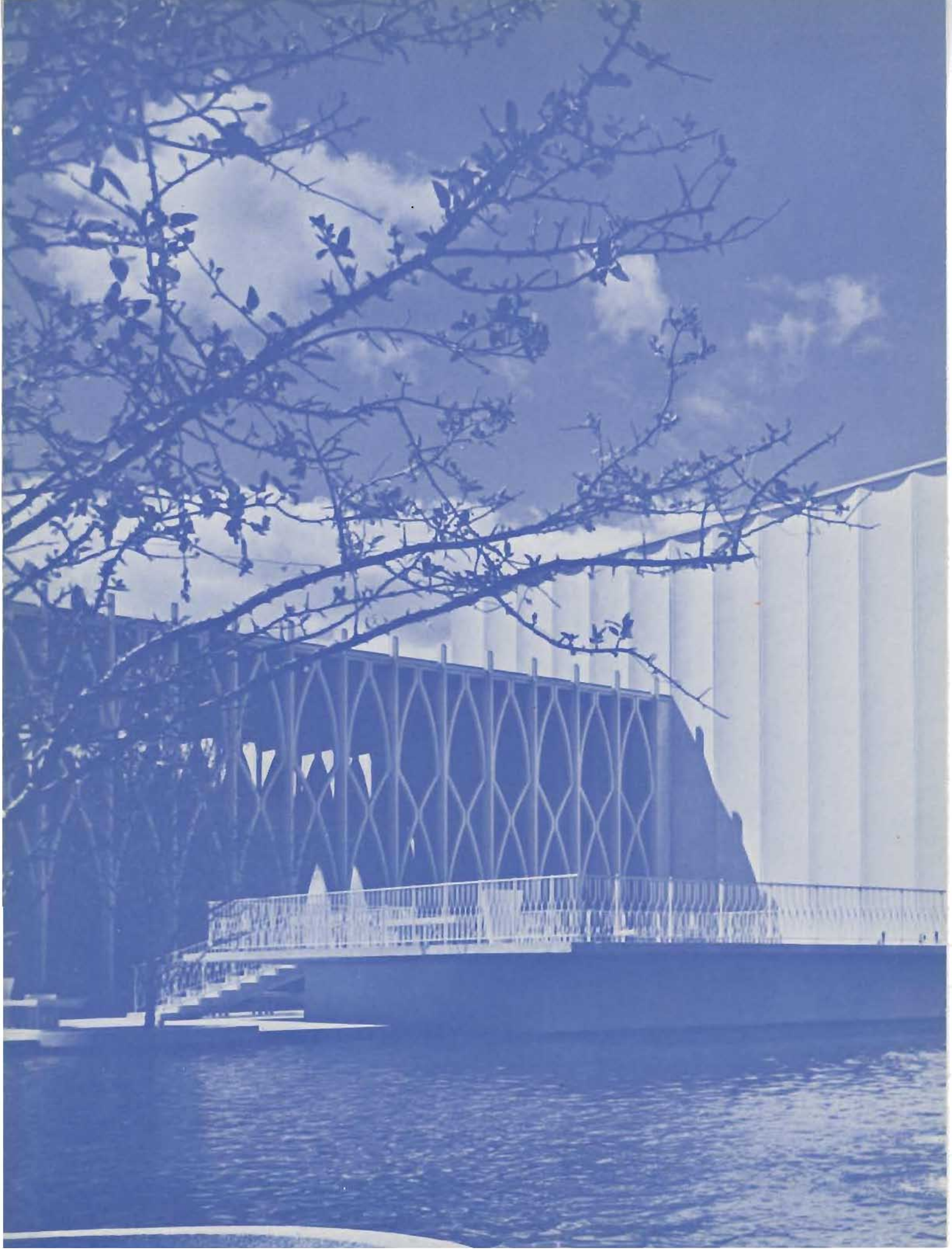
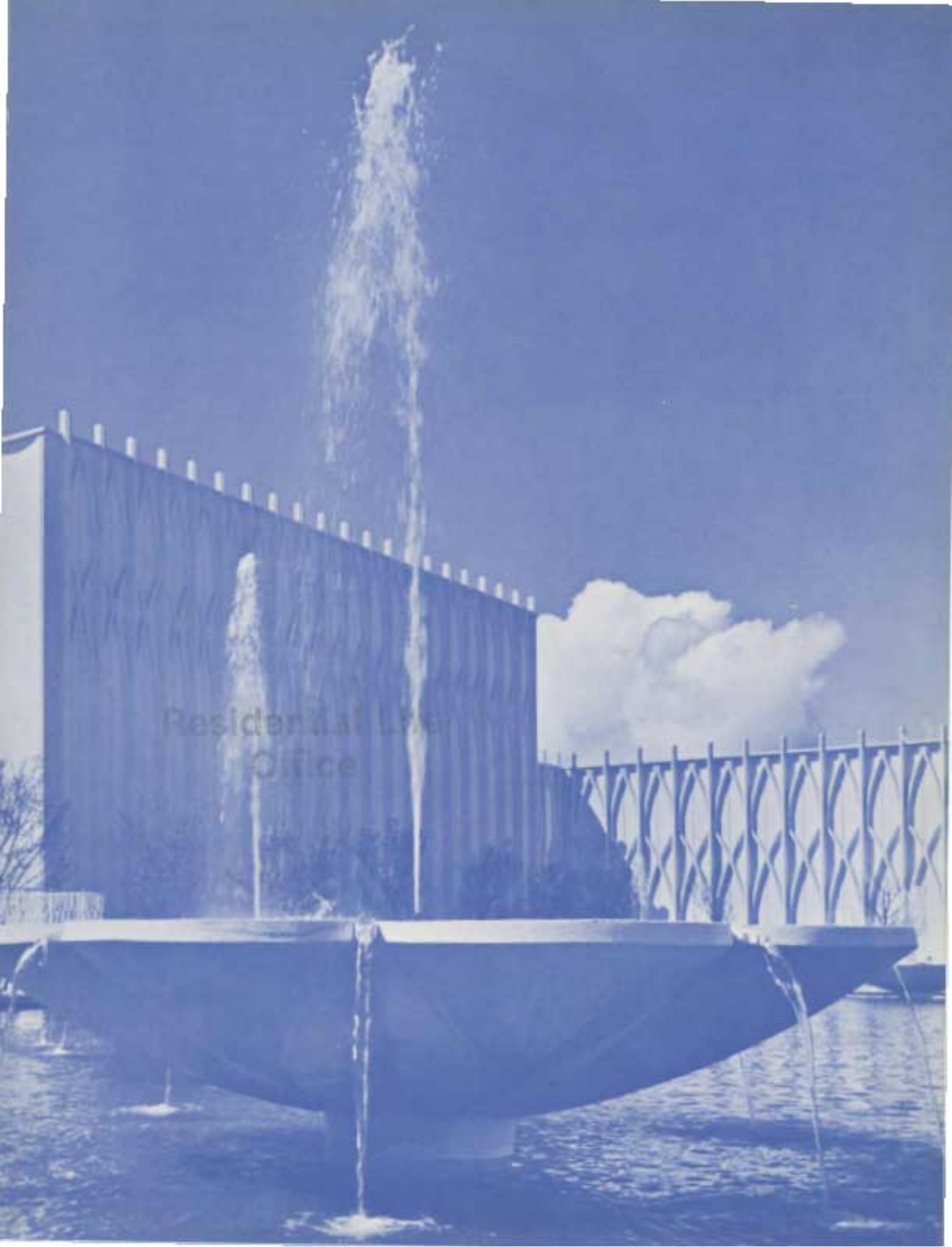

Saga of PLU Sagas



Entering the campus of Pacific Lutheran College in 1930, the SAGA found the campus on the edge of a frontier. Pioneering in the Pacific Northwest was a campus which was destined to grow. Pioneering on that campus was the book which grew to become an annual publication.

The Norse title, SAGA, was chosen to remind the students of the Scandinavian pioneers who found-

ed this institution. That title and the pioneering motive have lived on and continue in the frontier of the space age.

Not only did the SAGA enter an active and growing campus, but it increased with the school and became a symbol and a permanent record of each year's memories.

1930 to 1962

Today's PLU students enjoy a campus which combines the new with the old — buildings, customs, and traditions. Yet, today, as in 1930, and in the year of the school's founding, 1890, Pacific Lutheran proclaims "a changeless Christ in a changing world."

Beginning the seventy-first year of Pacific Lutheran University, Dr. S. C. Eastvold gave the opening Chapel address in this his nineteenth year as PLU President on the theme, "Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today, and always." This passage from Hebrews is also a theme of the Century 21 Exposition being celebrated this year in Seattle.

In contrast to the rustic colors of the first SAGAS, we've chosen the striking contrasts of the World's Fair color scheme to portray our book.

