Welcome to J-term 1998!

Pacific Lutheran University's January Term provides students and faculty with a unique opportunity to concentrate their attention intensely on one class at a time. Not only can that deepen one's understanding of subject matter, but it makes it possible for each class to become a closer community of learning.

Because of this opportunity for more intense focus and cultivation of learning community, the university requires all freshmen in particular to take a course in January (one that also satisfies a General University Requirement). Those courses are specially designated, and freshmen will be allowed to register for them first on November 10-11.

All students, not just freshmen, will find within this schedule courses of interest to them. In addition to a few unusual courses peculiar to January (generally those involving an off-campus experience), you will find here a broad range of offerings within the regular curriculum--interesting electives, upper division courses in many specific majors, and courses satisfying various General University Requirements.

The Freshman January Term Requirement

Freshman students are required to fulfill the freshman January term requirement by enrolling in a J-term course that fulfills one of their general university requirements (GUR). These courses are marked in the schedule with a "J" designator. Courses marked with a J and listed in the section set aside for freshman J-term courses will meet this requirement. The only exception to this requirement is that freshmen who are participating in off-campus courses whose other members are PLU students may fulfill this requirement by taking that off-campus course. They may also register for these off-campus courses with the permission of the instructor and may only register after other students have had the opportunity to register for those courses.

The purpose of the freshman January term requirement is two-fold. First, it is an integral part of the freshman experience at PLU. It provides another opportunity, along with the Writing for Discovery (English 101) seminars and Critical Conversation courses (courses numbered 117), to enroll in classes designed specifically for freshman students. Second, it provides an opportunity to take another general university requirement in a setting of more focused attention on the learning process as well as course content. The January term is a stimulating change from the regular semesters and most students find J-Term courses to be very worthwhile and enjoyable.

All freshmen must complete the three requirements of the freshman experience during their first year at PLU. Freshmen are given priority for registration in freshman J-term courses with a "J" designation in the course number. Other students may register on a space available basis.

PERSPECTIVES ON DIVERSITY

(6-8 Hours)

A course in each of the following two lines is required. The only 2-hour courses that can satisfy either of the following lines completely are the freshman Critical Conversation seminars.

- a. Alternative Perspectives (2-4 hours): A course which creates an awareness and understanding of diversity in the United States, directly addressing issues such as ethnicity, gender, disability, racism, or poverty.
- b. Cross-Cultural Perspectives (2-4 hours): A course that enhances cross-cultural understandings through examination of other cultures. This requirement may be satisfied in one of three ways:
 - (i) a course focusing on the culture of non-Euro-American societies (see section b in the box below);
 - (ii) a 201 or higher-level course in a language used to satisfy the admission requirement, or 8 credits in a language not previously studied; or
 - (iii) participation in an approved semester-long study abroad program.

NOTE: 2-4 hours of Perspectives on Diversity courses may be used to fulfill another core requirement. The remaining 4 hours must be a course that does not simultaneously fulfill any other core requirement. These 4 hours may, however, satisfy a requirement in the major.

All junior and senior transfer students shall take one perspectives on diversity course (4 hours), from either line that does not simultaneously fulfill another core requirement. All other transfer students must meet the full perspectives on diversity requirement.

THE STUDENT SERVICES CENTER

Registration Dates

- Freshmen only may register for J-Term on November 10 and 11. Registration for Spring is by appointment beginning November 12, 1997 (see page 8).
- All other students may register for J-Term during their Spring appointment times which begin November 12, 1997. Spaces available in freshman J-Term classes after November 11 are open to all students.
- Students new to PLU may begin registering November 24, 1997.
- **Students who are unable to attend the first class meetings are expected to notify the instructor or the Student Services Center before Monday, January 5, 1998. Students who miss the first two class meetings without prior arrangement risk being dropped from the class by the professor; however, students still need to take responsibility for dropping courses they do not plan on attending.**

Advance Payment and Registration Policy

New undergraduate students must make a \$200.00 advance payment to confirm their offer of admission. The payment is refundable until May 15 for fall, December 15 for January term, and January 15 for spring. Requests for a refund must be made in writing to the Admissions Office.

If you register after December 15, you must pay tuition and fees at the time of registration or be enrolled in an approved payment plan with the Student Services Center at the time of registration.

If you withdraw from a course after the last day of add/drop, you waive your right to a refund. Registered students who decide not to continue at PLU must notify the Student Services Center in writing. Charges will remain on the student's account and an unofficial withdraw grade (UW) will be posted to the transcript until such notice is received.

Tuition Rate

- Undergraduate and graduate tuition for the 1997-98 academic year is \$473.00 per credit hour.
- Tuition rate for hours above 4 in January (J) term is \$236.00 per credit hour.
- Credit by exam charges are one-fourth the regular rate or \$118.25 for both undergraduate and graduate students.

