Spring focuses on the Americas

Welcome to spring term 1997 -- The Americas Semester. The Americas will provide a framework to compare and contrast the diverse historical, political, social, economic and cultural experiences of peoples of Canada, the US, Latin America and the Caribbean. All this materializes in the form of classes and events for PLU and the community. Included on the schedule are an afternoon conference on sustainability and the new world order (see below) and an all-day conference on the politics of language and identity in the Americas in April. Andean, Native American and Brazilian musicians will perform at "Music at the Crossroads in the Americas" on April 3. The Humanities Film Series and the Feminist Scholarship Series both feature Americas topics, and classes from "Comparative Slavery" to "Women's Literature of the Americas" also help to develop an understanding of these issues. The semester is part of the project to internationalize our university using the Pacific Rim as the unifying theme, funded by a grant from the US Department of Education.

At work on the network

The computer connections that will link Rieke, Memorial Gym and the math and computer science building are underway. Wiring is complete in Rieke and moving along in the other two buildings. The last critical piece of equipment for the system is the etherswitch, which will allow the computers to talk to the campus network. In the past in Rieke, some faculty and lab computers were individually connected to the network. The new wiring and switch will replace that infrastructure, and allow more computers access. Once the switch is installed, the computers can begin running on the new system. The network in the Memorial and the math/computer science building will start as soon as its wiring is complete. Eric Lowe, a computer engineering student, is hard at work on network configuration. The connections are funded by a grant from the Kresge Foundation.