Thus, with an eye to the future, and a unity built upon the past, this year's SAGA projects itself onward, forward, and upward.

Mrs. Eastvold, reminiscing with a friend over a cup of coffee one afternoon, said, "I read a new version—rather deflating—of the old cliché about a woman standing behind every man: 'Behind every successful man there stands a wife. This probably explains why a successful man never looks back.' What does that do to one's ego?" However, Mrs. Eastvold has really been behind her husband as they together have been the beloved parents of the PLU family.

Mrs. Eastvold said relations with the students these nineteen years have been precious and varied as the school has grown. "We had many social functions in our home the first years. The student body was small and this seemed an appropriate place for them . . . the freshman reception, the President's reception for seniors, Halloween parties, midnight snacks when the students decorated the daffodil floats, coffee parties after concerts, foreign students Christmas parties . . .

"The student body really out-did itself when we returned from our world tour in 1958. Flying from Hawaii, we were to arrive at 7 a.m., but were an hour and forty-five minutes early. We knew that one faculty member planned to meet us at 7, but we thought, 'there will be no one to meet us now; so we'd better dash out and catch the limousine for the Winthrop Hotel and take a taxi out to Park-

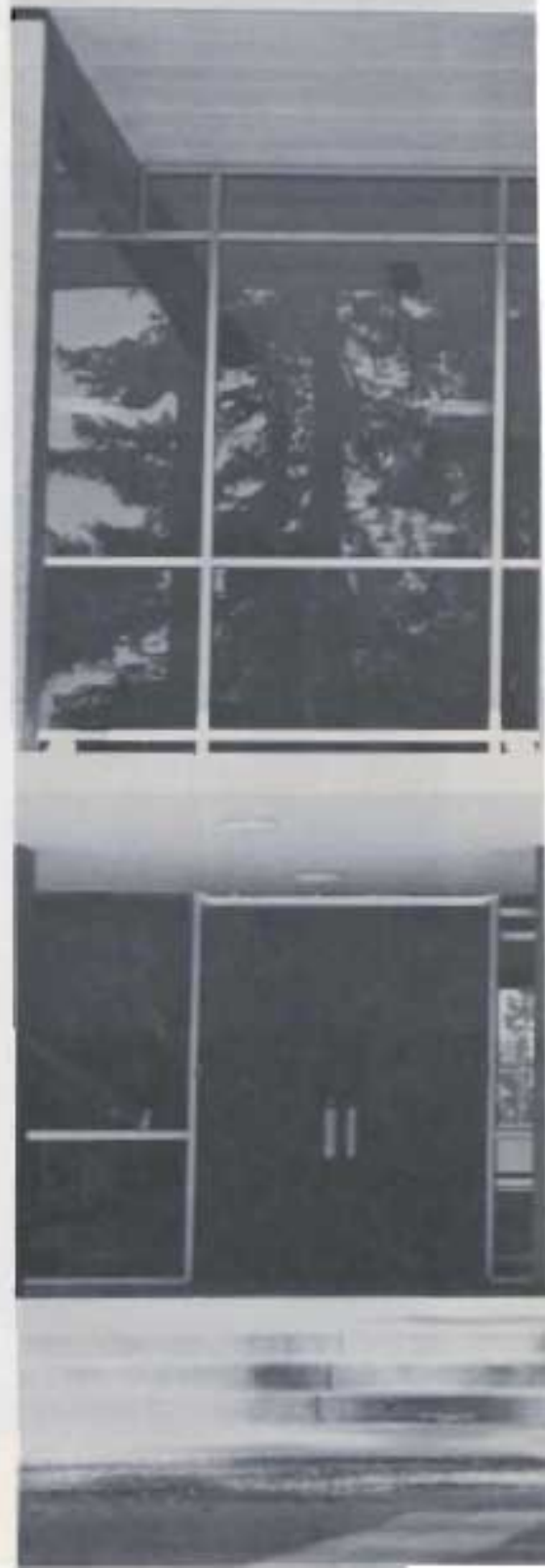
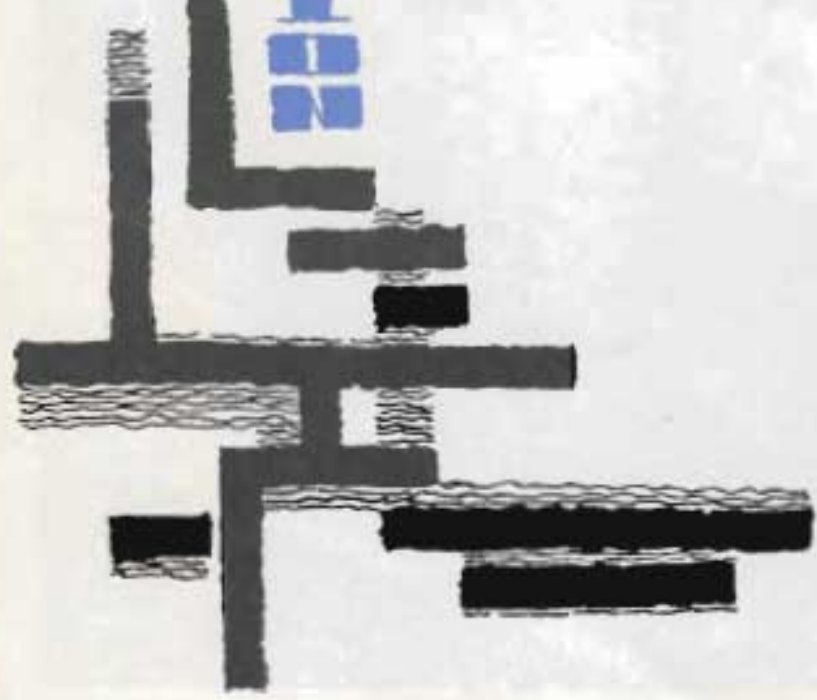
land. As we were to disembark, the stewardess told us to wait, to leave the plane last! Imagine our happy surprise, upon hearing and seeing the PLC band, the cheer leaders, 500 students, numerous faculty and staff members and friends . . . we were filled with joy . . . Everyone knew that the President was glad to be back the way he passed around the kisses to all the women. He even had to welcome the witty girls in line a second time. This reception was the high light of our world tour and one of the very greatest moments in our 40 years of married life.

"At 10 a.m. we came to an all-college reception and program entirely sponsored by the students . . . as we were being escorted into the Chapel, the audience rose and sang, 'Now Thank We All Our God' . . . indeed a unique occasion."

Mrs. Eastvold believes a bit of Tennyson's philosophy which she often uses is true: "Tho' you travel the world over in search of the beautiful—you must carry it with you lest you find it not." It was carried with them around the world and they brought it home again. Though Dr. and Mrs. Eastvold now leave the Pacific Lutheran University campus, their great influence remains throughout the campus where they have served so graciously.

"Dr. Eastvold has spent the major part of his life in the service of mankind as a leading and able administrator. His career has been distinguished by a fine mind, sound discretion and a Christian understanding. This leadership has had a marked and lasting influence for good in all of Pierce County and the city of Tacoma." Thus read a resolution passed by the Pierce County Commissioners.

Since Dr. Eastvold came to Pacific Lutheran College in 1943, the Memorial Gymnasium, Science Building, Chapel-Music-Speech Building, North, South, West, Ivy, Delta, and Evergreen Residence Halls, the covered swimming pool, College Union

Building, and the Tacoma-Pierce Administration Building have been erected. Since 1943 the total enrollment has increased fourteen times.

College leaders of the American Lutheran Church honored Dr. Eastvold, "for long and faithful service to the Church's educational ministry as a pastor, college trustee, member of the Church's Board of Education, and college president . . ."

The resolution passed by our Board of Regents is but a small token of the homage which PLU owes Dr. Eastvold: "the building . . . now known as the Chapel-Music-Speech Building, shall henceforth be known as Eastvold Chapel."

Advanced professional training in the area of a student's specialization in education is offered through the PLU graduate program. Opportunity is provided for research and special investigations in the student's area of knowledge.

For his major area of concentration a Graduate student selects any one of the following fields: Elementary or Secondary School Administration, Guidance and Counseling, and Elementary Classroom Teaching or Secondary Classroom Teaching. Minors are offered in the following fields: art, biology, business administration, chemistry, English, health and physical education, history, music, political science, psychology, sociology, and speech.

The total graduate program is supervised by a graduate committee composed of the Dean of the Graduate School, two representatives of the college or school offering the major, and the chairman of the department of the minor field.

The School of Education offers both an undergraduate and graduate opportunity to prepare students for careers in the teaching profession. The undergraduate curriculum meets the certification pattern of Washington. The School offers degrees of Bachelor of Arts in Education and Master of Arts in Education.

