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SENATOR MAGNUSON TO SPEAK HERE AT LEIF ERIKSON DAY FESTIVAL

Senator Warren G. Magnuson will give an address and receive two awards at the Leif Erikson Day celebration to be held in Eastvold Chapel Sunday at 4:00 p.m.

Washington's senior senator returned from an extensive visit to Russia and other European countries this week, and it is expected that he will give some observations from his trip.

President Robert Mortvedt will present Senator Magnuson PLU's Distinguished Service Award medal; and Arne Tvete of Seattle, national president of the Sons of Norway, will give the Sons of Norway Distinguished Service plaque.

Sunday's program will include a brief greeting by Mayor Harold Tollefson of Tacoma, and a flag presentation ceremony.

The celebration is being sponsored jointly by PLU and the Memorial Committee of the Scandinavian societies in the Tacoma area. Co-chairmen for the event are Clayton B. Peterson (development v.p.), and Arne Forsberg, representing the Scandinavian groups.

A veteran of over 30 years in public office, Senator Magnuson of Washington is now in his fourth consecutive term as senator.

The program is complimentary to the public.

PRESIDENT MORTVEDT APPOINTED TO LCUSA EDUCATION COMMITTEE

President Robert Mortvedt flew to Chicago Thursday to attend the organizational meeting of the committee of the Division of Educational Services of the Lutheran Council, U.S.A. He was appointed as one of three ALC representatives by Dr. Fredrik A. Schiotz, president of the American Lutheran Church. This committee will take the place of the commission of the Division of College and University Work of the National Lutheran Council. Dr. Mortvedt was a member of that commission for many years. LCUSA supplants the NLC as of Jan. 1, 1967.

Earlier this week, (Monday and Tuesday) Dr. Mortvedt was in Washington, D.C. for two meetings. He is a member of the Commission of Religion of the Association of American Colleges, and president of the National Lutheran Educational Conference.

The busy president returned home Tuesday evening and on Wednesday he was in Seattle for sessions of the Washington Association of College Presidents.

KNIGHT GRIDDEERS MEET WESTERN
IN BELLINGHAM SATURDAY NIGHT

Coach Roy Carlson will bundle his Knight footballers aboard a Greyhound bus Saturday and head them for Bellingham where they will meet the Western Washington State College Vikings at 8 p.m. at Civic Field.

The Knights will be out to get back on the winning track in this non-conference tilt after losing their Northwest Conference opener last week to defending champion Linfield by a 21-0 margin. Coach Jim Lounsberry's Vikings, who tied Central Washington 6-6 last week, have a season's record of two ties and one loss. Experts rate the game a toss up.

PLU has met Western more times than any other school on the gridiron. In a rivalry dating back to 1931 the teams have met 34 times with the Lutherans holding a 16 to 15 margin in victories. There have been three ties. Last fall PLU dumped the Vikes, 27-14, in Tacoma.

Quarterback Tony Lister was slowed down last week because of a throat infection but he is on the mend and it is expected that he will be at full strength Saturday. Freshman Grant Spencer filled in capably to spell Lister on offense and went the full route as defensive half.

Senior linebacker Gary Nelson continues to lead the hardnosed Knight defensive corps. He was conference lineman of the week for his play against UPS, and last week he was runner up for lineman of the week in the state.

Next week the Lutherans will travel to Caldwell, Idaho for a conference game with College of Idaho. This will mark the first time the two schools have met on the gridiron.
