CHOIR OF THE WEST LEAVES TODAY CN TEN-DAY CONCERT TOUR

The Choir of the West will leave Friday on a 10-day concert tour.

Under the direction of Prof. Maurice H. Skones, the 61-voice group will give 14 concerts in Washington, Idaho, and Montana.

The choir will give concerts at Whitworth College in Spokane and at Montana State University in Missoula.

Friday night the tour will open in Yakima and Saturday the group will sing in Kennewick.

Other places where concerts are booked include: Sunday, Endicott and Spokane; Monday, arch 15, Whitworth, Bonners Ferry, Idaho; Tuesday, March 16, Kalispell, Mont.; Wednesday, March 17, Helena; Thursday, March 18, Missoula; Friday, March 19, Orofino, Idaho; Saturday, March 20, Wenatchee; Sunday, March 21, Everett and Seattle.

Tuesday evening, March 23, the choir will give its annual home concert at 8:00 in Eastvold Chapel on the PLU campus. This concert will feature the world premier performance of "The Vanities of Life," a composition by the renowned Hungarian-American composer Mikos Rozsa. The motet, based on the first chapter of Ecclesiastes, was written especially for Mr. Skones and the Choir of the West.

Traveling with the student choir, in addition to Mr. Skones, will be the Rev. Milton Nesvig, tour manager, and Mrs. E. C. Knorr, choir mother. The trip will be made in two chartered buses. The singers will stay in the homes of members of congregations who will be sponsoring the concert appearances in the various cities.

MIKLOS ROZSA, WORLD FA OUS COMPOSER TO BE HERE FOR MARCH 23 CONCERT

Word has just been received that Miklos Rozsa, world renowned composer and conductor, will be on campus Tuesday, March 23, for the home concert of the Choir of the West.

The choir will be giving the world premier performance of Dr. Rozsa's motet, "The Vanities of Life."

Dr. Rozsa, Hungarian born American who lives in Los Angeles, wrote the motet last summer while on a guest conducting tour of symphonies in Europe. The work was written especially for Prof. Maurice H. Skones and the PLU choir.

Dr. Rozsa, who is a Lutheran, is famous for the film scores which he wrote for such motion picture hits as "Quo Vadis" and "Ben Hur." He has written many scores for symphonies and six of his scores have been introduced by the Philadelphia Orchestra. He has written concertos for violin and orchestra, and a recent work was a Double Concerto premiered by Jascha Heifetz, violinist, and Gregor Piatigorsky, cellist.

Dr. Rozsa will arrive on campus Monday, March 22, and will work with the choir in rehearsal that day. He will return to Los Angeles on the 24th.

Tickets for the concert to be held Tuesday, March 23, at 8 p.m. in Eastvold Chapel will be \$1.25 for adults and 75¢ for students. They may be obtained at the information desk. Get your tickets early. People were turned away for the Christmas concert and it is expected that the home concert will be a complete sellout.

\$2,500 GIFT KICKS OFF COMMUNITY DRIVE FOR CAMPUS SWIMMING POOL FUND

A gift of \$2,500 from the Parkland Fuel Oil Service to the PLU Swimming Pool Fund this week got the community-wide campaign for funds underway this week.

Announcement of the gift was made by William Goodwin and Arthur Swindland, co-chairmen of the drive which has a goal of \$50,000 for the pool construction fund.

In announcing the gift, the chairmen said, "We asked permission of the donor to announce this gift because we felt it was a major forward step in realizing our goals. It shows a great concern for building a finer community.

The chairmen also announced the appointment of Mel Eagan, manager of the Parkland Branch of the Puget Sound National Bank, as special gifts chairman. It will be his responsibility to direct the solicitation of gifts from companies that do business in this geographical area, but have their offices elsewhere.