In the undergraduate program, for example, after a preparation of introductory and methods

courses, senior education majors spend a semester doing student teaching on two levels. Placed in the schools of the Tacoma area, cadet teachers concentrate on their preferred teaching levels in the morning, and their lesser preferred in the afternoon.

The general purpose of the School is to contribute to the development of professional elementary and secondary teachers with liberal and scientific education integrated with a Christian atmosphere.

Nursing

PLU's School of Nursing has a specific curriculum set up so that a high school graduate may get her Bachelor of Science in Nursing and be qualified to take the RN licensing examination in four years and a summer. This preparation of the professional nurse includes education in all available fields so that she may go into any area of nursing that she wishes.

This year's senior class was the last remnant of

the curriculum that worked with Emmanuel Hospital in Portland. The Nursing Program is now kept in the Tacoma area and utilizes over nine local hospitals and health agencies to provide the nursing experience essential to any training. The School also offers a baccalaureate program for registered nurses who graduated from a diploma nursing program. This is the only school requiring a fixed major from the beginning since the curriculum begins with the freshman year.

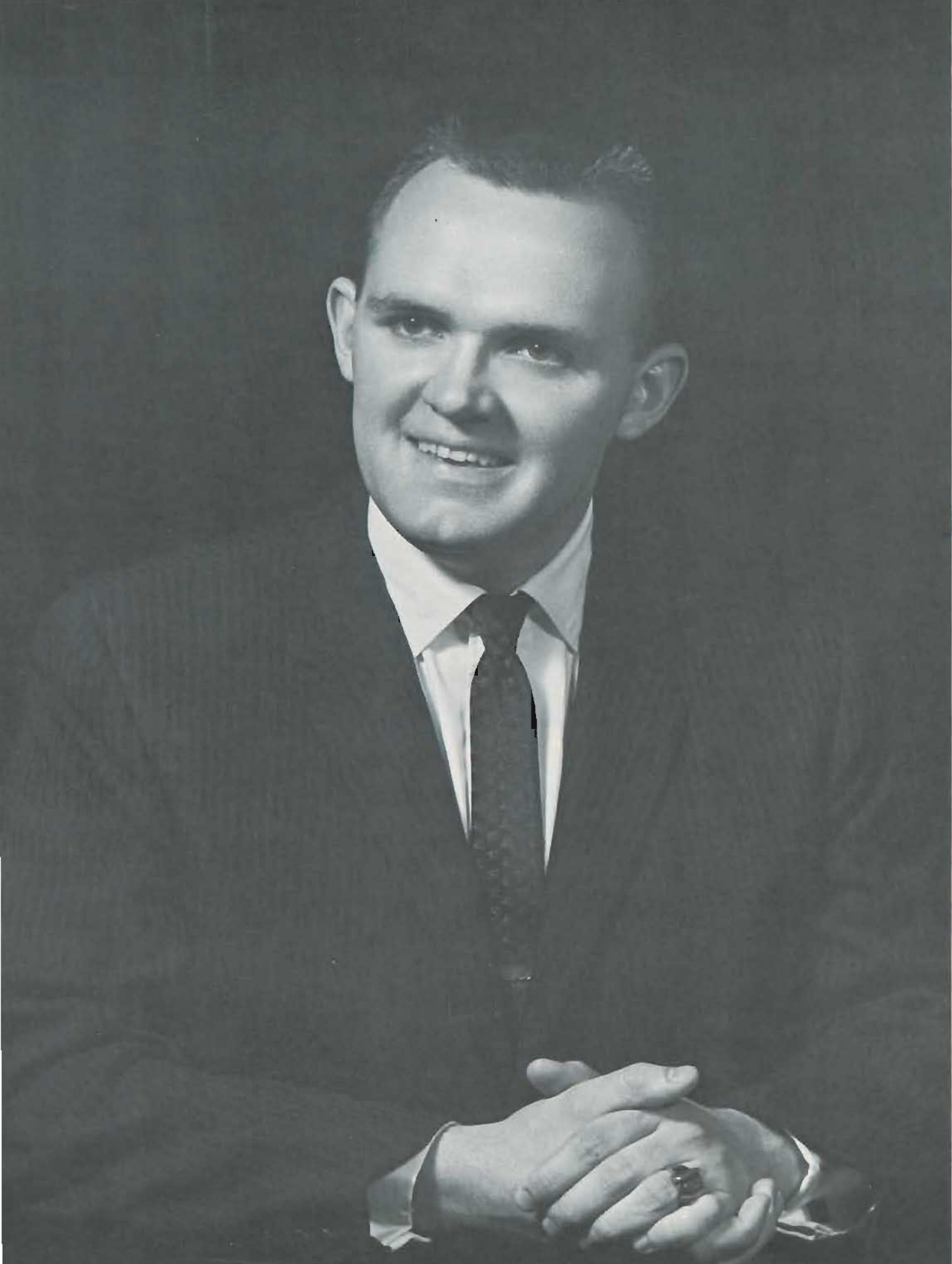

The administrative policies of the ASPLU are handled by the Student Council and they act as the legal administrative body in carrying out these activities. Members of the Student Council include: Student Body President, First and Second Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Saga Business Manager, Mooring Mast Editor, and a representative from each class. Dr. Kristen Solberg, Dean of Students, and Miss Margaret Wickstrom, Assistant Dean of Students, serve as the faculty representatives and advisers to Student Council.

The Student Council must pass or reject bills over all student body activities as well as publications and the Artist Series. In its busy schedule, the Student Council is also in charge of the Student Convocation on Tuesday mornings. These convocations, if not used for ASPLU business, are placed in the hands of the four classes which alternate in presenting the programs.

Charles Mays, ASPLU President, believes that the council exists only to serve the students at PLU. Charles has done a fine job in keeping the affairs of student government in their busy routine.

Many activities sponsored at PLU are under the auspices of the Inter-Club Council. This is an organization composed of the Vice-President of each recognized club and honorary on campus. Every class and dorm is also represented. Miss Margaret Wickstrom, Dean of Women, is adviser and Al Blomquist, ASPLU Second Vice-President, is ICC President. Pictured below is the administrative body of the ICC, the Social Activities Board.

ICC is a channel for the coordination, scheduling and planning of the various activities of clubs and organizations. Application is made to ICC for activity dates and approval must be granted. In this way, conflicting dates can be avoided and the activities can function smoothly.

The main purpose of ICC is to advise the organizations so that their programs will appeal to the members of the student body. They also try to see that the organizations are functioning in accordance with their constitutions.

Even though ICC is a busy organization, it sponsors events of its own, including an annual Leadership Retreat in the fall.

Each year the SAGA staff works many hours to complete a memorable yearbook for the student body. The planning of such a yearbook begins with the theme, section allotment, and arrangement of the book. After a skeleton is constructed, the section editors and their staff members submit 'thumbnail sketches.' Considered in these sketches are balance, color, and headlines.

With the 'thumbnail sketches' in hand, a 'dummy' is drawn up. This serves as an outline and guide for the remaining work on the book. Copy tells the story of the school's activities and events; and the index gives an accurate list of the students pictured.

When the photographs have been taken and printed and the copy finished, pages are pasted up. Pasteups are the finished pages in unprinted form—an exact copy of the finished product.

The business staff of the SAGA is in charge of the ads, Saga Carnival, and billing the various organizations on campus.

