Utah Educator To Give Talk At Commencement

A former U.S. Commissioner of education will be on stage June 2 when Pacific Lutheran University presents diplomas to its 77th graduating class.

Dr. Sterling M. McMurrin, commissioner of education for one year in the John F. Kennedy administration, will deliver the

commencement speech at PLU's graduation ceremony.

The noted educator presently serves the University of Utah as dean of its graduate school and distinguished professor of philosophy. From 1954 to 1966 he held--at various times-the positions of provost, vice president, and dean of the College

of Letters and Science at the Utah school.

As a government appointee, Dr. McMurrin has been a national commissioner for UNESCO and a member of the Board of Foreign Scholarships.

Dr. McMurrin, a member of Phi Beta Kappa, received his doctorate from the University of Southern California. He later accepted such distinguished positions as visiting scholar at Columbia University; Ford fellow in philosophy at Princeton University' and visiting scholar at Union Theological Seminary.

In addition to numerous magazine articles, Dr. McMurrin co-authored "Contemporary Philosophy" and "A History of Philosophy."

Foreign Affairs Head From Norway To Speak At Student Convocation

One of Norway's highest-ranking diplomats will address a public convocation Monday morning in Pacific Lutheran University's Eastwold Chapel.

Halvard Lange, minister of foreign affairs for Norway, will speak at 9:45 a.m. on Norwegian-American relations. The talk is complimentary to the public.

The 66-year-old statesman has served his country as minister of foreign affairs since 1946. During his term of office he has participated in several international conferences, including the General Assembly of the United Nations.

Lange, the son of a Nobel Peace Prize winner, was born in Oslo. He received his undergraduate and master's degrees from Oslo University.

Prior to the outbreak of World War II Lange worked in England as a teacher and administrator. He returned home in 1940 and was arrested by the German occupation forces. After 18 months of imprisonment he was deported to a concentration camp in Germany where he remained until the war's end.

A noted Norwegian writer, Lange authored "The History of the Trade Union Movement in Norway" and most recently an article entitled "Scandinavian Cooperation in International Affairs."

A coffee hour for Lange will be held at 3:30 p.m. Monday in Stuen Hall.

the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) Opera Department, in the seldomperformed classic, "Il Matrimonio Secreto," by Cimarosa.

Last summer Dr. Fritts worked at the Festival as an assistant to Shaw in the production of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony.

Prior to joining PLU's faculty in 1949 Dr. Fritts attended the Eastman School of Music where he received his master's degree. The university granted him a leave of absence in 1955 when he returned to Eastman to receive his doctorate.

Dr. Fritts is known throughout the Northwest as a performer, conductor, director and as a pipe-organ architect and consultant.

PLU To Stage Ballet Performance on Sunday

Pacific Lutheran University's music department and Tacoma's Jan Collum Ballet will present their unusual ballet, "The Unicorn, The Gorgon and The Manticore" Sunday evening in Eastvold Chapel.

The work, regarded by Director David Urness as "one of the most profound ballets to be written in the 20th century" is seldom performed.

Blossom Cohon To Give Recital Next Wednesday

Blossom Cohon, an accomplished pianist, will present a complimentary recital at 8:15 p.m. Wednesday, May 22, in Pacific Lutheran University's Eastvold Chapel.

It will be Mrs. Cohon's last recital before she enters the University of Washington next fall to work toward a doctorate in music. Earlier this month she was notified that she received a \$2,000 Brechemin Foundation scholarship, the highest award given to a graduate student in music.

At present Mrs. Cohon teaches piano at PLU. She is a native of New York City, and a graduate of Juilliard School of Music and Columbia University. She came to Tacoma four years ago, and she has appeared locally as a guest artist on several occasions.

At her recital Wednesday Mrs. Cohon will play selections from J.S. Bach's "Partita in C Minor," "Sonata in E Flat Major" by Beethoven, and four numbers by Chopin.
