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ARTIST SERIES FEATURES BAYANIHAN DANCERS The Bayanihan Philippine Dance Company, 27 dancers and 12 musicians who have toured internationally since 1958, will appear at PLU Friday, Sept. 18.

The program, first of five PLU Artist Series offerings during the 1970-71 season, will be held in Olson Auditorium at 8:15 p.m.

The Bayanihan Dancers are top-rated among the numerous folkloric dance ensembles in the Islands. Its first international engagement was the Brussels World's Fair in 1958, and it has since performed throughout Europe, Canada, South America and the United States.

A critic for an Israeli newspaper declared recently, "The spectacular show sweeps the audience with the swing of its dances, its music and its colors."

The New York Times described the show as "eye ravishing;" the Chicago Tribune called it "an enchanting show."

Painstaking research goes into every aspect of the program, including costuming, scenic design and music. The result is an accurate representation of Philippine culture.

The company portrays the regional customs of its Arabic-Malayan-Spanish-American past, as well as those of the tribal peoples of the Islands.

Faculty members may purchase season Artist Series tickets for themselves and families at the Business Office for \$4.50 each. Season Tickets for others are \$10.00 and may be purchased at the Alumni Office. Tickets for individual programs are \$3.00 for the main floor and \$2.00 for the upper balcony. These and tickets for other events scheduled for PLU are on sale at the University Center information counter.

Other Artist Series attractions include actresssoprano Marni Nixon, Nov. 13; piano virtuoso Lorin Hollander, Feb. 26; pantomimist Claude St. Denis, March 10; and the Denver Symphony Orchestra, April 21.

PROMOTIONS, TENURE ANNOUNCED THURSDAY

Faculty promotions and the granting of tenure were announced at PLU Thursday by President Eugene Wiegman.

Promotions were given to 12 faculty members and tenure was granted to four persons at a morning convocation officially beginning the school year.

Faculty appointments and honors were also announced at the program, during which President Wiegman launched the new academic year with a new theme, "year of commitment."

"I ask all the members of our university to accept the challenge of being great men," Wiegman stated. "Our lives, our actions and our commitments are needed now."

Promotions to professor were granted to Dr. Emmet Eklund, religion; Dr. Lucille Johnson, English; and Dr. Charles Peterson, business administration.

Named associate professor were Mrs. Irene Creso, biology; Eric Nordholm, communication arts; and Dr. Vernon Stinzi, business administration.

Promoted to assistant professor were Dr. Daniel Baty, business administration; Robert Fisk, mathematics; Paul Hoseth, physical education; Robert Jensen, economics; Charles Nelson, education; and Audun Toven, foreign languages.

Granted tenure were Dr. John Herzog, Mathematics; Dr. Jensen, biology; Ernst Schwidder, art; and Dr. Doris Stucke, nursing.

Appointments to new posts under the university's revised academic structure were also announced by Wiegman. Appointed deans were Dr. Gundar King, school of business administration; Dr. Kenneth Johnston, school of education; and Dr. Richard Moe, graduate and summer studies.

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Five PLU professors have been selected to appear in the 1970 edition of "Outstanding Educators of America."

The honored educators are Dr. J. A. Schiller, sociology; Dr. George Arbaugh, philosophy; Dr. Jens Knudsen, biology; Dr. William Giddings, chemistry; and Dr. Jane Williamson, education.

Nominated earlier this year, they have been chosen for the awards publication of the basis of their civic and professional achievements. Guidelines for selection include an educator's talents in the classroom, contributions to research, administrative abilities and any civic or professional recognition previously received.

Professors Knudsen, Arbaugh and Williamson have also received PLU's Distinguished Teacher Award, an annual honor now in its fourth year.

Nominations for Outstanding Educators are made by the presidents, deans, superintendents and other heads of schools and colleges.

Former Vice-President Hubert Humphrey, who wrote the introductory message for the 1970 edition, says of the men and women included, "The greatest strength of any nation is its human resources. These are the men and women who by their actions in the classroom today mold the course of history. Our hope--the nation's youth--are in

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WHITWORTH HERE IN GRID OPENER

Last year it was the Pirates who walked the plank. Coach Roy Carlson and company, who enjoyed that turn-of-events routine, hope to direct Whitworth on a similar path this Saturday when the Knights and Pirates clash in the football opener at Franklin Pierce Stadium. Game time is 8 p.m.

The Knights, victorious 36-0 last season, have a powerful offensive machine with even greater depth in the backfield than a year ago. If the defensive secondary jells, PLU could be a solid contender for the conference championship, an honor they shared with Linfield, Lewis & Clark, and Whitman in 1969.

Whitworth, under new coach, Hugh Campbell, one of college football's all-time great pass receivers while at Washington State, has twenty-five lettermen returning and should be improved over last year.