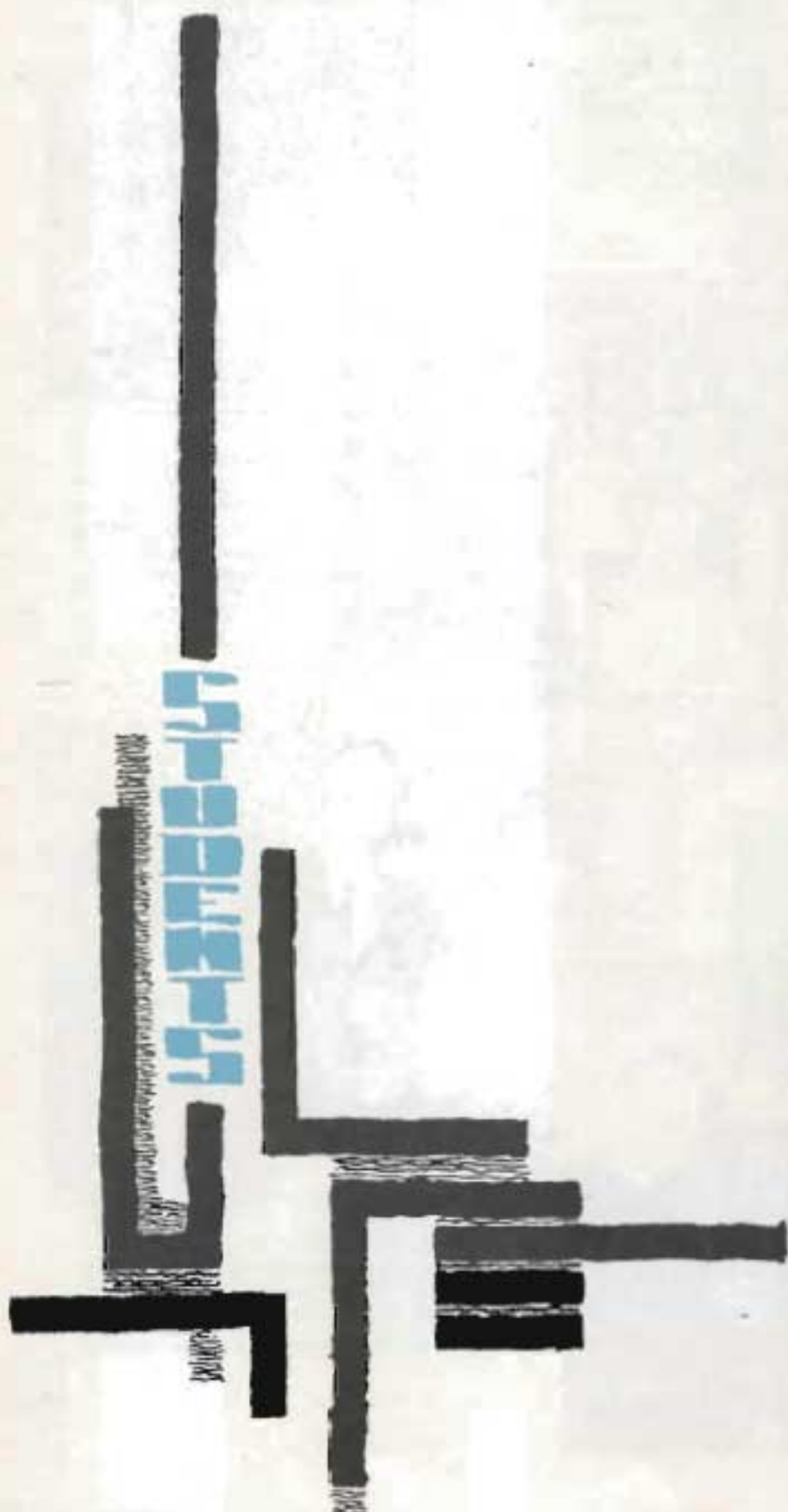


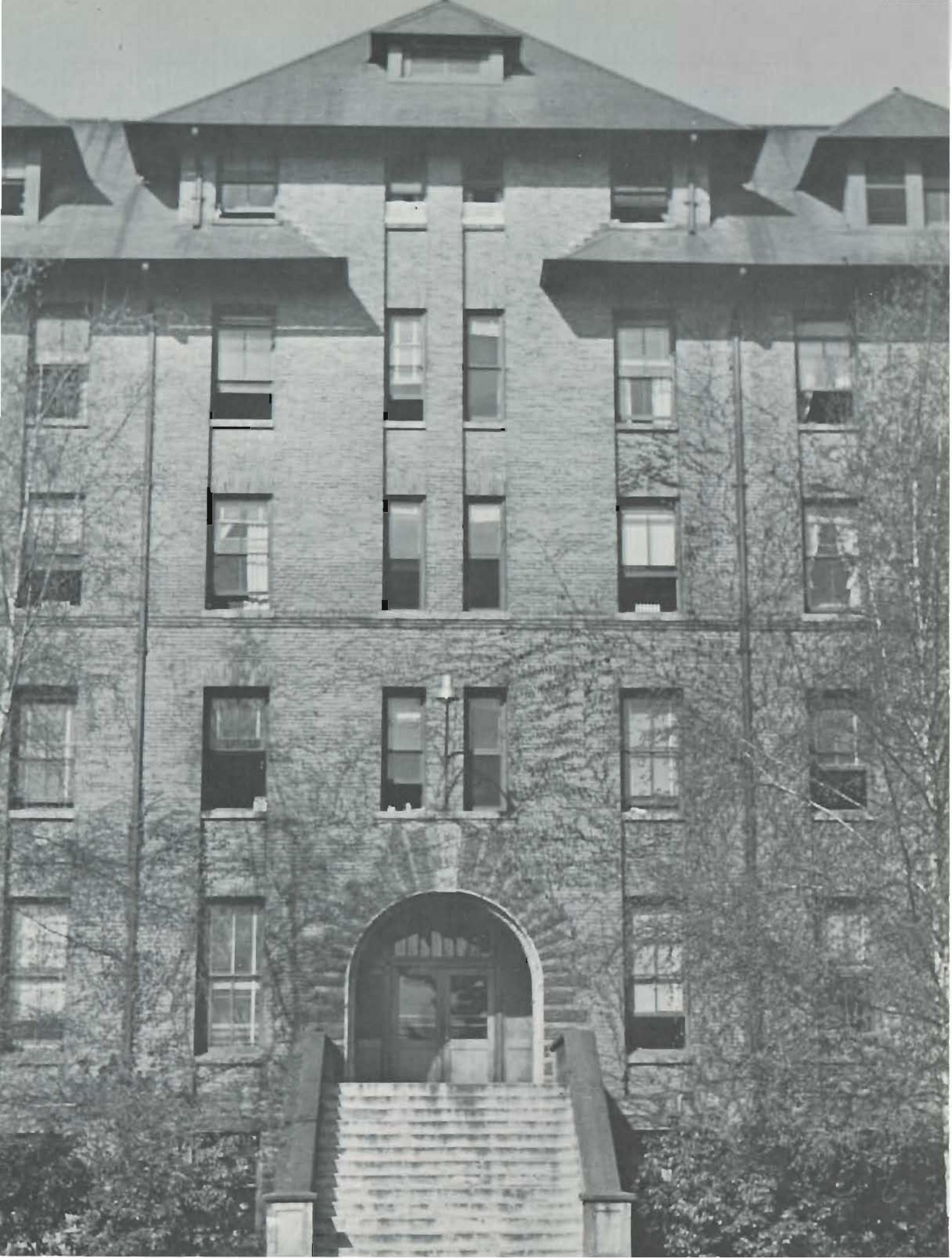

The identity of the Lucia Bride was revealed to the Spurn, sponsors of the event each year, in a sealing ceremony before the main program. In the program itself Charles Mays lit the symbolic candles of her crown. The Lucia Bride Festival is a perpetuation of a Swedish legend which tells of Lucia, a bride-to-be, who gave her dowry to the church when her prayers for her mother's health were answered. When Lucia's fiancé heard of it, he killed her, whereupon Lucia was transformed. She appears in Sweden now during the Christmas season dressed in a white robe and with a crown of candles upon her head.

An American operetta, "Amahl and the Night Visitors," is enjoyed by many each year. The climax of the season is the candle-lighting service. All of these traditions are combined into PLU's own tradition of decorating the rooms, dorms, and campus.

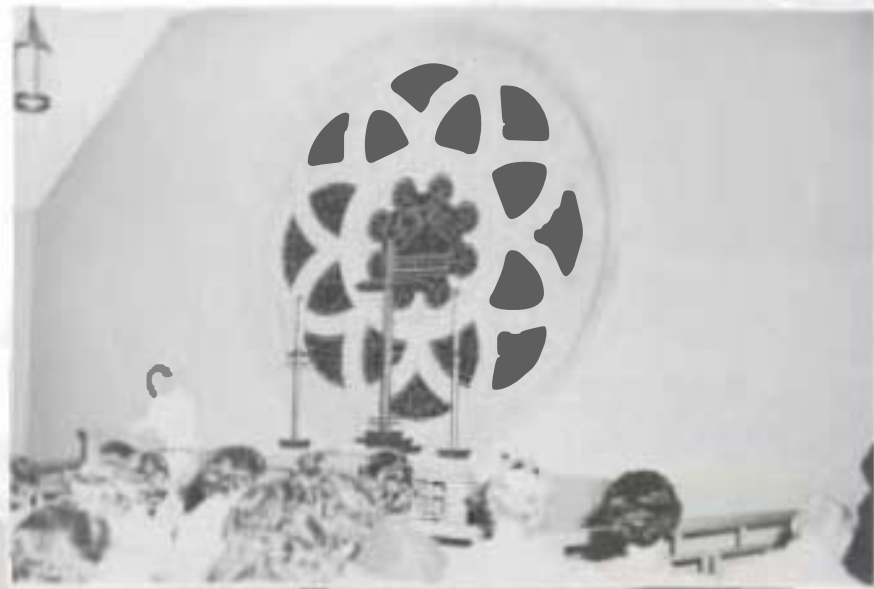

Mission Week Division Outstanding Speakers

Missionaries Johnson of Madagascar and Martinson of Hong Kong were the speakers for this year's annual Mission Festival, sponsored by the Mission Crusaders.