Course Fees

Some courses require additional fees beyond the tuition charge. The course listings will indicate if a fee in addition to tuition is to be charged. For more detailed information regarding the fees, contact the instructor or the academic department.

Payment Information

Contact the Student Services Center for current charges if a complete statement has not been received. Unpaid balances are subject to late charges if not paid by published deadlines.

Refund Policy

Notice of withdrawal must be given in writing to the Pacific Lutheran University Student Services Center and received before the deadlines above. Oral requests are not acceptable. Charges will remain on the account until written notice is received. **No tuition refund is given for partial withdrawal from classes after the first week of class. Students must obtain the instructor's signature and present it at the Student Services Center if they wish to withdraw from classes after the tenth day.**

Grades

You may access your final grades by telephoning the PLU voice response system using your touch-tone telephone. Grades are due from the faculty on noon, Friday, February, 6th. You may listen to your grades beginning 8:00 a.m., Monday, February 9th. Simply dial the PLU voice response number (253) 531-4011 from off-campus or extension 4011 from on campus and follow the directions to select the grade option. If no grade is listed when you dial in, the instructor has not yet submitted the grades for that course. If you need a printed copy of your grades, an unofficial transcript may be requested at no charge from the Express Window at the Student Services Center or you may FAX your request with your written signature (253) 535-8320.

Room and Meal Information

If you reside on campus either Fall or Spring, then your room fee is waived during J-Term. If you live on campus during J-Term only, your room charge is \$265.00. The cost of meals for residential students during J-Term is \$264.00 for 20 meals per week, \$255.00 for 15 meals per week and \$230.00 for 10 meals per week. 5 meals per week is available for commuter students at a cost of \$125.00. Halls will be open Sunday, January 5, 12:00 noon for the start of J-Term.

Registering by Telephone is Easy!!!

The PLU voice response system has replaced the old tele-registration system. It is available twenty-four (24) hours a day except when the machines are being maintained. You may add (register for) or drop classes using the voice response system through the first Friday of the term. For off-campus dial (253) 531-4011 or from on-campus dial 4011 using any touch-tone telephone. The voice response system requires you to enter your student ID number and your PIN (personal identification number). Your initial PIN is your birthdate. Example: The PIN for a person born June 16, 1978 is 061678. You may change your PIN at any time via the voice response system. **We strongly encourage you to change your PIN right away in order to prevent others from gaining unauthorized access to your registration.**

BEFORE YOU BEGIN

- Students who have never attended PLU or have not been formally admitted to the university are not in the data base and therefore are not eligible to register using the voice response system. Please go to the Student Services Center for assistance.
- **Do not use the # sign** after each entry as you did on the old system. **THIS SYSTEM DOES NOT REQUIRE THE # SIGN.** It will not recognize the CRN if you enter a # sign.
- The wait after entering each course request may seem a little long, but don't hang up or become frustrated. It takes time for the system to go out and find the course and come back with its response. **BE PATIENT!!**
- Be sure to save your registration before you hang up by entering : * # 3 (asterisk, pound sign, three). If you do not save your registration and listen to your schedule before you hang up you will lose it.
- The system is set to give you up to fifteen minutes to complete your registration. **After fifteen minutes, you will be disconnected and your work will be lost unless you have saved it.**
- Clear up any financial holds with the Student Service Center.
- Return your medical history form with proof of required immunization to the Health Center to clear an immunization hold.

Getting Started

- Before you actually use the telephone registration system, take a few moments to complete the course registration worksheet on the next page. When you are ready to register, have your completed worksheet at the phone for reference.
- The registration process is easy! You must use a push-button phone with tone-dialing. When you dial the access number, you will be given a list of options and will be guided through the registration process.

- To access registration by telephone, enter this number from a touch-tone phone: (253) 531-4011 Follow the Voice instructions to get to Registration. Terms available are: **J-Term & Spring 1998**
- You will be asked to enter your student ID number, and you PIN (personal identification number), and the course request numbers (CRN's) of the courses you are adding or dropping. If you enter any invalid data, the system alerts you to the error and prompts you for the correct information.
- You have 15 minutes to complete your call -- the system will hang up on you when you reach your time limit. Don't forget, you will lose all courses that have not been saved!
- Before you hang up, you **must** save the courses you have added or dropped and listen to your schedule. This may take a few minutes -- be patient! If you hang up or are timed out before you have saved your new courses, you will lose your work.

The following registrations must be done in person at the Student Services Center:

- Independent study and cooperative education courses
- Audit a course (no credit) - instructor's signature required
- To register for a course requiring approval - authorized signature required
- Registering for more than 18 hours in one semester. (use the PLU voice response for up to 18 hours in fall or spring and up to 6 hours in J term.)
- Waitlisting courses: Waitlist forms are located in the Student Services Center

For more information and applications on any of the following off-campus courses, please contact Charry Benston, Center for International Programs (main floor Harstad, extension 7628). The Center for International Programs will register students for off-campus courses unless otherwise noted.

