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Dr. and Mrs. Robert Mortvedt will board a Pan American World Airways jet at Sea-Tac Airport Saturday morning at 8 and at 1:30 p.m. will deplane in Honolulu.

While in Hawaii the Mortvedts will be meeting with alumni and with parents of PLU students. They will return the morning of Tuesday, February 4.