Speaking on the threat of Communism in Asia, Rev. Harold H. Martinson, President of Luther Seminary in Hong Kong, gave a lecture on the "Red Dragon Over Asia." The Rev. Martinson, born of missionary parents in China, went to the Chinese Mission Field in 1930 after attending college in this country. He later fled with thousands of Chinese when the Reds dropped the Bamboo Curtain. The Rev. C. Russell Johnson has been a missionary to Madagascar since 1946 and is now President of Luther Seminary Ivory-Finarantsoa. Both men earned their B.A. degrees from St. Olaf College and B.Th. degrees from Luther Theological Seminary.

With these two prominent missionaries, the greatest Mission Festival in the history of Pacific Lutheran University was held.

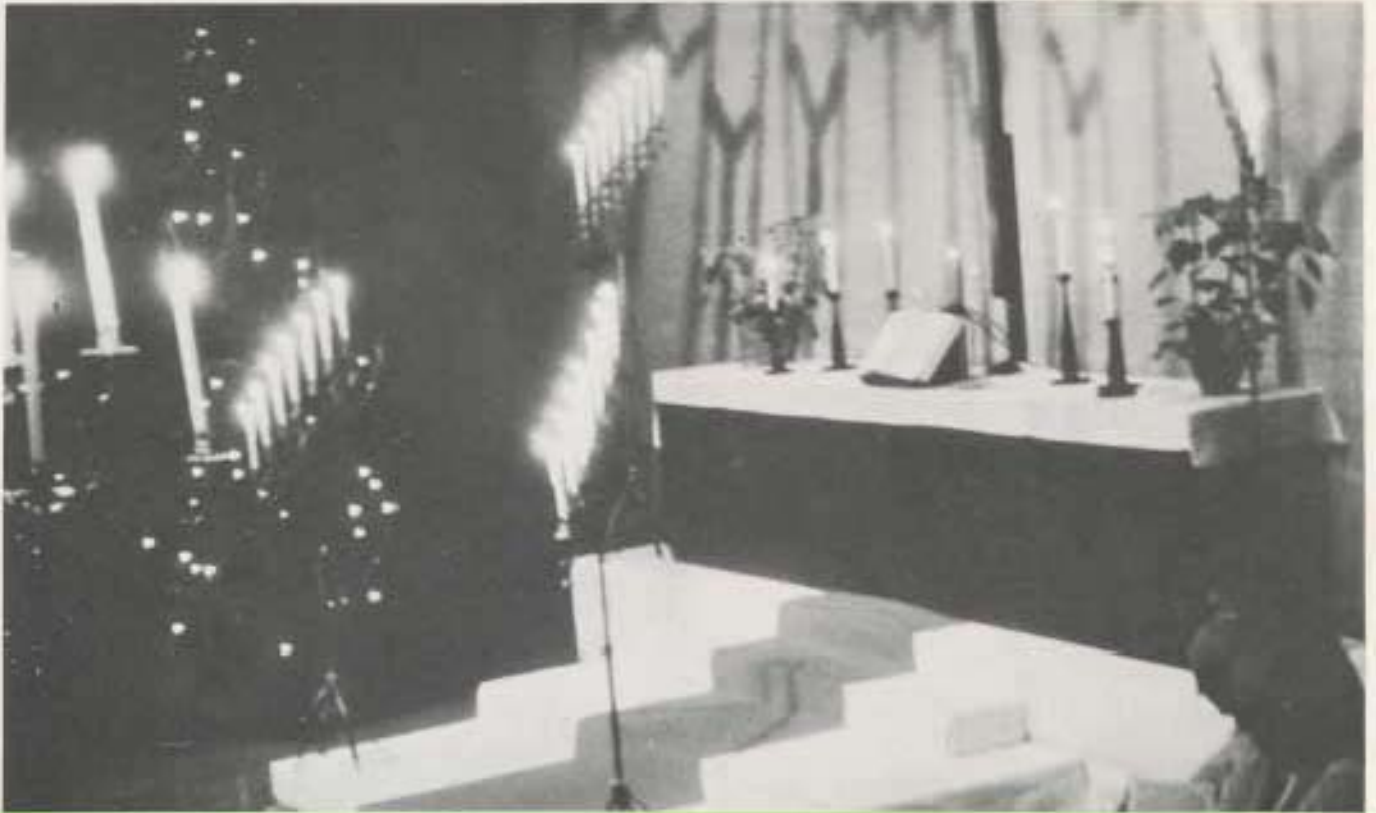

"The hammer blows of the Reformation led by Martin Luther shattered men's self-righteousness." . . . so said Dr. Wilton E. Bergstrand as he told the story of Martin Luther to the student body and public at the annual Lutheran Reformation Festival.

Dr. Bergstrand, born in Bloomington, Illinois, moved with his family to Dassel, Minnesota, at the age of six. In 1930, he was graduated from Gustavus Adolphus at St. Peter, Minnesota, being valedictorian of his class and a member of the national championship debate team. As youth director of the Augustana Lutheran Church, he has traveled a million miles on this continent in the service of youth.

Speaking on the contribution of the reformer, Dr. Bergstrand said "Luther's act of translating the Bible into the language of the people in three months was the greatest literary feat in history." Tracing the early history of America he said that "God kept the doors of this continent locked until the Reformation in order that it might be a free, Christian land."

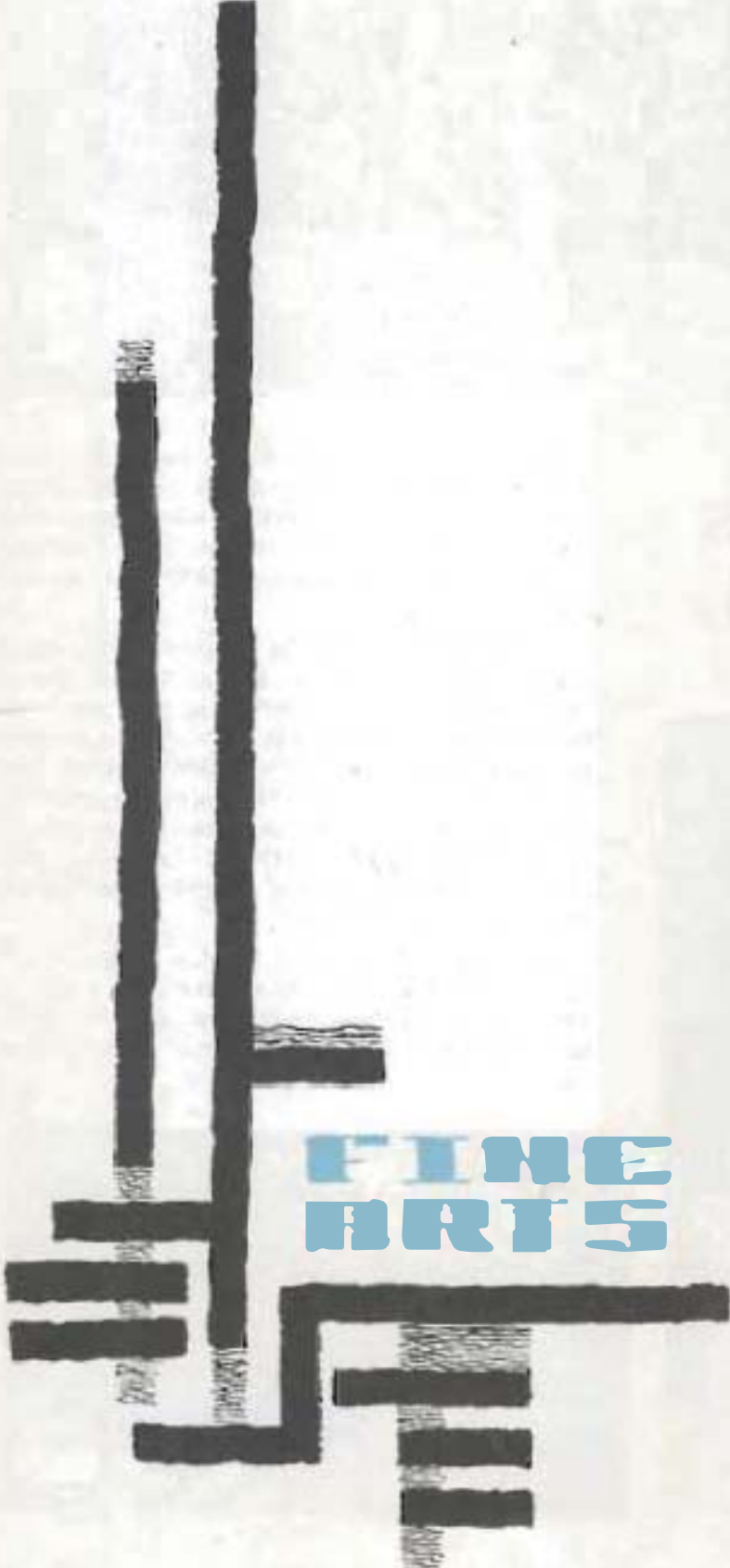
Dr. Belgum Leads Spiritual Emphasis

Gabrielsen will yield his head coaching position to Roy Carlson, more recently an assistant coach at Washington State University. What is even more disastrous for the Knights is the fact that quarterback Doug McClary and end Dave Bottemiller, key figures for the past three seasons will not be around for the next round of Evergreen battles. However, Carlson is gaining a fine crop of linemen, including all-leaguer Norm Juggert, to build in front of backs Keith Shahan and Billy White. The material might not be on hand to produce a championship contender for the 1962 season, but it can be said that the Knights will never give up fighting under their new leader. With the aid of an expected fine crop of incoming freshmen, PLU could regain its powerhouse status which it was noted for in the years past.