ANTHROPOLOGY

ANTH 192 J - Practicing Anthropology: Makah Culture, Past and Present (4 credits) FRESHMAN COURSE

This class will study Makah culture in Neah Bay. The tribe has an active cultural research program. Archaeological, historical, and anthropological research have shed light on the Makah way of life over the last 3,000 years. Students will receive instruction in Makah culture by Makah, contribute to a project, and learn what life in Neah Bay is like. Part of the month-long class will be spent in Neah Bay on the Makah Reservation. *Satisfies Freshman J-Term and Diversity: Alternative Perspectives.*

ART

ARTD 390 - 19TH Century Art in Paris (4 credits) - COURSE IS CLOSED

Spend three weeks in Paris studying art movements and painters of the 19th century. Learn about the different styles of art and where they originated. Explore the cafe lined streets where great artists lived and worked. A knowledge of French is not required.

BIOLOGY

BIOL 321 - J-Term '98 and a Semester in China (4 credits for J-Term)

Study the Natural History of China during J-Term '98 in China. This course is offered in combination with a fall or spring semester at Sichuan University as part of PLU's exchange program. The class will award four credit hours of biology and will cover the major aspects of China's geology, climate, vegetation patterns, biogeography, adjacent seas, and human interaction with the former.

BUSINESS / COMMUNICATION

BUSA 490 / COMA 392 - Hong Kong (4 credits) - COURSE IS CLOSED

Study professional communication in one of the world's most exciting cities, HONG KONG. Meet with public relations and marketing specialists from the public and private sector. Develop your own contacts with communication professionals in your field of interest.

INTEGRATED STUDIES

INTG 246 - Community Development in Cuba (4 credits) COURSE IS CLOSED

Participate in this course and experience the daily life of ordinary people in Cuba. Learn the history of why Cuba initiated a socialist experiment and study the perilous consequences of this choice. Meet with community, political, and religious leaders and draw your own conclusions.

MUSIC

MUSI 109 - A Cultural Tour of London and Paris (4 credits) COURSE IS CLOSED

Be a Londoner for a week and a Parisian for three days. Visit art museums, symphony halls, hear the London Symphony in concert, see Phantom of the Opera and Les Mis, plus ballet, opera and other productions on the London stage.

NATURAL SCIENCES

NSCI 210 - Explore the Natural History of Hawaii (4 credits) COURSE IS CLOSED

The Hawaiian Islands are an active museum of geology and tropical island plant and animal life. The islands, the most isolated in the world, have native plants and animals--95% of which occur nowhere else. Students are expected to participate actively in daily lectures and field work involving the geologic formation of Hawaii and its subsequent population by plants and animals, stressing the impact of human intervention.

NORWEGIAN

NORW 202 - Language Study in Norway (4 credits)

Study the language and culture of Norway in Norway. Attend classes at the University of Oslo and participate in Oslo's cultural life. Get to know Norway, its people and language.

NURSING

NURS 395 - Health Services In Jamaica (4 credits)

The purpose of the course is to explore the role of culture in all its dimensions as it impacts the health of the people of Jamaica. Students will have the opportunity to contemplate views taken by the people of this region in addressing the environment, lifestyle, social, political, religious, and economic issues as they relate to culture and health.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

PHED 301 J - J-Term on the Hill (4 credits) FRESHMAN COURSE

This class is aimed at helping you learn about yourself, helping others, and facing issues of funding for community needs. We will work on re-doing some housing and cleaning up Tacoma's Hill Top neighborhood. You may serve meals, work with AIDS patients, play cards with the homeless, or work at a daycare. Satisfies Freshman J-Term and Diversity: *Alternative Perspectives*.

PHED 319 - Tramp the Tracks of New Zealand (4 credits) - COURSE IS CLOSED

Spend J-Term backpacking several of New Zealand's world renown tracks and hiking up ancient volcano craters, to glacial mountain lakes, and along sandy ocean beaches. Visit places such as the beautiful "garden city" of Christchurch, the recreational fun town of Queenstown, and Milford Sound.

RELIGION

RELI 365 - Holden Village: Environmental Ethics (4 credits) - WAITLIST ONLY

Christian perspectives on the environment will be the special focus of this course. Causes of the environmental crisis, attitudes toward nature and resource use, the role of Christian thought and the Church in the crisis, preservation of wilderness, personal responsibility, and population/food issues will be grist for class deliberations. The village itself will be a laboratory for meditation, exploration, and reflection.

