puget Sound, Tacoma.

Dahl, who is also director of music for Christ Episcopal Church, Tacoma, will give his recital in Bergen's St. Johannes Church on July 1; and Dr. Hanson will appear in the same church on July 8. Their concerts will be part of a six-week summer recital series featuring organists from all over the world.

Dahl, who joined the PLU faculty last fall, is a graduate of PLU and has his master's degree from the University of Washington. He has done graduate work in Europe.

Dr. Hanson, a native Tacoman, is a graduate of UPS and has his masters' and doctor's degrees in music from the University of Washington. He is organist and choir master at the Plymouth Congregational Church, Seattle. He is teaching part-time at UPS this school year, and will be full-time next fall. The presentation was made by Miss Lois Libach of the heart association to Dean Richard Moe and Dr. David Olson, athletic director.

Funds will be used for scholarships to allow teachers from distant points in the state to attend the workshop, Dr. Moe said.

Health educators, psychiatrists and physicians will conduct the workshop, which will deal with the latest developements in heart, cancer, tuberculosis, and mental health research among others.

Sponsors are PLU, WSHA, Washington State Tuberculosis Association, March of Dimes and the Washington State Office of Public Instruction.