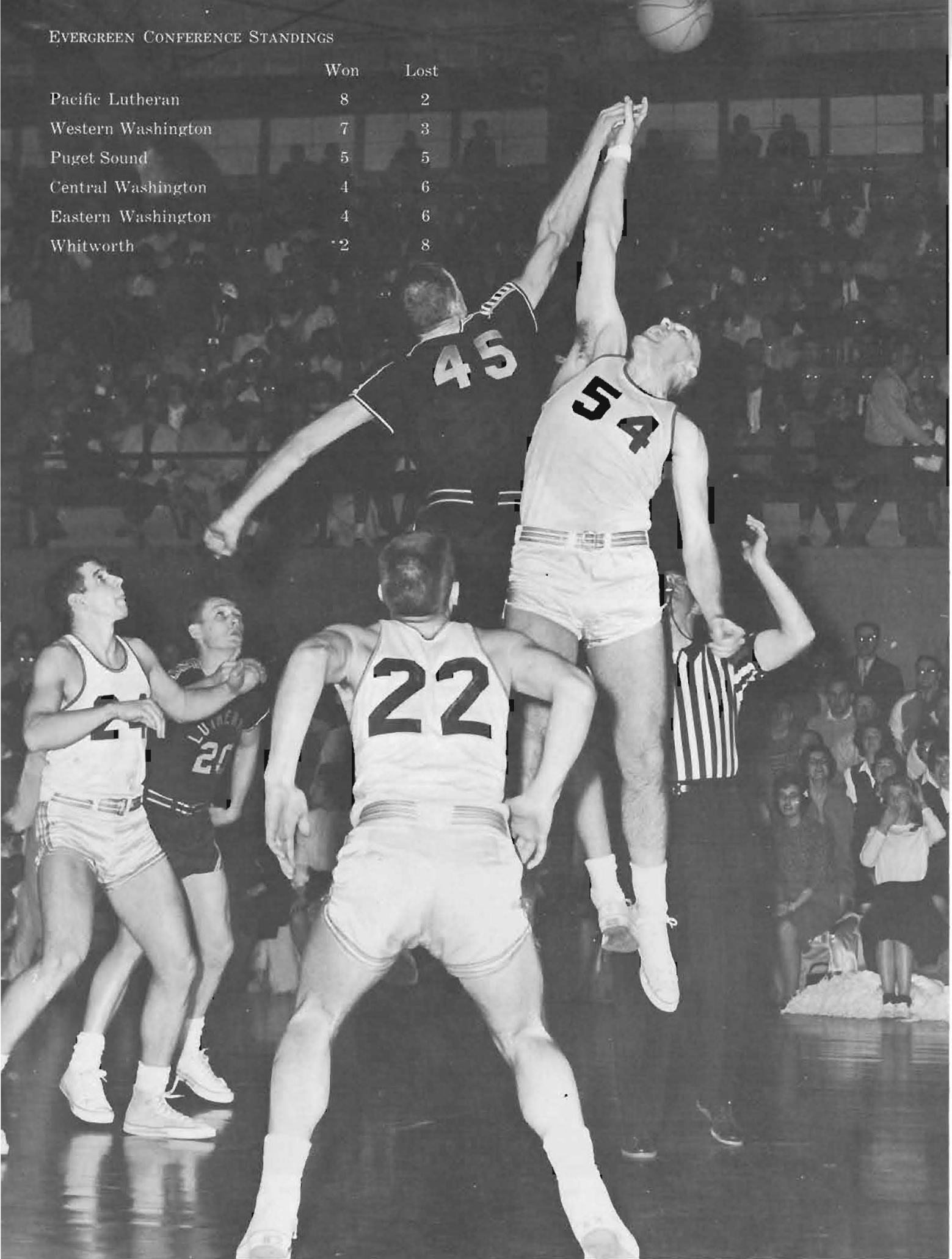

Fredrickson was high man against the Studs with 22. In the St. Martins game both Jon Malmin and Hans Albertsson had 16 apiece. In the third practice game, the Lutes trounced Western Montana 87 to 76, with Albertsson having 26 and Fredrickson 25. Against Willamette University, PLU had more success, winning 78 to 64. Jim Castleberry led the scoring with 21 markers while Hans was right behind with 20. In the Linfield game PLU managed to escape with a 70 to 69 victory as Larry Poulsen hit for 18 points. PLU's first defeat of the season came at the hands of Lewis and Clark College, the final score being 79 to 75. Fredrickson and Poulsen had 24 and 16, respectively, in this game. In a second game with Linfield, the Lutes won decisively, 89 to 61, as big Hans Albertsson had one of his greatest nights, scoring 37 points. In a pre-league contest with across-town rivals UPS, the Knights lost their second game of the season, 86 to 79, despite a 26-point effort by Albertsson. In their next game the Lutes came back to defeat the Cheney Studs again, 72 to 67, as the big Swede again had 26 points. In a game against Montana State, the Knights went down to defeat for the third time, 66 to 65. Fredrickson had 18 in this game. In their final practice game of the season, PLU crushed the defensive-minded Portland State club, 78 to 55 as Poulsen scored 18 and Mike Healey, 12.