RELI 331 - Israel and Jordan: Visit the Holy Land (4 credits) - COURSE IS CLOSED

Once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to live and study in the birthplace of the Judeo-Christian tradition. Biblical sites include places of sacred memory from the time of Jesus. Special attention will be given to the first-century setting and the Life of Jesus. The group will spend five days in Galilee, three days in fascinating Jordan, and six days in Jerusalem environs.

SPANISH

SPAN 231 or 331 - Intensive Spanish and Development Issues in Costa Rica (4 credits) - COURSE IS CLOSED

This Spanish language-Costa Rican culture immersion experience links language study and learning about a society. The program's primary objective is improving Spanish language knowledge and skills. The second objective seeks to identify the root causes and consequences of underdevelopment and to examine the effects of current development strategies on women, the poor, the culture, and the environment.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

SPED 393 / 394 - Teaching Students with Behavioral Disorders in Mexico (4 credits) - COURSE IS CLOSED

This course will allow you to explore the field of education for children and youth with emotional and behavioral disorders from a different cultural perspective. You will travel to Merida, Mexico in the Yucatan Peninsula, and spend J-Term taking a combination of classroom courses in the area of behavioral and emotional disorders. You will work with these youth in their classrooms in Mexican schools and have the opportunity to tour major archeological sites.

STUDY ABROAD

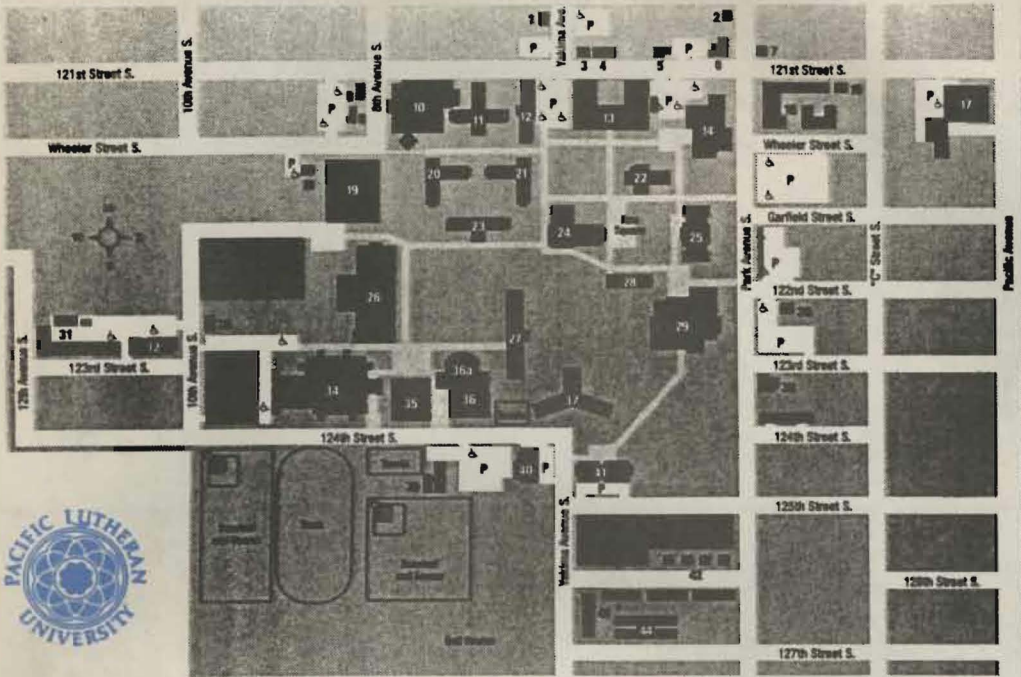
SABR 100 A - HIST, SOCI, RELI OR LIT. (Independent Study - Service Learning in India (4 credits)- COURSE IS CLOSED

Spend three weeks in India providing basic and needed care to the needy of Calcutta, studying the cultures and issues of the nation, and visiting other cities and towns. You may serve at Mother Teresa's Homes, providing care and support to destitute children, women and men and the ill. Or your service may be with various other types of agencies, schools or community projects dealing with the pressing social and human issues facing Calcutta.

SABR 100 B- ENVT (Independent Study) - Community Studies Program at the Crystal Waters Community: Queensland, Australia (4 credits)

Crystal Waters is consciously designed and maintained to optimize and balance the ecosystem of the natural environment with the people living in it. It is internationally recognized for its educational center for permaculture design which we will study while we experience the community itself, assist in work projects as a service component, and focus attention on what it takes to be a cooperating member of a fully integrated intentional community.

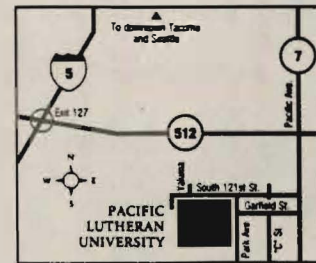
