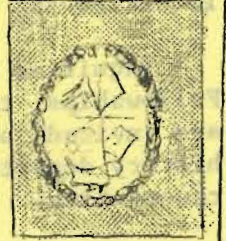

## FIFTEEN PER CENT INCREASE LISTED IN FULL-TIME ENROLLMENT

Official tabulations reveal a 15 per cent increase in full-time enrollment at Pacific Lutheran University this fall according to Mrs. Rolf Espeseth, PLU registrar.

Figures thus far show an enrollment of 1,822 full-time students (those taking 12 hours or more) which is an increase of 237 over last year's fall total of 1,585.

To date the total enrollment for the fall semester is 2,212. However, registration is still open in several courses.

A breakdown of the total enrollment lists 690 freshmen, 492 sophomores, 379 juniors, 383 seniors, 246 graduates and 22 special students.

Biggest single increase came in the graduate school where there was a gain of 97 students. The addition of a graduate program in business administration is the principal reason for this advancement. Approximately 75 persons have enrolled in this area.

Classwise, the freshmen class shows the largest gain with an increase of 85 over last year's total of 605. Of the total number of freshmen enrolled there are 647 full-time students, an increase of 21 per cent over the 1964 total of 534.

Of the full-time freshmen, 162 or 25 per cent had entering grade point averages of 3.5 or above on a four point system while more than one-half had averages of 3.0 or above. Ninety-seven per cent of the entering freshmen ranked in the top half of their graduating class.

## PLU FOOTBALLERS ENCOUNTER POWERFUL EASTERN WASHINGTON SATURDAY

PLU meets the team picked to replace it as the Evergreen Conference football champion--Eastern Washington--Saturday at 8 p.m. in Spokane's Joe Albi Stadium.

Coach Roy Carlson hopes to be at full strength for the first time this season against EWSC, one of the two undefeated small college teams in Washington. The Savages defeated Western Montana 58-0 and Whitworth 27-14. Saturday's game will match the first two District I NAIA "back of the week" selections--Eastern's Mel Stanton and PLU's Ken Tetz.

Stanton, one of 19 lettermen returning at Eastern, has sparked the Savages in both of their victories, averaging 114 yards per game. Last year he was selected as the District I NAIA back of the year and ranked 14th nationally in rushing.

Tetz lead the Knights in their 23-7 victory over UPS, gaining 90 yards in 21 carries.

Although Eastern leads in the series 13-11-3, PLU has won three of the last five games, including a 20-7 victory last year. The 1962 game ended in a 13-13 tie.

The game will be broadcasted over KTAC radio, 850 K. C.

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DANFORTH GRADUATE FELLOWSHIP  
INQUIRIES ARE INVITED

Inquiries about the Danforth Graduate Fellowships, to be awarded in March, 1966, are invited, according to Philip Nordquist, history department, the local campus representative.

The Fellowships, offered by the Danforth Foundation of St. Louis, Missouri, are open to men and women who are seniors or recent graduates of accredited colleges in the United States, who have serious interest in college teaching as a career, and who plan to study for a PH. D. in a field common to the undergraduate college. Applicants may be single or married, must be less than thirty years of age at the time of application, and may not have undertaken any graduate or professional study beyond the baccalaureate.

Approximately 120 Fellowships will be awarded in March, 1966. Candidates must be nominated by Liaison Officers of their undergraduate institutions. The Foundation does not accept direct applications for the Fellowships.

Danforth Graduate Fellows are eligible for four years of financial assistance, with a maximum annual living stipend of \$1,800 for single Fellows and \$2,200 for married Fellows, plus tuition and fees. Dependency allowances are available. Financial need is not a condition for consideration.

Danforth Fellows may hold other fellowships such as Ford, Fulbright, National Science, Rhodes, Woodrow Wilson, etc. concurrently, and will be Danforth Fellows without stipend until the other awards lapse.

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WOODROW WILSON FELLOWSHIP  
NOMINATIONS ARE SOUGHT

If PLU is to make nominations for 1966-67 Woodrow Wilson Fellowships, it will have to be done before October 31.

A brochure describing the fellowship program and nomination procedures is posted in the faculty lounge. The grants are for first-year graduate work. They are given to people who might be attracted to college teaching, and who show promise in this direction. "The foundation primarily supports candidates in the humanities and social sciences", but "science and mathematics majors with a clear interest in a teaching career may be nominated."

Any member of the faculty may nominate a candidate. It is assumed that the students they recommend would have honors status (3.3) in order to realistically compete. If you wish to make a nomination, please see Dr. Thomas Langevin in the near future.
