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

BISHOP LILJE, DISTINGUISHED CHURCHMAN, TO BE HONORED HERE "Man of Ia Mancha," Pacific Lutheran University's fall musical, is underway this weekerd. It is being presented in Eastvold Auditorium Oct. 15-17 and 24. The lead role is played by Bruce Bjerke, left, a junior from Walla Walla. Connie Koschmann, a senior from Juneau, Alaska, portrays Aldonza. Tickets are on sale at the University Center. Curtain time is 8:30 eath evening.

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Bishop Hanns Lilje, leader of the Lutheran Church of Hannover, Germany since 1947 and former president of the Lutheran World Federation, will receive an honorary degree from Pacific Lutheran University luesuay, oct. 20.

The ceremony, with the degree being conferred by PLU President Eugene Wiegman, will be held in Eastvold Auditorium at 9:50 a.m.

Receptions for the distinguished churchman will be held throughout the day, with a public reception scheduled for 10:30 a.m. in the new University Center.

Pastor Lilje, the elder statesman of world Lutheranism, has often been called "the man God spared." During World War II he won world-wide admiration when he defied Hitler. In April 1945 he was in solitary confinement in a Nuremberg prison awaiting execution for his opposition to the Nazis when he was liberated by American forces.

His book, "Valley of the Shacow," describes his imprisonment and is considered a devotional classic. His writings also include "Luther Now," "World Under God" and "The Last Book of the Bible."

After Dr. Lilje was freed from prison, he played a leading role in rebuilding the church in Germany and throughout Europe. He was soon elected Bishop of Hannover, and later, presiding Bishop of the Council of the Evangelical Church in Germany. He served as president of the LWF from 1952-57 and is one of six members of the presidium of the World Council of Churches.

A world traveler because of his position as leader of one of the largest Lutheran Churches in the world, Bishop Lilje has visited America many times. In 1964 he was visiting theologian at Union Theological Seminary in New York.

On Oct. 25 he will address the Seattle Reformation Celebration on the festival theme, "A New Church for a New Day." His Seattle visit is being sponsored by the Metropolitan Seattle Lutheran Council, which represents congregations in the three major Lutheran bodies.

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Department chairmen, division chairmen, directors and deans will be taking part in the Lilje convocation procession, together with others who choose to march (of whom we hope there will be many). These people should meet to robe and assemble in the lobby of the Administration Building at 9:30 a.m.

A special reception for faculty, administration, staff and spouses to meet and talk with Bishop Lilje will be held in the new University Center lobby in the afternoon of the convocation from 3:45 to 5:00 p.m. If it is impossible for you to attend this reception, you are welcome to greet the Bishop either directly after the convocation at 10:30 a.m. in the University Center (Room 204) when he will be visiting with pastors and people from the community, or at

HOMECOMING: "HOT TIME IN THE OLD TOWN" "Man of La Mancha," the university fall musical, and a concert by B.B. King, "bossman of the blues," will high-light Pacific Lutheran University's 1970 Homecoming Oct. 22-24.

In addition, Dr. William O. Rieke, internationallyrenowned physician, will receive PLU's fifth Distinguished Alumnus award.

Curtain goes up on the fourth performance of the long-running Broadway musical, "Man of La Mancha," Saturday evening, Oct. 24. Produced by Prof. Theodore O. H. Karl, the all-university production begins at 8:15 p.m. in Eastvold Auditorium. Prof. Eric Nordholm is the director.

Blues artist King and his red guitar, Lucille, will be featured Friday, Oct. 23, in Olson Auditorium, also at 8:15 p.m. King, whose music was filled with "soul" two decades before the term became popular, has appeared recently in Las Vegas and on many of the top TV network variety programs.

Dr. Rieke, a 1953 PLU alumnus who has become an international leader in the field of medical research related to organ transplantation, will be honored at the alumni homecoming banquet Saturday evening, beginning at 5:45 p.m. in the new University Center.

A long-time Seattle resident, Rieke now resides in Iowa City, Ia., where he is a professor and head of the department of anatomy at the University of Iowa.

Alumnus of the Year awards will be presented to Malcolm Soine of Tacoma and Robert Nistad of Seattle.

The Homecoming football game Saturday at 1:30 p.m. pits PLU against the Whitman Missionaries at Franklin-Pierce Stadium.

Homecoming weekend begins Thursday evening, Oct. 22, with the coronation of the Homecoming Queen and her weekend escort, Handsome Harry. The coronation is followed by the annual songfest, bonfire and stomp, all planned around the 1970 Homecoming theme, "A Hot Time in the Old Town."

B.B. King is the feature Friday, followed by a full slate of activities Saturday. The final day begins with intramural football championships and the annual Powder Puff football game, both at 9 a.m. An alumni brunch is set for ll a.m. The Homecoming game is followed by the alumni banquet.

There is a choice of activities Sat rday evening between "Man of La Mancha" in Eastvold Auditorium and the Homecoming Dance in Olson Auditorium. The theme of the dance is "The Golden Nugget," with the Springfield Rifle the featured musicians.

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Beginning on Wednesday Oct. 14, coffee service for faculty following chapel will begin. The program will continue every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday as long as there is sufficient faculty interest.

After chapel come to the University Center. Enter the north dining room through door 206. Serve yourself as you pass through room 206 and leave your dime in the bowl provided for this purpose. We will operate on an honor system.

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Approximately 1,500 Leaguers from throughout the Northwest will be guests of the PLU Admissions office Saturday, Oct. 17.

They have been invited to the campus for a variety of morning activities, including campus tours, swimming, and games in the new University Center. They will all be guests of the university at the PLU - Pacific University football game Saturday afternoon at 1:30 p.m. at Franklin-Pierce Stadium.

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B.C. MAN PLANS MODERN VIKING SAGA A special treat for Scandinavians and Viking history buffs may be viewed this week in downtown Tacoma.

A 24-oar, 60-foot long authentic Viking vessel is on display at 8th and A Sts., through this weekend. The craft, which took Eric Jennens of Kelowna, B.C., almost five years to build and more than a decade to research, will ultimately be used for a Viking-style journey from Norway to Iceland, Greenland and "Vinland" (Newfoundland) next July.

His traveling display around the country (next week he will be at the Seattle Center) will help finance his voyage. Incidentally, he is still taking applications for crew members!

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Joe Dean, former basketball star and special representative of the Converse Rubber Company, is scheduled to arrive in Tacoma on Tuesday, Oct. 20, at 7:30 p.m. to give a basketball clinic in Pacific Lutheran University's Olson Auditorium under the auspices of the PLU Athletic Department.

In his exhibition, Dean will use college players to illustrate basic fundamentals of offense and defense.

One of the highlights of his exhibition will be the showing of sound movies of the major championship contests of the past season, including the NIT and NCAA finals, NBA action, plus Globe Trotters at their funniest.