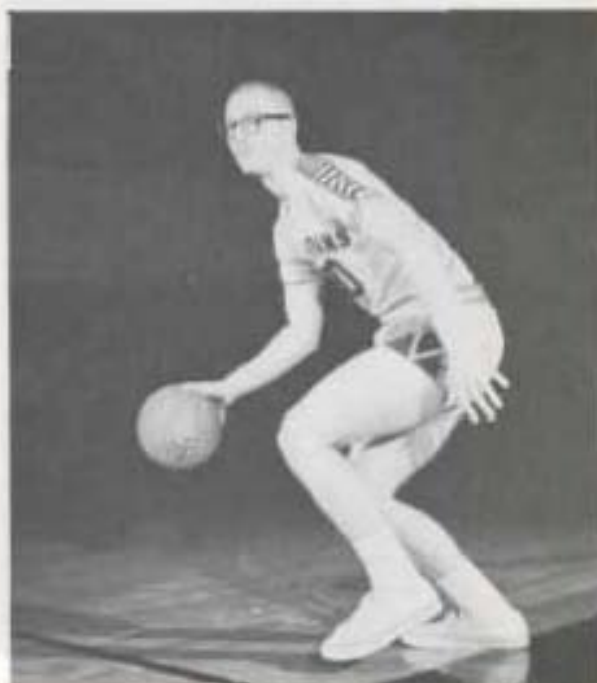
PLU Crushes Whitworth Twice

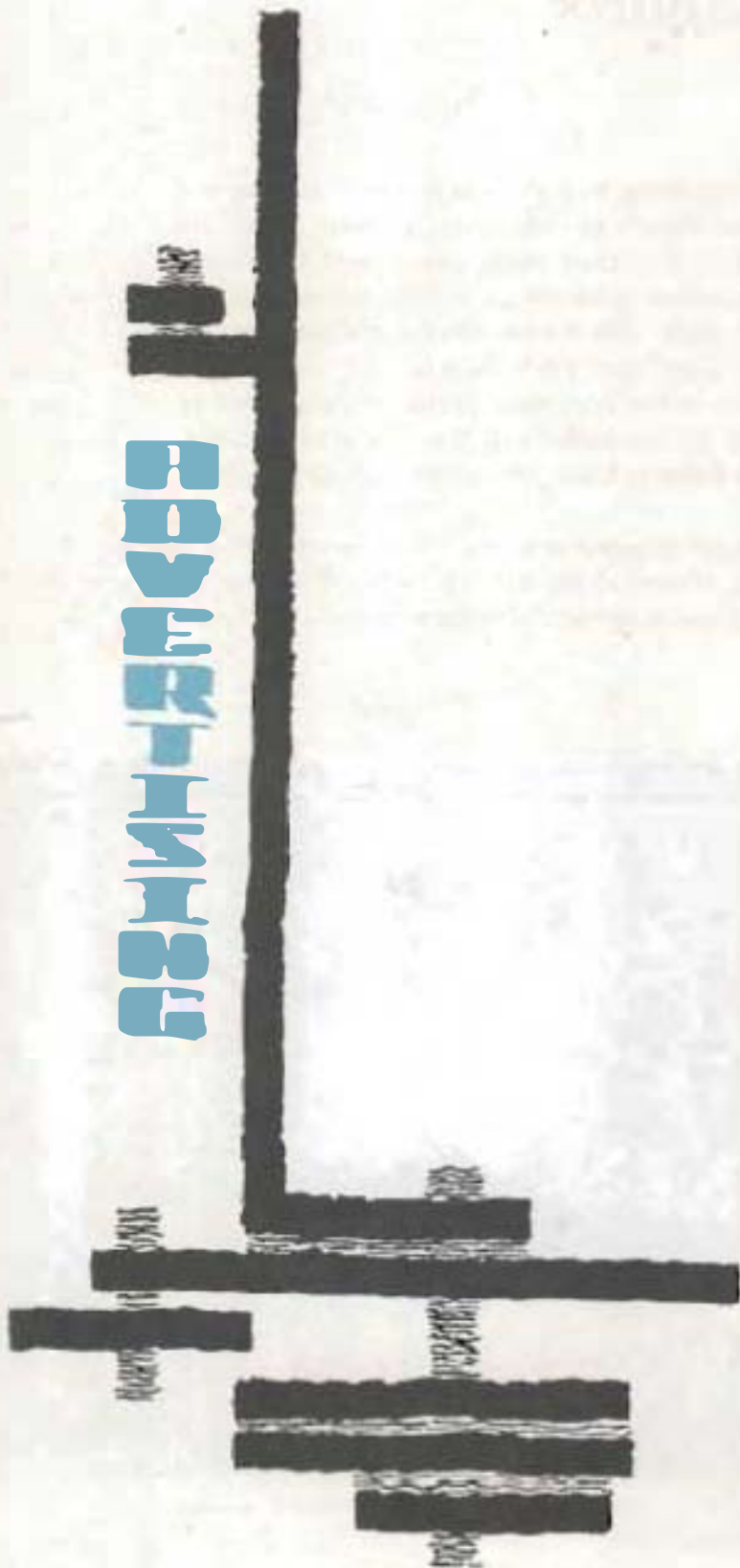

Evergreen Court won 11th place of the Intramural Crown for the 1961-1962 season. Pictured here is their first-place football team.

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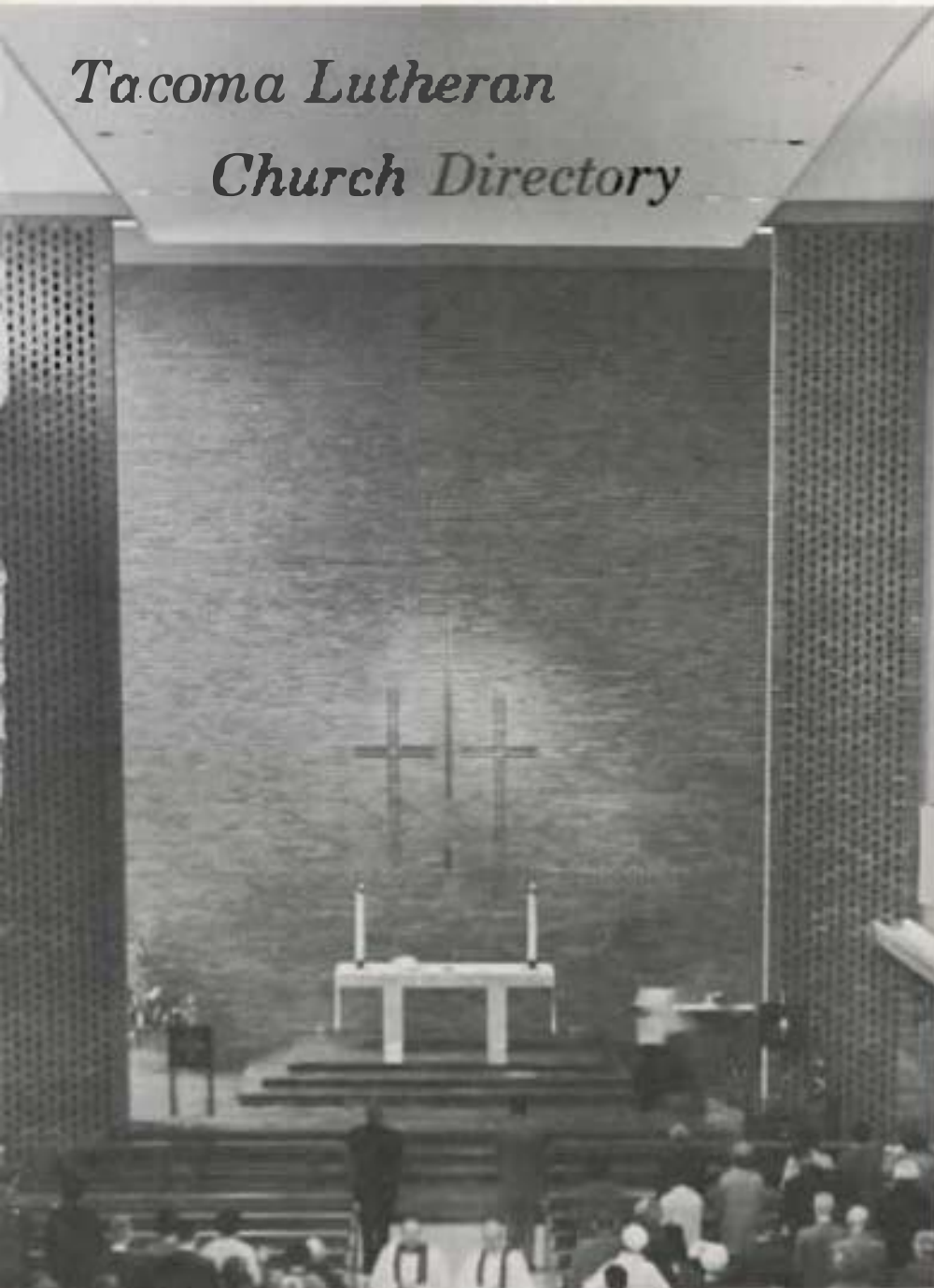
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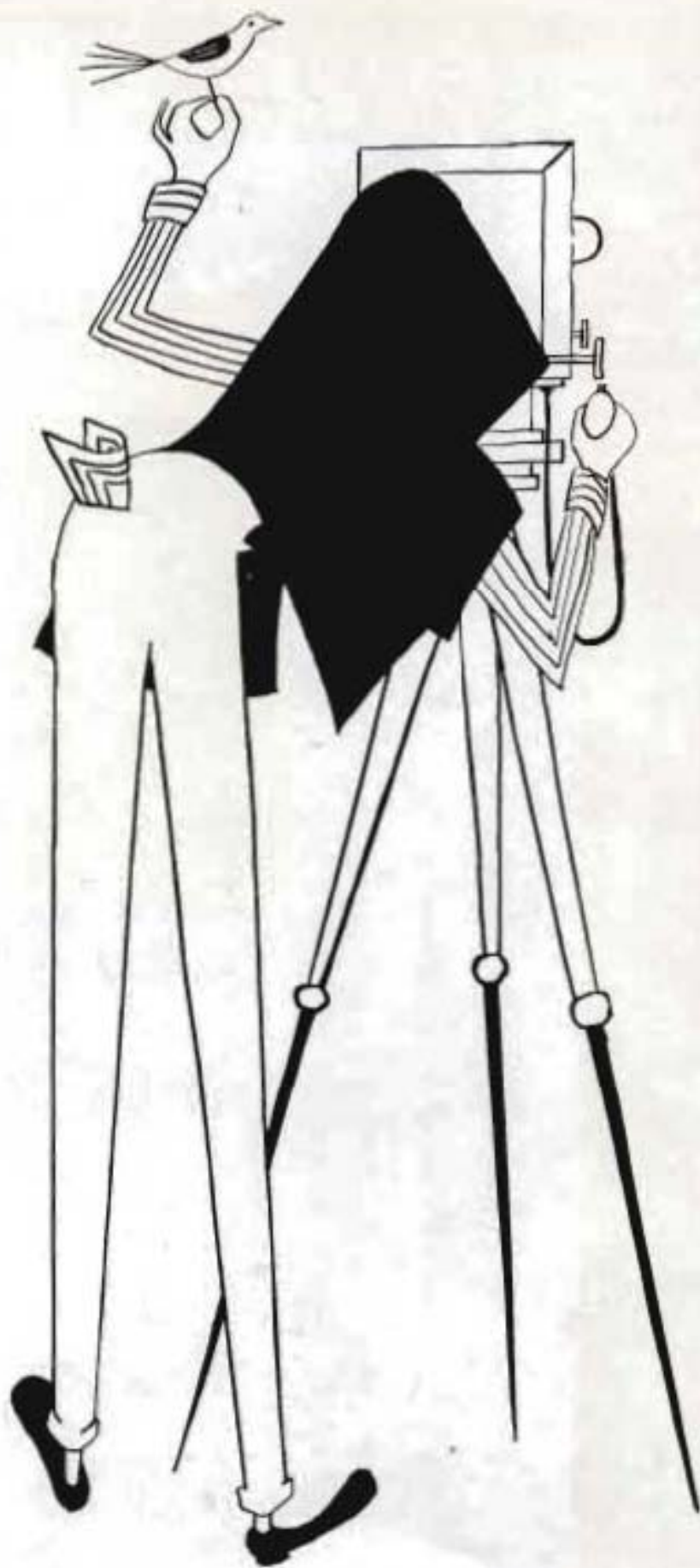

Incorporated in this book is the idea of progress and progression into the future. The Space Age and its challenges loom before our present student body.

