No dumping in recycle bins

PLU Environmental Services promotes and services recycling on campus. Down at Plant Services are commodity bins used for the campus recycling program. The bins are often used by faculty, staff, students and others. Recently people have misused the recycling site for dumping, placing many unwanted materials in the bins. The newspaper bin itself was so greatly misused that the value of the product went from \$45 per ton to \$15 per ton. If it were contaminated more, PLU would have had to *pay* to recycle it as a lower grade of paper or else dispose of it as waste, costing the university up to \$78 per ton.

If you want to recycle your glass, newspapers, aluminum, cardboard, #1 PETE and #2 HDPE plastic bottles with Environmental Services, the team there will be glad to help, keeping the materials properly sorted so the recyclables are an asset. You can recycle goods from 12 to 4 pm on weekdays. Please don't bring products other than those listed -- PLU
