FIVE MUSICAL CONCERTS SLATED DURING COMING WEEK AT PLU

Five musical concerts are scheduled for the PLU campus during the coming week starting with a concert by the Gonzaga College Band tonight at 8 p.m. in the Eastvold Chapel auditorium.

The concert by the 55-piece band will be complimentary to the public.

Sunday, Miss Wilma Jensen, nationally known organist, will appear in recital at 8 p.m. in Eastvold Chapel auditorium. The concert is being sponsored by the PLU Organ Guild. Tickets may be purchased in advance at the Information Desk in the Administration Building. Advance tickets sell for \$1 for students and \$1.75 for adults. Tickets will sell at the door for \$2.00.

Thursday morning the Wagner College Choir will present a concert during the morning chapel program at 9:50 a.m. Currently on a three-week tour of the U.S., the choir is under the direction of Sigvart J. Steen, uncle of Paul Steen, an instructor in the speech department.

The Augsburg College Band will present a concert Thursday at 8 p.m. in the East-vold Chapel Auditorium under the sponsorship of the Pierce County Lutheran Ministerial Association. Under the direction of Mayo Savold, the band's repertoire will range from the finest concert band literature to popular marches.

Tickets for the concert at \$1 for adults and \$.75 for students may be purchased at the Information desk.

The Ford Caravan of Music, featuring the Serendipity Singers and the Oscar Peterson Trio, will perform Friday at 8 p.m. in Memorial Gymnasium. Tickets can be purchased at the Information Desk.

KNIGHT BASKETBALLERS TRAVEL TO EASTERN WASH., WHITWORTH

The "up and down" PLU basketball team heads into the final month of activity this week end with the rugged assignment of "win the final seven games or else," staring it in the face.

The Knights, who are 9-8 overall and 2-1 in Evergreen Conference action, meet Eastern Washington in Cheney Friday and Whitworth in Spokane Saturday in a pair of league games.

A loss at this point would almost wipe out PLU's chances of winning its tenth EvCo crown in the last 11 years or earning a spot in the District I NAIA playoffs. Central Washington, which handed PLU its only conference setback, leads the league with a 3-0 record.

Eastern Washington and Whitworth are both 1-2 in league play while they hold respective overall records of 7-10 and 6-10.

In the all-time modern series PLU holds a commanding lead over both schools, leading the Savages 28-19 and the Pirates 34-15.

PLU owns earlier victories this season over Eastern and Whitworth, defeating both in the EvCo Tipoff Tournament. The Knights bested the Savages 68-60 and the Pirates 66-54.

Curt Gammell, 6-6 junior center, continues to lead the PLU scorers with an 18 point per game average. Mike Lockerby, 6-1 junior guard, is the only other Knight in the double figures with an 11.5 average.
