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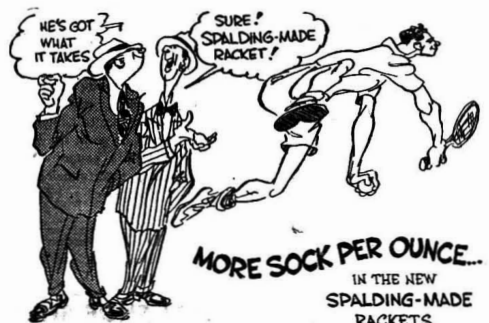
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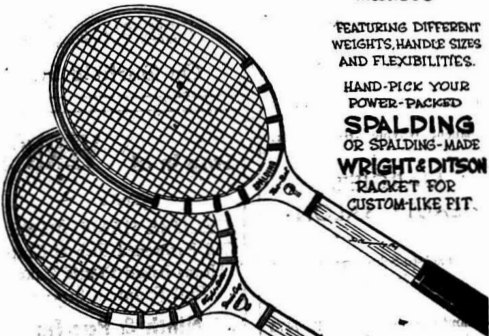

With an expanded curriculum and faculty, the 1952 summer school will commence Monday, June 9, according to Dean Philip E. Hauge. Registration will be held that day with classes beginning the following morning and will continue until July 11, the end of the first session. Second session will be held July 14 through August 15.

In keeping with the emphasis on civil defense in this area, an entirely new course in elementary atomic physics will be offered to high school teachers of science to aid them in radiological defense, or defense against the radiations of an atomic bomb burst. There will be lectures on such subjects as: atoms and molecules, Bohr theory of the atom, nuclear fission, radioactivity, x-rays, nuclear radiations, cyclotrons and other atom smashers, artificial radioactivity, and radiological defense. The aim of this course is to aid these teachers in presenting better atomic bomb education in their respective home-town communities.
