


As this building program surrounds us, it also reminds the spirit of the Class of 1931.

Chapel Music Speech Building

During this school year we have watched the chapel-music building rise majestically on our campus. Designed to be the religious and cultural center of our beloved college, this beautiful structure dwarfs the other buildings on campus. Its lofty spire pointing upward from the mass of concrete and brick will serve to remind us and future students of The Master Builder Who is the center of our life at P.J.C.

When it is completed this summer, this building will represent an investment of \$625,000. The contribution of thousands of Church people throughout the land have made it possible to build. They are assisting in mortal building in order that the greater cause of building for Christian character might be furthered.

The building will serve many purposes.

The 1,238 seat auditorium will be used for daily chapel exercises, concerts, special gatherings and plays. A stage of 16 feet deep, 72 feet wide and 72 feet high will permit the production of all types of dramatic works. The auditorium will be equipped with a great pipe organ and an orchestra pit.


Music facilities include 17 individual practice rooms, seven studios for music teachers, a band and orchestra room, a choir and chorus room and a music library.

For speech there will be classrooms, offices and a radio studio. The radio studio will seat 100 people, will have a 16 by 24 foot stage, and will have booths for engineers and announcers.

All of the music and speech rooms will be completely soundproof. Double construction with the rooms suspended on cables is the type of acoustical engineering being employed.

In the basement below the stage there are dressing rooms, work shops, a recording room and a heating unit.

A terrace lounge above the stage will be used for receptions, teas and art exhibits. Above the lounge, on the third floor, there will be a small devotional chapel which will seat 75 persons.

Jesus once told a story about two builders. The one built his house upon a rock, and the other built his house upon the sand.

The wise builder consumed many days digging, blasting, and excavating his home to the bedrock. The foolish builder laid his bricks on the sand, and quickly raised the walls to the roof. He bowed under himself nor the rocks. The wise builder peered over his sofa, mourned at the slow progress, and went to bed tired while his neighbor was out late with his pleasurements. The foolish builder fell into drunkenness, sang idle songs, and indulged in vain amusements.

But it was not long until the walls of the foolish man's house developed ugly settlements—hollow cracks, gouts starting from their places, and slipping timbers. He had more pains and expense keeping his house standing than the wise man had in building. He half visited the bad dog to the rock, but it was now too late, because he build superficially and high in conceit. It was harder to keep his building upright. Elevation hastened catastrophe.

The main difference in the two buildings was not in the cheapness, not in the expensiveness of building, but in the FOUNDATION!

As last the foolish man's house was swept away in the storm and he perished with it. He finally buried the whole trunk in Hades—a dreadful discovery! His fallen house was never built again—no refuge, a total wreck, lost forever!

The wise builder refers to the ones who builds up Jesus Christ. The same can abreact him, the wise floods came to him, the same winds harried him against him—but his house was built of a stable foundation. His house was invincible and his troubles exalted him to the Rock.

When the last trumpet shall sound, when the pillars of the earth shall crumble, when the heavens shall roll away, and when the earth shall melt with fervent heat, the wise builder will be saved from it all.

Building on Christ is the cheapest, safest, worty, wisest, and safest. Christian education offers the blueprint for him who would build to cover all of earth's storms.


Under the fine leadership of this year's student body president, Lowell Knutson, the Student Council has endeavored to bring a closer relationship between faculty and students.







Each girl in the organization has an opportunity to earn a special award by turning out for the several sports offered in the W.A.A. program. Receiving of awards is based on a system of points. A girl must earn 300 points a year. Each sport has a number of points with it and by turning out for the various activities, girls who have 700 points receive a chevrole after the first year of turnout; a pin the second year, and chevrons are added to the pin for the third and fourth years.

Yell Leaders

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

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
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
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
