Kresge grant improves technology

Computer networking in Rieke, Memorial Gym and the Math & Computer Science building is a part of PLU's future thanks to a grant from the Kresge Foundation. In addition to creating campus links, the \$250,000 grant will also provide computers for the open lab and resource center and for Computer Science, Engineering and Math, microscopes for Biology, a global positioning system for Geosciences, and interfaces boards and mechanics equipment for Physics. Still remaining is the task of raising \$1 million over the next year for an equipment endowment, to which Kresge will add another \$250,000.
