Hymns will be sung and devotions given. The program will conclude with the friendship circle.

Several new characters have been added to the cast. John Rydgren will portray Scrooge and James Bos will be the reader. Two new characters have been chosen as ghosts, Jim Gilson being the Ghost of Christmas Present and Luther Stern as Ghost of Christmas Past.

Dean Hendrickson and Frances Hery will be Mr. and Mrs. Bob Cratchit, and Janet Peake will be one of their daughters. Bob Johnson has been cast in the part of the bill collector, and Al Verlinde will be Scrooge as a young man.

Other characters in the play who have taken parts from year to year include Jon Ericson as Fred, Scrooge's nephew, Howard Small as Marley's ghost, Hazel Johnson as young Scrooge's girl, LaWanna Wellandt as one of the Cratchit's daughters, and Bob Brass as Ghost of Christmas Yet to come.

"Christmas Carol" will be presented in the SUB auditorium Wednesday, Dec. 13, following the annual DPK Christmas banquet, so consequently it will be a formal affair, as is the banquet. After the play, students will join in Christmas caroling at various homes in Parkland.

As We See It

Would you push other people out of your way in order to get a seat on a bus? Could you steal another student's books without any qualms of conscience or even a backward glance to see if anyone were watching you? Before becoming too indignant at the defamation of character which such questions imply, ask yourself this question: "Would I enter the chow line ahead of people who were in line before I arrived?"

Chow line "crashing" has become so common a practice that many students accept it as the natural and even the proper thing to do. Yet sneaking into the breakfast, lunch, or dinner line ahead of others is, even under the most charitable construction possible, extremely discourteous. Actually, it can be considered dishonest—as unfair and unsportsmanlike as cheating in examinations or swiping pencils. Certainly it is presumptuous; or are you, dear chow line crasher, by virtue of some special merit or prerogative not bound to wait your turn in our "first come, first serve" society?

"He was saving me a place," or "I want to eat with my friends," are the most common excuses offered by chow line crashers at those times when they feel constrained—by conscience, we hope—to offer some sort of apology for their behavior. To this may we offer the humble reply that, to avoid being considered grouches or poor sports, so many of us have restrained in such situations? Your friendships are not more valuable to you than our time is to us, and besides we are hungry too. If you want to eat with your buddies, we are saving a place for all of you at the end of the line.

If at least some of the hitherto many line crashers could be made aware of the real character of their actions and could be reformed to the extent that they not only refrained from sneaking into line themselves but also refused to allow their friends to join them in the middle of the line, our problem would be near solution. After that a little determined propaganda and action by all who respect the rights of others and are tired of having their own rights continually ignored could show up line crashing for what it really is, and could make even the most persistent line crasher feel out of place, which, of course he is.

The most notable transfers is big Nick Pulich, 6'3", pivot man from Everett Junior College. Other starters are Jack Heffernan and Harold Van Riper, forwards; and guards Jim McCarthey and Rollin Schauble.

The starting lineup for the Lutes won't be decided until game time, but three of the five positions have been named. The two guards, Bert Wells and Duane Berentson, work very nicely into the fast break attack currently employed by Coach Harshman as they can run all night and are both good inside shots.

Playing the pivot this season will be Gene Lundgaard, three year letterman. The forward spots haven't been decided yet but the candidates have been narrowed down to Gerry Hefty, Lloyd Eastman, Glen Huffman and Lee Amundson.

Reserves that will see quite a bit of action are Ray Green, 6'7" forward, Ed Brown, guard, and Lee Bloom, forward.

The most consistent Lute back this season, Harry Malnes, nailed down one of the offensive halfback spots. Glenn Huffman, stellar sophomore end, and the only Parklander who played both offense and defense this year, was selected as a defensive end.