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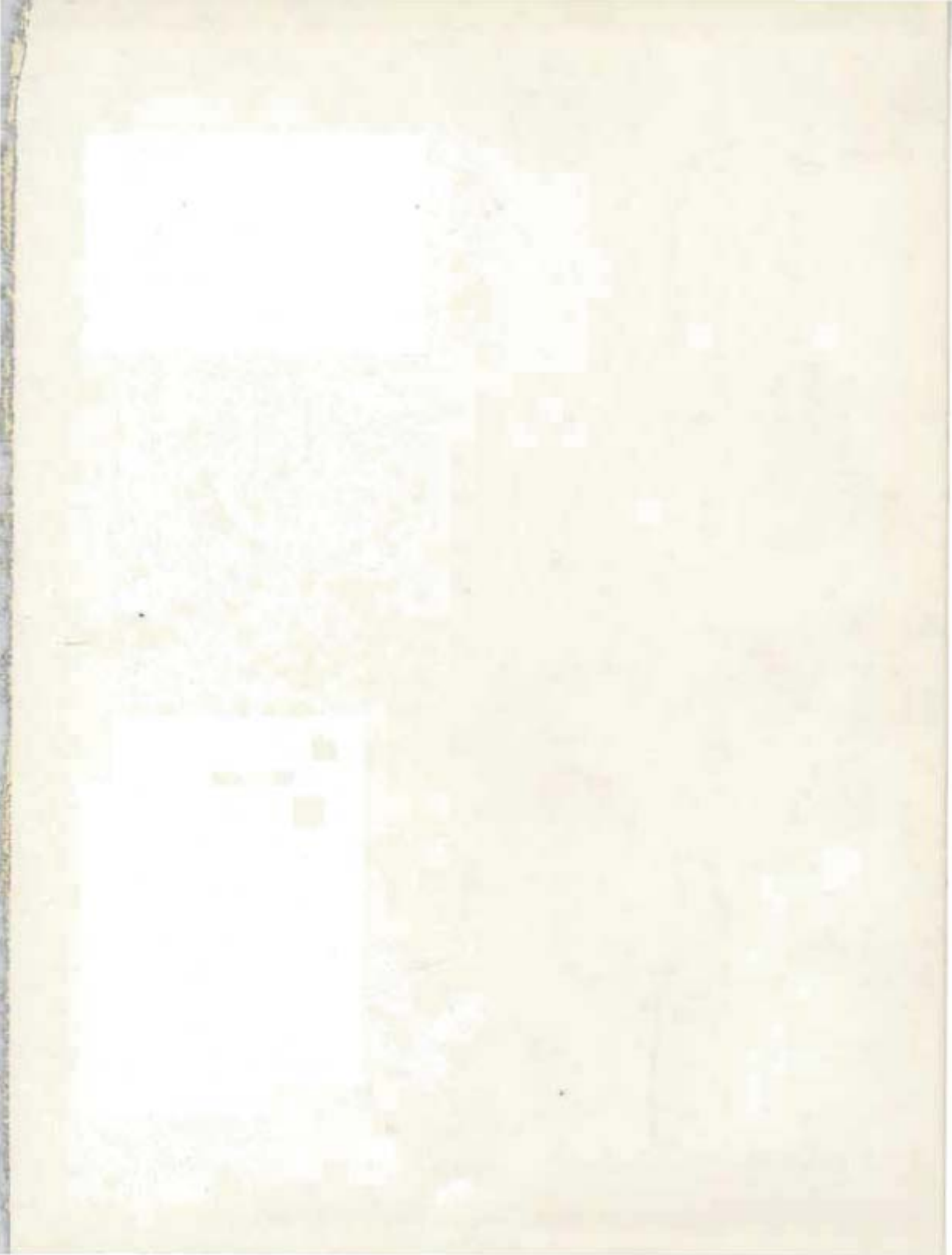
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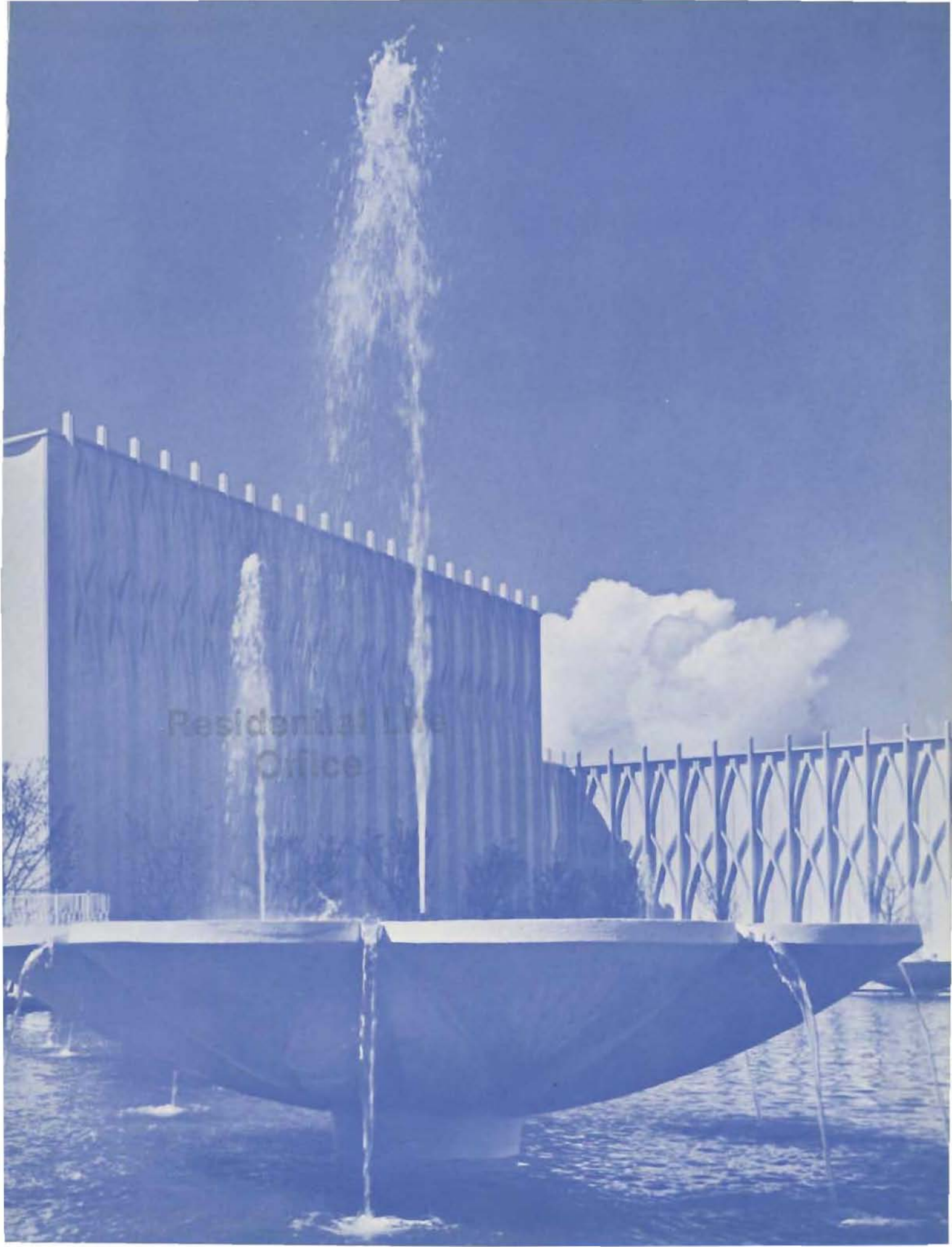
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
