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'Confronting Death: Who Chooses? Who Controls?'

Dax Cowart was blinded, maimed and disfigured in a propane gas explosion that burned more than two-thirds of his body. He suffered excruciating pain and begged doctors to let him die, but was refused. Now a lawyer, Cowart lives in reasonable comfort, but still argues he should have been allowed to die. Robert Burt, scholar of health care ethics at Yale Law School, believes the doctors were right to reject Cowart's demands to die. For the first time in public, Cowart and Burt will talk through the ethical questions of the ordeal from 7:30 to 9:30 pm on Nov. 21 in the CK. "Dax's Case," a graphic video portraying Cowart's story, can be checked out from Media Services and viewed there. Discretion is advised.

The dialogue is the first **Heather Koller Memorial Lecture**, an annual talk on creative writing or ethics in honor of the 1994 PLU graduate who died of connective tissue cancer a month after her graduation.
