DR. PAUL POPENOE, NATIONAL AUTHORITY, TO LECTURE MONDAY ON LOVE AND MARRIAGE

Whether you are married or single, you are no doubt vitally interested in the subject of love and marriage. One of the world's foremost lecturers and writers on that topic will be on campus Monday, December 9, for a series of three lectures. He is Dr. Paul Popenoe of Los Angeles.

Dr. Popenoe, whose book "Sex, Love and Marriage" is a best seller is available at the PLU Bookstore, will speak first in Chapel Monday morning at 9:50 on "New Principles in Family Counseling." At 3:30 p.m. he will lecture and conduct a discussion on the subject, "Practical Techniques of Family Counseling." For his closing lecture-discussion at 8:00 p.m. his topic will be, "Working Toward a Successful Marriage." All lectures will be held in Eastvold Chapel.

Dr. E. C. Knorr, chairman for the lectures, states that Dr. Popenoe's appearance inaugurates the first annual Social Life Series, made possible by a grant from Lutheran Brotherhood. There is no admission charge.

Dr. Popenoe is founder and administrator of the American Institute of Family Relations in Los Angeles. He has written many articles and books, has a syndicated newspaper column, a daily radio broadcast and edits a bulletin.
