Mrs. Malmin and her husband, the Rev. C. K. Malmin, had been housemother and housefather for the dormitory since September 1, 1956. Rev. Malmin will continue his dual role as housefather and teacher at Norwegian.

President S. C. Eastvold will conduct funeral services tomorrow in the United Lutheran Church, Pigeon Falls, Wisconsin. Rev. Malmin was pastor of that church from 1939-50.

**Funeral Conducted Tuesday**

Funeral services were conducted here Tuesday in Trinity Lutheran Church by the Rev. Erling C. Thompson. Mrs. Malmin was a member of Trinity. Dr. Eastvold conducted memorial services during the regular chapel service Wednesday. The "Choir of the West" sang.

Rev. Malmin will return from Wisconsin February 24. Dr. Donald Farmer is serving as Old Main housefather during his absence.

**Born in Minnesota**

Mrs. Malmin was born in Windom, Minnesota, and married Mr. Malmin in 1917. They were missionaries at Igloo, Alaska, from 1917-21. They then served parishes in Heron Lake, Minn.; Ketchikan, Alaska; Florence, S. D.; Raymond, Wash.; Pigeon Falls, and Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

Survivors besides her husband include three children, Mrs. Corinne Jones of Anchorage, Alaska; Mrs. Mildred Sebbins of Minneapolis, and John K. Malmin of Menomonie, Wisconsin; two sisters, two brothers; and seven grandchildren. The three children all attended PLC.

Report of a prowler at the window of one of the girls' rooms at South Hall brought Pierce County Sheriff's deputies to PLC's campus Saturday night.

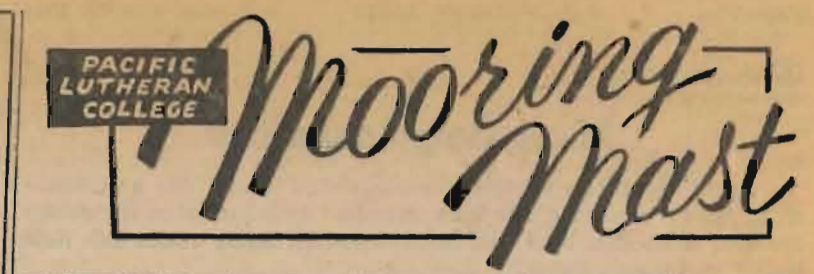

Miss Berk received a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Washington in 1951. She is a candidate for the master of arts degree in English from the university at the coming spring commencement. She had a graduate assistantship at the university and has taught in public high schools.

Miss Olson received a bachelor of arts degree with honors, in biology, from PLC in 1954. She has completed her work in the field of nursing education at the Stanford University College of Nursing.

Miss Olson is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford O. Olson, who live one block from the campus. Olson was coach of athletics and director of athletics here from 1930-48.

Miss Olson is teaching in the clinical division of the Department of Nursing at Emanuel Hospital in Portland.

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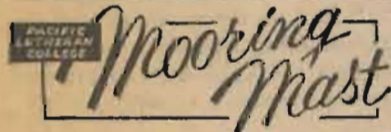
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
